SMITHSON MARVEL OF TRAINERS NO EFFORT TO WIN

SHERMAN MAY QUIT THE RACE HEALTH IS BAD

WILL BE OPERATED UPON AND RESULT WILL DETERMINE COURSE—EAST AND WEST MAY CLASH OVER SUCCESSOR.

Washington, July 24.—Although there is strong opposition from the party leaders today to the withdrawal of James S. Sherman from the second place on the Republican ticket, it is understood that his health is so poor that he will be forced to drop out of the race.

In the event that Sherman declines the nomination the national

committee will be compelled to fill the vacancy. This will cause complications as New York might claim the place while the west and middle west would be sure to fight for the right of succession. As soon as he is strong enough Sherman will undergo an operation at John S. Hopkins hospital in Baltimore. His condition after this operation will determine whether or not he will remain in the race.

Hitchcock Denial.
Chicago, July 24.—Frank H. Hitchcock, chairman of the Republican national committee, today positively denied that there is the slightest possibility of James S. Sherman, nominee for vice president, retiring from the race on account of illness. He said that Sherman's condition is not such as to warrant the making of a move and asserted that stories published to that effect were without any actual foundation.

Cheyenne, Wyo., July 24.—Before departing for their homes today members of the executive committee of the National Wool Growers' association, which met here yesterday, announced their intention of breaking up the wool trust. The committee will meet again Aug. 25 at Salt Lake City.

At its next session the committee will lay plans for a national warehouse, storage and market movement. The scheme will be started on a large scale and the committee men express themselves as confident of its success. By establishing market centers at Chicago, Denver, St. Louis and St. Paul, the wool growers hope to eliminate profits of middle men.

MARATHON RACE WON BY HAYES OF UNITED STATES

ITALIAN IS SHOVED ACROSS THE LINE FIRST BY CROWD BUT IS DISQUALIFIED—MAKES GOOD TIME.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
London, July 24.—John F. Hayes, of the Irish-American Athletic club of New York, was declared winner of the marathon race this afternoon by the judges, who upheld the protest against Dorando, of Italy, who crossed the line first.

Hefferon of South Africa was given second place and Forshaw of the Missouri Athletic club, third.

It was proved to the satisfaction of the judges that Dorando was assisted across the finish line. Hayes, in winning the great marathon race today defeating 80 contestants representing 15 nations, having covered the course of 26 miles and 38 yards, in 2 hours, 54 minutes, 36 seconds.

Dorando of Italy was the first to actually finish, but the Americans protested Dorando's victory, alleging that the crowd closed in on the track at the finish and that he was actually assisted across the line.

The marathon race at Athens in 1906 was won by Sherring of Canada in 2 hours, 51 minutes and 23 3-5 seconds.

Soon after it was announced that the judges had declared Hayes the winner of the great race, a protest was filed against him on the charge that he too received aid at one point near the finish.

The finish of the Italian's great run was dramatic. He fell five times in the last stages of the race and each time was lifted to his feet and urged on by his friends. The fifth time he fell directly in front of the royal box and Queen Alexandria rose and waved encouragement to him. He then was within ten yards of the tap. His friends all quickly rushed to him, gave him brandy, lifted him to his feet and literally pushed him over the finish line, where he then fell in a dead faint. He soon was revived and supported by Hayes, Hefferon and Forshaw, was led to the royal box where he was introduced to the queen.

PORTLAND DOCTOR IS ARRESTED

Dr. Courtney has been attending the convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians here and intended to visit at Chicago before returning home.

FOURTH SECURES TROPHY

LEADS THIRD REGIMENT BY 50 POINTS—SALEM MEN LOSE—FERGUSON WON INDIVIDUAL CONTEST.

The team from the Fourth regiment won the governor's trophy in the regimental shoot finished this morning by a lead of about 50 points over the Third regiment. The tournament completed this morning was fought out between two picked teams of eight men each from the two regiments in camp, the trophy contested for being a handsome goldlined silver cup presented by Governor Chamberlain. The complete score has not yet been completed.

The winning team consisted of Lieutenant Potts, Lieutenant Hamlin, Lieutenant Perdem, Private Shields, Captain Houck, Corporal Ferguson and Private Chester Fisher and Lieutenant Stewart. The vanquished team was composed of Corporal Romaine, Sergeant Howard, Sergeant Schwartz, Sergeant Rider, Sergeant R. L. White, Lieutenant Abrams, Corporal Scott and Private Royal.

This afternoon the National Rifle association is holding its contest for medals both with rifles and revolvers which will complete the shoot. The men will leave Camp Ruge tomorrow.

Corporal Alex Ferguson, of the Fourth regiment, Roseburg, won the individual shoot yesterday afternoon, followed closely by Captain George E. Houch, also of the Fourth regiment at Roseburg. The scores were 258 and 254 respectively. Corporal O. P. Romaine of Portland was third with 245.

Last May he mysteriously escaped from that institution, and after wandering about the country for some time he landed in Salem. He went to the home of Mrs. E. S. Berry who lives a short distance northeast of the asylum, walked in and made himself at home. Mrs. Berry intended to keep the boy, but he was so incorrigible that the lady could not manage him.
