### Dry Milk, the New Food.

It is a well-recognized fact that the curse of milk is water. This is not said facetiously, for while we shall speak later of what is sometimes called the baptism of milk we now allude only to the water which it contains as it comes from the cow. This water, however, is 87 per cent of the bulk, so that it can be seen at once that cow's milk must be considered a highly diluted and therefore correspondingly un-nutritious food.

The fundamental idea of dry milk is simply to remove this 87 per cent of water. The process by which this is accomplished is very simple. The milk as soon as possible after it

comes from the cow—in most cases an hour or two—is passed without preliminary treatment, physical or chemical, except straining, over polished steel rollers in a thin sheet. The rollers are heated to a temperature of 240 degrees Fahr., and the milk remains on them only about two and one-half seconds. It comes off the rollers a dry powder containing less moisture than flour, only 5 or 6 per cent. It is then packed in boxes or barrels and can be shipped far or near as required. Its chemical composition has been unchanged and it will now keep for an indefinite period, or until the addition of water. I myself, have drunk milk more than two years old.

In the first place all germs are killed by the temperature of 240 degrees to which the milk is subjected. The milk itself does not suffer any chemical change, as in the case of sterilization, on account of the short space of time it is subjected to this heat, only two and one-half seconds instead of 20 or 30 minutes. Secondly bacteria develop only in the presence of moisture. It has been ascertained that there must be 15 per cent moisture for the propagation of germs. Now, as dry milk contains only 6 per cent moisture, any germs which may subsequently get into the powder cannot develop; hence the milk keeps indefinitely or until water is again added. We have therefore, in dry milk a food eight times as nutritious as ordinary milk in proportion to its weight, and which is absolutely free from bacteria and will remain so.—From "The Milk-Fed Race Horse" by A. C. Robinson, in the Outing Magazine.

### American Valenciennes Laces.

The triumph consists in the fact that Valenciennes laces, manufactured in the United States, pronounced to be "the equal of any ever produced in the historic lace towns of the Old World," are offered "at much lower prices than it is possible to land the foreign production." The advertisement goes on to say:

"These laces are unique in character, original in design and superior in weave and finish; they are made on the latest constructed lace looms that have the newest improved mechanism, which insures perfect mechanical action and rapidity of movements, the latter economizing labor and reducing the cost of manufacture; these advantages mentioned enable us to offer fine quality Valenciennes laces at the price of medium-grade goods."

Another triumph for protection it might be called, for, without tariff duties levied upon imports of foreign goods, lace could not be produced in this country; foreigners would make all of the laces used.—American Economist.

## GRANT LANDS IS CUT INTO 12,000 LOTS

HUGE TERRITORY IN KLAMATH, MARNEY AND MALHEUR COUNTIES IS NOW OPEN FOR SETTLEMENT — DIVISION PLAN SUCCESSFUL.

Supreme Court of United States Has Passed Upon the Title of the Road Company's Land and It Cannot Be Questioned.

(From Oregon Daily Journal.)

The best part of the Oregon military road land grant, comprising 300,000 of the total of 500,000 acres, is to be thrown open immediately for settlement, and colonization for has already been begun. The Oregon Valley Land company, composed of eastern people, with Portland headquarters at 830 Chamber of Commerce, has perfected a plan of sale of the lands in tracts comprising 11,992 tracts, varying from 10 acres with irrigation to 1000 acres of grazing land.

The company is headed by R. J. Martin of Kansas City, J. H. Borders is secretary, and M. C. Shimp is treasurer. These men are the same who successfully put the largest tract ever opened in Colorado on the market last year in the San Luis valley, and built an irrigation dam 80 feet high, storing water for irrigation of a portion of that tract desired for intensified farming.

### Clear Title to Land.

H. A. Hunter, president of the Oregon Military Land Grant company, former owners of the entire 500,000 acres, returned to Portland yesterday on business connected with the formal conveyance of title to the new company. At the Portland hotel last evening he said:

"The grant, which extends from the Klamath Indian reservation to Lakeview, and thence through Harney and Malheur counties to the Snake river, should not be confused in the public mind with one or two railroad grants that have litigation over titles. This title to the Oregon military road grant is absolutely unquestioned."

"It has twice been adjudicated by the supreme court of the United States, which has decided that its validity cannot be challenged. The grant was passed from the government many years ago without and strings to it as its sale, the price at which it should be sold, or any other complication.

### Seek New Industries.

"The plan adopted by the colonization company is unique, and has been found successful in putting other similar tracts upon the market.

"That the company has great confidence in southern Oregon climatic conditions and the soil of the lands to be opened to settlement is shown by the fact that they are offering to any one who will make an investigation and show that their printed literature for settlers contains any misrepresentations regarding the lands. The lands comprise alternate sections in a strip 12 miles wide through Lake and Harney counties and a portion of Klamath county. These lands are to be divided into 5974 10-acre farms, 4,980 20-acre farms, 1020 40-acre farms, 500 80-acre farms, 400 160-acre farms, 12 640-acre farms, and six 1000-acre farms.

### One Uniform Price.

The contracts for farms sold to settlers are certified by the Pioneer Trust Company of Kansas City. The uniform price of each farm, regardless of size, is to be \$200.

Each 10-acre tract is to have 5 acres of irrigated land. The sum of \$200,000 to be held in trust by the Pioneer Trust Company will be devoted to construction of an irrigation system taking water from the Cottonwood river to irrigate about 30,000 acres in the Goose Lake valley.

"There are irrigation projects under consideration by the company in other valleys," said Mr. Hunter, "including Sprague river valley, Drew's valley and Catlow valley. But these are on a limited scale. The largest irrigation project, and one that will be immediately developed, is already

surveyed, and will take water from the Cottonwood river, upon which is located one of the best reservoir sites to be found in the country. It is a natural reservoir, and with small expense can be made to store sufficient water to serve all the grant lands. The survey was made by an engineer of the Oregon Short Line.

### Generous Rainfall.

"The average precipitation in Lake county exceeds 23 inches, and last year it was 27 inches. These lands are capable of producing good crops whether irrigated or not, although irrigation of course increases production. The plan of settlement is the largest colonization plan ever undertaken in Oregon, and will be an important movement toward development of the state."

The colonization of the grant is guaranteed to be complete by the fall of next year. Growth of the city of Lakeview, county seat of Lake county, is expected to result from the settlement of the grant. Lakeview is located about the center of the lands to be sold, and is now a town of about 1600 people. The company, which owns the surrounding lands, has platted an addition of 11,992 lots and will give a lot free with each farm sold in the grant.
