ARGUE CASES IN THE SUPREME COURT

The cases of the state against Ju Nun for murder, and J. W. Reed for election frauds were argued yesterday in the supreme court.

Ju Nun, a Chinaman, was arrested in January, 1906, charged with murdering Lee Yick Lee in Portland, and was convicted by the Multnomah county circuit court of manslaughter, and sentenced to 15 years in the penitentiary and \$15,000 fine. The defense alleges errors in that the information was not based on oath or affirmation, and also that the jury was not properly drawn.

Reed was convicted in the Multnomah county circuit court for complicity in the Sellwood election frauds several years ago. His attorneys allege that errors were committed in certain remarks of the court during the trial.
