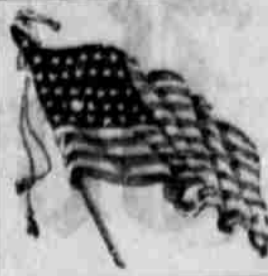

BIG DOINGS IN RIFLE MATCHES

Washington, July 17.—In one month the great national rifle matches will be in progress on the beautiful range at Camp Perry, Ohio. Lying on the banks of Lake Erie, across from Put-in-Bay, adjacent to Sandusky, and within easy reach of Cleveland, Toledo and Detroit, Camp Perry is the most accessible of all large rifle ranges, which fact augurs well for the attendance on these matches. It is expected that more than one thousand of the crack military shots will be in attendance, who, with the 1200 officers, scorers, markers, guards, etc., will make a camp of about 2500 men.

It is assured that these matches will be the largest in point of attendance ever held in this country, and perhaps will be the best of the national matches to be held, at least for some years to come. Indications point to a change in the method of determining such contests. It is represented that the attendance on these matches is so large as to necessitate from two to three weeks shooting of which ten days are devoted to the national matches alone. Many shooters are unable to take this time together with that necessary for home practice and competitions for places on the teams. The question of expense is also entering largely into the calculations of the state authorities. It costs some of the states as much as five thousand dollars to fit out a team and send it to the national matches which is a very considerable item to the smaller states, especially when they are trying to buy and equip ranges of their own out of the appropriation for rifle practice. Accordingly the project of dividing the country into districts, and having district competitions, instead of one great meeting, is being seriously considered with the possibility of being finally approved. The winning teams could then be brought together at some central point and a national competition held. Under this plan the smaller and weaker states, who have no chance to land a prize in the national competitions, would be saved much expense and the time consumed would be considerably shortened.

The principal match at Camp Perry will, of course, be the National Team Match, for which congress has provided the trophy. It is for teams of 12, open to the army (2), navy, marine corps, military and naval academies, and the national guard of the various states and territories, including the District of Columbia. In this match there will probably be 40 entries. The second team receives the famous Hilton trophy and the third the Soldier of Marathon, while there are six cash prizes for the six highest teams. Each member of the winning team receives a medal. Next in importance are the National Individual Rifle and the National Pistol matches, in both of which there are a number of cash and medal prizes. Last year there were 648 competitors in the individual rifle, and 250 in the pistol match, and more are expected to enter this year.

Of the National Rifle Association matches the most important is the Fogtmental Team match, in which there were 47 teams entered last year. The first prize in this match is a handsome championship trophy, valued at \$500. It has been won twice by the Sixth Regiment Massachusetts Volunteer Militia, and if this team is again victorious, the trophy becomes its property. Next in interest is the Company Team match, in which the prizes are cash and medals. Of the individual matches it is difficult to determine which is the most interesting, the Leech cup, the Wimbledon cup, or the President's match. They are shot under different conditions, the Leech cup match being seven record shots at 800, 900, and 1,000 yards, and the Wimbledon cup 20 record shots at 1000 yards, while the President's match includes everything from the skirmish to the 1,000 yard stage. Both the Leech and Wimbledon cups are historic, and the winner of the President's match receives, an autograph letter from the President in addition to a substantial cash prize. There are medals and cash prizes in each match.

Another very interesting event is the championship Regimental Skirmish match, open to teams of six. When won twice the beautiful silver trophy becomes the property of the winning team. Last year this match had 51 entries. Other N. R. A. matches are the Inter-Club match, Life Members match, State Secretaries match and the Press match.

There is also a championship Revolver team match.

The greatest interest in Ohio State Rifle Association matches centers around the Herrick Trophy match for a magnificent silver trophy presented by Ex-Gov. Herrick of Ohio. It is accompanied by \$375 in cash prizes with medals to the members of the winning team. This match is open to teams of eight who shoot 15 shots per man at 800, 900 and 1,000 yards. Other matches are: Hays Trophy match for teams of three (limited to the Ohio National Guard); Ideal Company Team match for teams of three; All-Corners Off-Hand Match; All-Corners 600 yard match; Peter trophy match; Individual Rapid Fire match; and a number of brigade, expert and novice matches with cash and medal prizes. In addition there will be a number of revolver matches open to teams and individuals.

COOS BAY FOLK GO A-HUNTING

(Coos Bay Times.)

The deer hunting season in Coos counties and throughout Oregon will open tomorrow and last night and today there has been an exodus of the hunters from Coos Bay for the various sections where big game is said to be easily obtained. The law limits the season's shoot to five bucks, it being a crime to kill does or fawns. The season last from July 15 to October 15 in Coos and Curry counties and until November 1st, elsewhere throughout the state. In some sections of Oregon, the killing of does is permitted between September 1st and November 1st, but the killing of does or fawns is not permitted in Coos and Curry counties at any time during the year.

Game Warden Cal. Wright is keeping a careful tab on the hunters and is said to have a number of deputies throughout the county who will inform him of any violation and he proposes that the violator shall be promptly punished. All hunters are required to secure a license, a fee being charged of non-residents.

Deer Hunters.

J. W. Bennett, Tom Bennett, D. Bowers of Salt Lake City and James Polhemus left yesterday for the Gould ranch on upper Coos River from where they will go into the forest. They expect to be gone a week or more.

Frank Cameron, Dr. Hayes of this city and H. W. Lynch have gone to the upper Sixes in Curry county, where Mr. Cameron has a timber claim, and where deer are reported to be plentiful.

Frank Denning, Henry Weid and Walter Lawhorne and wives and Mrs. Robert Marsden, Jr., have gone to Brewster Valley, near Roseburg, to spend a couple of weeks camping and in quest of deer and fish.

W. J. Conrad and others will leave in a day or two for Curry county to spend a week.

J. T. Hall, Arthur Williams and Master Tom Patterson will leave today or tomorrow for Myrtle Point from whence they will go into the timber for a week or more.
