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ANTI-JEW RIOT IN LONDON

RESERVES CALLED

MOB TRIES TO ATTACK NEPHEW OF DIAMOND KING—HAD PROSECUTED TRIAL OF BLACK-MAIL.

London, July 30.—Twenty-five thousand people engaged in a monstrous anti-semitic demonstration outside the Bow street police station today, cheering Robert Slevier, who was acquitted of the charge of attempting to blackmail J. B. Joel, millionaire nephew of the late Barney Barnato, the diamond king. Joel is a Jew, and this seemed to be the only provocation for the demonstration. The mob tried to reach Joel as he left the building, and fought with the guards, who, after a hard struggle, succeeded in getting the man out of their reach, and hurried him to a place of safety.

The infuriated crowd then began attacking innocent Jews, who had gathered merely as sightseers, or through a racial interest in the case. Many Jews were knocked down and beaten, and some received severe injuries. Hundreds of police reserves were summoned from all the nearby stations, and it is believed if they had not arrived quickly the attack would have taken an even more serious turn. The police rushed through the crowd, forcing the mob back, and compelling its members to disperse by using their clubs freely.

Joel's suit against Slevier aroused great resentment because of the alleged racial feeling, which is said to have been a factor in the events leading up to the charge of blackmail. When the decision was announced, Slevier left the court room, and the crowd made a wild demonstration of approval. They rushed upon Slevier and he was nearly crushed by the people who sought to shake his hand. The demonstration is considered by the authorities to have a most serious aspect, owing to the display of racial hatred.

HEARST IS SEVERLY CENSURED

IN AN AFFIDAVIT

ACCUSED OF "PACKING" CONVENTION—ALSO "CZARISM"—BRYAN COMPARES PLATFORM OF INDEPENDENTS.

Chicago, July 30.—Charges of czarism are made against William Randolph Hearst, in his conduct of the Independence party convention at Chicago, in an affidavit made today by Joseph T. Marshall, of Plymouth, Neb.

The affidavit declares the belief of the affiant that the Independence convention was "packed," and charges that the platform as adopted by the committee was changed before it was presented to the convention.

The charges have aroused great interest here.

Stolen Planks.

Fairview, Lincoln, Neb., July 30.—There were no visitors at Fairview this morning. Bryan was working early on his analysis of the platform of the Independence party. He dictated the following statement today:

The platform of the Independence party contains a number of planks identical or substantially the same as some of the planks of the Democratic platform. It demands the election of United States senators by a popular vote, as the Democratic platform does. The tariff plank is quite like ours. The plank relative to trusts, while opposing private monopoly, is not so specific as ours. The railroad plank does not differ from the plank in the Democratic platform on the same subject. The plank on Asiatic immigration is quite similar to the plank on that subject in the Democratic platform. The labor plank is also like ours.

Bryan pointed out other similarities in the two platforms. In discussing what he terms the shortcomings of the Independence party platform, the Democratic candidate said:

"The platform of the Independence party does not, however, advocate the establishment of a department of labor; it does not propose imperialism, and its plank with reference to the publicity of campaign funds is not nearly so strong as ours."

"This question must confront every member of the Independence party—will he assist in the defeat of the Democratic party, which stands for so much that he favors, merely because he cannot get all that he would like?"

"Either the Democratic or the Republican party must win. The voter who prefers the Democratic platform to the Republican platform, and joins the Independence party, merely assists the Republican party in defeating several reforms in which he is interested."

"The question is not whether one can get all the reform that he wants, but how he can get the most reform."

BILLEK MAY GET FREEDOM

SURPRISE SPRUNG

STOMACH OF MAN HE IS SUPPOSED TO HAVE POISONED IN HANDS OF CHEMISTS—ESCAPED MANY TIMES.

