

MERRY END OF CHERRY FAIR

The third annual Cherry Fair is now a matter of past history—a proud and important bit of history it is. Salem has once more sustained her reputation as the Cherry City of the world, and every citizen within her borders has reason to feel justly proud.

The 1908 fair was a success from start to finish. More cherries and better ones were shown than ever before. More time, money and labor were spent upon the celebration than in any previous year, and never before have the results so justified the work of preparing for Salem's great annual event extraordinary.

The last day of the fair surpassed both the other days in the number of people and in enthusiasm. All day the streets were crowded with visitors to the Cherry City, and from early morning until midnight the cherry pavilion was thronged with admiring spectators, among whom were numbered horticulturalists of national reputation from every section of the country. Every authority, no matter where he hailed from, was of the same opinion; that Salem is without a rival in the cherry-producing world, and that such an exhibition of the lucious fruit as was displayed here during the three days of last week would be an utter impossibility in any city outside the Willamette valley.

Nor should the side issues in the great celebration be forgotten. It was the idea of the committee from the first that the fair this year should be lacking in nothing which would tend to enliven the interest of the visitors and of the Salem people also, and furnish wholesome amusement for them during every minute of the reign of King Bing. To that end there was added to the 1908 fair one of the best carnivals that has ever been held in the Cherry City. Besides going to the expense of engaging a professional carnival company, the amusement committee worked night and day for three weeks preparing the local mirth-producing features of the carnival. That they were successful to a degree far exceeding the general expectation, is the verdict of everyone.

The comic parade of Saturday evening reflects great credit upon Cook Patton and his faithful co-workers. It was without exception the best thing of its kind that the sightseers at a local celebration have yet witnessed.

There is no need to describe in detail the final parade of the carnival. Every feature was a gem, and was enjoyed to the utmost by the thousands that lined the streets. The Chinese with their three floats, carried off the prize offered by the committee for the best attraction in the procession. The Japanese were close seconds, and it is only to be regretted that a dozen more prizes could not have been given for the

numerous features of the big parade. The Cherry Fair closed with the Mardi Gras, and merriment reigned until midnight. The multitudes left feeling that the 1908 fair was an event which they could by no means have afforded to miss, and wishing God speed to the Cherry City of the world, and success to the celebration in 1909.

TALKED PAVING

And Other Topics of Municipal Importance.—Col. Hofer of Salem Addressed Commercial Club.

(Corvallis Times.)

"The increase in the value of abutting property resultant from street paving is double the cost of the paving," was the statement of Col. E. Hofer, premier of civic development in the Willamette valley, made before the Corvallis Commercial club at a numerously attended meeting Tuesday evening. He spoke from actual observation in Salem, in which he was a moving spirit. He said more, to-wit: That the actual sales of property at the higher figures resultant from paving will in two years pay for the paving, and leave in the hands of owners the unsold property with its higher values. About 100 Corvallis clubmen heard the address, and were much interested in the statements. About \$3.28 per square yard is the acknowledged cost of paving. Salem first land 1,000 feet of paving, and abutting property at once began to soar. The farmers' coming to town took pains to drive over it. The effects was so marked, that other stretches of streets have been added to the paved column, until the city is fast taking on the air of a metropolis.

Col. Hofer's address was along the lines of civic pride, and public improvement. He pleaded for the best possible school conditions, insisting that it was a means of attracting the best population. He advised Corvallisites to vote right in the school election to take place next month, in which the question of adding other high school grades is to be decided. The address occasioned much favorable comment, and unquestionably set many citizens to thinking seriously along the line of public endeavor.

At the meeting, provision was made for the appointment of a committee of three to take up the matter of securing the erection of additional dwelling houses in town. The personnel of the committee has not yet been announced by the president of the club.

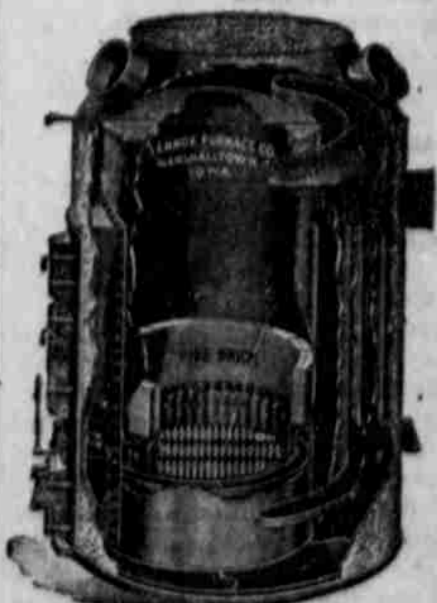
