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### PLACE OF RECREATION FOR THE SOLDIERS

During the encampment at American Lake, Washington, the Young Men's Christian associations of Oregon, Washington and Idaho will conduct two large tents which will be for the use of the enlisted men and officers of the regular army and national guards. One tent will be used for correspondence, reading room and recreation. The other will be for entertainments and meetings in the evening. Free stationery will be furnished by the association, bearing the camp letter head, and postage stamps and postal cards will be on sale. The tents will be equipped with phonographs, pianos, etc., and will be open to the use of all. Entertainments will be arranged for in the evenings, using local talent from the regiments and several addresses will be given by the leading men from the cities of the northwest. The same features were conducted two years ago and proved very popular among the men. The tents were well filled during the evenings and other times, when the men were not on duty. The general orders this year are very strict as to men leaving the camp, so the association tents will provide a good place for leisure hours. A cordial invitation is extended to all enlisted men and officers to make use of the features provided.

### WORKMEN FIND WALK BUILT 30 YEARS AGO

While digging the holes for the new line of telephone poles on Liberty street yesterday morning, the workmen discovered an old sidewalk at the corner of State and Liberty streets seven feet below the surface of the ground.

The telephone company and the workmen were at a loss to account for the relic until Sir White, an old resident of Salem, explained that about 30 years ago the grade in that vicinity was some ten feet lower than it is at present.

In the early days a swale ran up Liberty street to States, and then turned in a north-easterly direction, originating near the present site of the state fair grounds. The swale was filled with water most of the year, and the sidewalk was built along the bank. The boards were in a very decayed condition, and one peculiar feature about the walk is that no nails or spikes can be found, although parts of the sidewalk have been unearthed in several places. It is thought that the boards and the stringers were held in place by wooden pins.

## COOS BAY BOOSTERS ARE BUSY

(Coos Bay Times.)

According to the inspector in charge, the dredge will be completed by August 5. Ten days are allowed for equipping with provisions, men, etc., and for trial test. It should be ready to be taken in tow about the 15th of the month. An additional amount of piping has been ordered, and it will have enough to carry the dredgings 4000 feet. The new dredge is a fine piece of machinery with wonderful power. It can handle 6000 cubic yards of ordinary earth in a day. In soft mud it will handle 7000 to 9000 yards. A system of fencing to hold the silt and mud is used whereby anyone who does not desire his low land filled can have it left a kind of hole in the ground.

Sec. Walter Lyon of the Chamber of Commerce brought the above information with him on his return from Portland today. He is greatly pleased with the outlook of affairs in general and while in Portland and other northern cities found great interest in Coos Bay, many expressing their intention of coming here soon to look the country over with a view of locating or investing.

### Senator Fulton to Be Here.

Making all allowances, the government dredge should be in the bay by the opening of the fair. Senator Fulton has been invited to be present upon the arrival of the dredge and to attend the fair, and has accepted the invitation.

### Foreign Ships.

T. S. McGrath of the McGrath shipping firm, would have been here by the last steamer but for his being called away to the sound. He will be here within a few days to make arrangements for wharfage and warehouse facilities. His vessels have an average draught of 23 feet.

### The District Fair.

The coming fair and commercial congress is attracting considerable attention on the outside. The present indications are that there will be an aggregation of horses and of other live stock that will mark an era in the stock business of southwestern Oregon. Independence, Polk county, will send down four years. Reams of Seattle will have a string here. Fred Merrill of Portland, will ship some from his stables. A. C. Ruby, the importer will have stock at the Marshfield fair. Roseburg will be over in full force with horses and cattle. The time is at hand for every citizen of Coos county to put his shoulder to the wheel in making an unparalelled success of the fair. It means much for this section.

### A Novel Plan.

Of no less importance is the commercial congress to be held in conjunction with the fair. A week before the congress opens, a delegation will start from Salem and hold a series of booster meetings, having the final one here. Representative E. F. Jones, Col. Hofer, Oswald West of the Railroad Commission, and Attorney General Crawford will be among the delegation. The second meeting will be at Albany, next at Eugene, then Cottage Grove and Roseburg, coming from the latter place to Coos Bay. At each point the party will be joined by other boosters and the prospects are that the commercial congress will be one of the memorable development meetings of the state.

### Bankers Victorious.

In an exciting game of baseball on Willamette field last evening the Merchants were vanquished by the Bankers to the tune of 6 to 5. The game lasted only five innings and was a good exhibition from start to finish. The Merchants started off with a good lead, and kept it until the fourth inning, when the Bankers smoked up and tied the score.
