The line of march for above will be as follows: Parade forms in front of city hall. It will move south on High street to State, west on State to Commercial, south on Commercial to Trade, north on Commercial to Marion. Returning the procession will move south on Commercial to Court, east on Court through the carnival ground and will disband in front of the society circus.

Oriental in Parade.

Special attention should be called to the participation of the Chinese and Japanese residents of Salem, who will appear en masse in the big comic parade. The Chinese, headed by Mr. Lal Yick will be represented by three gorgeous floats, of a character never before seen in this city. All the decorations have been especially imported for the occasion, and the progressive Celestials promise a rare treat to all those who witness their part in the parade.

Not to be outdone by the Chinese contingent of the Mongolian race, the local Japanese have prepared a magnificent float which they will enter in the parade. The subject of the float is historical, and according to Mr. Matsui, who is managing the affair, represents "The Faithful Subjects of the Emperor, Godingo, Who Captured Criminals and Saved His Majesty, Takanori Koplmi."

On the float will appear the famous Japanese "cherry blossom tree" containing the secret message which tells the emperor of the conspiracy against him, and saves his majesty's life.

The affair is under the auspices of the Japanese society of Salem. Those who will portray the historical characters on the float are Mrs. Aoki, Mrs. Watanabe, Mr. Matsui, Mr. Usui and the Rev. S. Kodama. The Japanese wish to have it announced that those who will take part in the parade tomorrow evening constitute the respective Japanese element of the city. They are progressive business men, and take a great deal of pride in the success and reputation of the Cherry City.

adopted this course as the only solution of the difficulty. The order will apply to both the games held at the stadium and those conducted under the auspices of the association at other fields.

When it was announced yesterday that the scores made at field other than the stadium would be included in the general result by which the championship would be determined the Americans immediately entered a protest. This method, which is a departure from the usual system of scoring would have placed every country except England hopelessly out of the running. The athletes from the United States insisted that the field events alone should count for the championship while the Englishmen supported the action of the association in including lacrosse, football, shooting tournaments, figure skating, hockey, boxing and various other sports in the general results.

This method of scoring would have placed the teams in this order: United Kingdom, 20; United States, 5; Sweden, 3; Norway, 2; Canada, France, Belgium and Italy, 1 each. Under the method usually applied, stadium scores only being counted the teams would stand thus: United States, 31; United Kingdom, 20; Sweden, 5; Greece, 3; Canada, 1; Australia, 1; Norway, 1.

First place under this system counts five points; second place, three points and third place, one point. Under the English system, besides including outside games, only the first place counts and but one point is given for the place.

Americans Pleased.

The decision of the Olympic association not to award the championship meets the approval of the Americans here. They feel confident of carrying off the most points at the stadium, and although they will not be officially declared victors, will be able to call themselves champions.

In the 100-meter back stroke swimming race today Bieberstein of Germany, won the first heat of the semi-finals in 1 minute, 25 3-5 seconds. In heat two, Haresmape, of England, won, making the distance in 1 minute, 25 1-5 minutes.

Combining sections 1 and 2, Nielson, of Sweden, won the preliminary in the middle hold javelin throw by hurling the shaft 154 feet, 6 1/2 in.

G. E. Lerner, on five points for England today by finishing first in the 10-mile walk. His time was 1 hour, 15 minutes and 2-5 seconds.
