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ACHIEVEMENTS OF SIX YEARS.

Now that we are told that as a necessary preparation for a revival of business, we should cultivate the habit of talking prosperity, it may help us to a more cheerful view of the outlook to take account of these gains to the United States for the past six years in the processes of trade and the administration of business. The Wall Street Journal has prepared the following list which indicates a movement upward rather than down:

1. A most remarkable extension of publicity in the departments of transportation and industry.
2. The abolition of the pass.
3. The doing away of most of the evil of rebating and secret discriminations.
4. The exposure of corrupt alliances between designing corporations and political bribe takers and blackmailers.
5. A notable advance in the direction of reform of the evil of campaign contributions.
6. The sale of law has been made more odious and dangerous.
7. Corrupt bossism has been overturned in several cities.
8. Equality of opportunity has been widened and strengthened by legislation intended to prevent unfair competition.
9. The danger of a too powerful financial concentration has been met by creating an adequate sovereign to the federal government for the great interstate corporations.
10. A notable advance has been made in the standards of trusteeship.
11. The administration of the

great insurance companies has been reformed.

12. For the first time in the history of the New York money market a comprehensive weekly statement of banking conditions has been established, giving to New York a preeminence in this respect over every other international market, and thus laying the foundations for the building here of the world's biggest money reservoir.
13. An improvement of the banking laws of the state of New York, particularly in the strengthening of the trust companies.
14. The growth of public sentiment for reorganization of the currency system of the United States, for the accomplishment of which a commission has been appointed.
15. There has been a wonderful extension of temperance so that a large section of the territory of the country is now under laws prohibiting or strictly limiting the sale of liquor.
16. Race track gambling, which like lotteries was formerly respectable, is now like lotteries, coming under the condemnation of an aroused public conscience.
17. Sectional antagonisms have so far disappeared that "the solid South" has been broken.
18. The South has undergone what amounts to an industrial birth with enormous possibilities in prospect.
19. There has been a stupendous electrical expansion. Electricity has been applied on quite an extensive scale to the railroads of the country, and the steam locomotive has practically been eliminated from Greater New York.
20. The steel car is replacing the old wooden car and gradually the steel or cement tie is taking the place of the wooden tie.
21. A powerful movement for the improvement of the national waterways has been started with every prospect of great results.
22. Aggressive measures have been taken for the prevention of the waste of the natural resources of the country, particularly the forests.
23. In the steel trade the open hearth process is rapidly replacing the old Bessemer steel process.
24. Development of new sources of supply is making for the cheapening of copper, now so essential for the expansion of civilization.
25. Wireless telegraphy has been a marked advance in the selection of seeds, thus making for a greater production, while irrigation is steadily adding thousands of acres to the productive lands of the country.
26. Wireless telegraphy has been made a commercial fact thus adding to the facilities for communication.
27. Laws have been enacted to prevent adulterations of drugs and foods, thus promoting the health of the people.

A method of preventing the waste of competition has become more generally recognized at the same time that the courts, the legislature and the executive have enforced measures for the prevention of oppressive monopoly.

This long list of gains which may fairly be put down as to the credit of the past six years, probably omits many things which might justly be included in such an enumeration, but however inadequate it may be, it is sufficient to show an enormous advance has been made during that time. If any of these gains have in their achievement contributed in any way to social unrest and business unsettlement, and thus contributed to the making of financial panic, may it not be fairly said that, however immense the cost, the gains are well worth the price paid.

RABBITS NO LONGER ONLY A PEST

Washington, July 24.—A few years ago one might read of the scourge of rabbits in the western states—an increasing horde of buntings that ravaged the country, ate all the green things, and made life miserable for the settler. The Department of Agriculture not so many years ago issued a bulletin, with some scientific hints as to rabbit extermination, and told graphically of the rabbit hunts, or round-ups, wherein the citizens of perhaps several counties got together, built a big trap, and then chased Br'er Rabbit in a fast-enclosing circle, until he ran into the corral, where he was slaughtered by the thousand with clubs. Br'er Rabbit was a destroyer and a liability—hot an asset.

But in these progressive days, Tasmania, one of the British colonies, has found a way to make Bunny a good cash asset. He is trapped, split open, frozen, and shipped all the way to England, where his fur is not unacceptable. In 1906, \$2,391,563 in frozen rabbits were exported to England together with \$2,323,510 in rabbit skins.

Consul Henry D. Baker, speaking of the Tasmanian rabbit industry declares that the trapping gives employment to a very large number of men, and that complete freezing plants are in operation at Hobart and Launceston, for preparing Bunny for export.