Chicago, July 30.—A sensational turn was given to the famous Billek case today, when it was learned that the coroner of Dupage county had secretly exhumed the body of Henry Niemann, the late father-in-law of Mrs. Emma Vrzal Niemann, one of the three survivors of the Vrzal family, six members of which Billek is accused of having poisoned.

It was learned here today that the stomach of the dead man had been turned over to two chemists of the Northern Medical College, who are now trying to find traces of poisoning.

Billek's friends declare that upon new evidence that will be adduced the mystery of the poisonings will be cleared up, and that the supreme court of the United States will grant the prisoner the right to a new trial.

Billek was convicted of the murder of Mary Vrzal, daughter of Martin Vrzal, in 1905, and four times has been in the shadow of the gallows. He was sentenced to be hanged October 11, 1907, and the date had been postponed three times since then. November 8, 1907, April 29, 1908, and June 12, 1908 were set as days upon which he was to die, but in each case a higher court intervened to save his life.

On June 12, Judge Landis decided that the prisoner had the right to appeal to the supreme court of the United States, under the provision of the constitution that forbids the execution of any man as long as there is doubt as to his guilt, and the hanging was postponed until the day the appeal had been taken. The news of the stay of execution came just as Billek was ready to begin the death march to the gallows.

Billek's friends, chief of whom is Father O'Callaghan, superior of the Paulist fathers of this city, having gathered together a mass of evidence to present to the supreme court.

Jerry Vrzal, one of the survivors of the family, has signed an affidavit stating that his testimony at the trial was untrue and forced from him by the police and public prosecutors. Six of the jurors who found Billek guilty have signed affidavits stating that they would not have convicted the man had it not been for Jerry Vrzal's testimony.

Coroner Mather said this afternoon that the exhumation of Niemann's body is the result of the investigation being conducted by Billek's friends, who are confident that the condemned murderer will secure another trial.

SEATTLE CASHIER ARRESTED

FOR EMBEZZLING

ACCUSED OF THEFT OF AMOUNTING TO \$48,330—ADMITS TAKING SUM AND SAYS HE USED IT UP.

Seattle, July 30.—R. F. Parkhurst, first assistant cashier of the First National Bank of Seattle, has just been arrested on a charge of embezzlement of the sum of \$48,330. Parkhurst was arrested on a warrant from the United States district attorney's office, charging him with falsifying the accounts of a national bank.

Parkhurst gives practically no reason for his desire to get away with the funds of the bank, and when asked what he had done with the money said he had lived it up.

Some of it has been invested in real estate, however, and this has been turned over to protect the bank, which, in addition to the \$20,000 bonds, sustained the bank against loss.

Parkhurst has been a trusted employe of the bank for 12 years. The discovery of the defalcation was made about two weeks ago, as a result of the auditing of the books. The cashier had charge of the balancing and checking up of the balances with Eastern banks, and it was in these accounts, it is claimed, that he began to doctor the books, especially in the business done with Chicago and New York concerns.

At no time did he take any very large amounts, most of them being of a few hundred, up to \$2000. The bank officials fail to understand how the examiners could get through the books without noticing that they had been tampered with.

M. A. Arnold is president of the bank.

Parkhurst is 45 years of age. He has been in Seattle for more than 24 years, and lives with his wife on Union street.

Neither Parkhurst nor his wife are prominent society people, living a secluded life.

INJUNCTION SECURED AGAINST LUMBER TRUST

St. Louis, Mo., July 30.—A suit to restrain a gigantic merger of lumber companies throughout the United States into a \$300,000,000 combine to control the yellow pine industry was brought in the circuit court today by Attorney-General Hadley, of Missouri.

Judge Kinsey issued a temporary order restraining the organization of the proposed combine. The case was set for hearing August 17.

The attorney-general claims to have received information that preparations have been completed for the organization of the great yellow pine trust, and that the promoters are ready to put it into operation.

Hadley took his action today on the theory that the alleged monopoly could be opposed better by an act of prevention than by an attempt to dissolve the merger if it had been formed.
