The only interesting features are the crop reports. From New York state heavy showers are reported from all sections which will undoubtedly have a good effect on both the quantity and quality. The vine is reported to be entirely free from vermin and promises a fairly good yield. Mail advices from Oregon are most satisfactory, the hot weather having checked the lice and honey dew and previous estimates of 100,000 to 110,000 bales are unchanged. From Washington and California we hear the crop continues satisfactory, with estimates unchanged. From England all prospects point to a very good crop both in quantity and quality and the continental reports could not be better. CHICAGO FIREBOAT SUNK—THREE FIREMEN HURT Chicago, Aug. 4.—The fireboat Illinois was sunk and three men probably fatally hurt today by the collapse of a wall of one of the big elevators destroyed in the \$1,500,000 fire, which started yesterday in the Burlington route transfer house. The wall toppled over while the firemen were playing streams of water upon it from the boat. They saw their danger in advance, as the wall wavered, and all jumped into the river and swam for their lives. Three were struck by parts of the falling wall and were dragged ashore in a serious condition by their comrades.

FOR VALLEY CIRCUIT— JOIN THE COMBINATION

An amateur racing circuit composed of all the leading towns of the Willamette valley is being planned and its organization now seems assured. A meeting will be held in Albany August 10, at which an organization will be formed to manage the circuit. All of the cities with good racing tracks are expected to come in to the circuit, which will include Portland, Albany, Salem, Eugene, Independence, McMinnville, Hillsboro, Seaside and Canby.

The initiative for the formation of this circuit was taken by the Riverside Driving club of Portland and the meeting to be held here to perfect the organization has been brought about by Manager B. I. Dassen, of the Albany Commercial club, and D. O. Woodworth, a prominent local horseman, who have cooperated in the plans with A. C. Lohmire of Portland. Each of the cities mentioned above will send one delegate to the meeting here next month. According to plans for the circuit, meetings will be held at each city in the circuit during the fall of each year. That at Salem, would, of course, be held at the state fair, and Seaside is expected to come into the circuit because of the fact that the Linn county fair is held there each year. The schedule of the meets would be arranged to fit in with local fairs and celebrations in each of the cities on the circuit.

That the time is ripe for the formation of a racing circuit in the Willamette valley is conceded by horsemen. There is now great interest in horsemanship and racing, and all of the racing meets which have recently been held in the valley towns have proved successful as entertainment and speed contests and what is more important from a financial standpoint. There are also a number of splendid tracks in the valley now.

To plan for the entertaining of the meeting of horsemen to be held here August 10 to form the new circuit, a meeting of the local horsemen will be held in the rooms of the Albany Commercial club tomorrow evening. Local horsemen have been enthusiastic for such a circuit and the movement for an organization has met with great favor here. S. H. Bailey track at this city is probably the fastest in the Pacific northwest, and Albany will be able to have a splendid meet.
