WARNED TO PROTECT FORESTS

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, July 22.—Gifford Pinchot, chief forester of the United States, went to Berkeley today after making an appeal to the people to protect the watersheds of the states and stop ruthless destruction of forests.

Declaring that the question of allowing a giant monopoly of the power interests in the United States will come before the people next winter, Pinchot warned California that such a combine must be prevented. He said the monopoly will be of such proportions that the Standard Oil company would look small beside it.

After a visit to Berkeley today Pinchot will depart for the east tomorrow.

BAN ON HERDS IN LA GRANDE STREETS

(La Grande Observer.)

It is entirely probable that after the next meeting of the city council no stock of any kind will be allowed to be herded in any of the streets or alleys of the city, or upon any vacant lots in the boundaries of the city without the express permission of the owners of such lots, and then only if the stock is in charge of some person sufficiently strong and mature to prevent straying or damage by the stock. Of course, the ordinance proposed does not prohibit the driving of animals from place to place, but its main object is to absolutely prevent the staking or herding of cows, etc., on the streets and alleys. An ordinance embodying these provisions was read the second time last night, and would in all probability have been placed on its

final passage had not Councilman Monroe arisen to ask how old a person is considered by the ordinance to be competent to care for stock in the city.

As a result of the discussion engendered by this question, the ordinance was referred back to the street committee, and will come up for final passage, possibly in an amended form, at the next meeting.

A Wall Split To Stop Vibration.

In order to set at rest the complaints of the inhabitants of adjoining houses, a remarkable engineering experiment has just been carried out successfully by a power company occupying a house in the Rue St. Roch. This house, like many old buildings in Paris, did not have side walls of its own. These walls, constructed of heavy masonry, were shared with its neighbors to the right and left.

As a result the three adjoining buildings were practically one. By the same token the engines in the power-house sent their thud and vibration through the entire mass, keeping neighboring tenants awake and driving away trade.

A master quarryman who happened to be visiting the manager of the power-house accidentally heard of the complaints and at once proposed a remedy—to isolate the three buildings by splitting the connecting walls from top to bottom. He was used to such operations in his quarries, and he proposed the use of an endless helioid cord such as is commonly used in exclusive stone-sawing operations.

The suggestion was adopted and has just been executed with perfect success. A perpendicular slit two inches wide and 70 feet deep now completely isolates the power-house. Tenants of the neighboring houses

say the noise and vibration of the power-house engines have completely disappeared.—Paris Correspondence New York Times.
