

MANY IMPORTANT MATTERS ACTED ON BY CITY COUNCIL

Property owners who have been so negligent or so lacking in civic pride as to have their sidewalks constructed by order of the city council, and who further, have refused to pay for the improvement so made, had best beware, for a day of reckoning is coming.

Alderman Stoliz in a vigorous speech against the attitude of some of these property owners, at the meeting of the council last evening, aroused the indignation of the city fathers that the venerable gentlemen determined on the spot to put a quietus on the chronic habit of certain residents of shirking the payment of bills due the city for building their sidewalks.

The city attorneys was instructed to compile a list of the delinquents, and if these citizens do not pay up immediately a lien will be filed at once against their property. The city attorney will report the matter at the next meeting of the council.

The printing of the city charter was postponed indefinitely owing to lack of funds.

The ordinance for the improvement of Winter street was made a matter of special consideration at the next regular meeting.

The city marshal was instructed to serve notice at once on the Portland Railway, Light and Power company to improve its track on Commercial street.

The deplorable condition of the sewers was discussed by Chairman Frazier of the committee on sewers. He stated that the odors from the Court street sewer, where it empties into the river were so offensive that the residents of lower Court street could not tolerate the condition any longer. The city engineer was instructed to investigate the matter and report at the next meeting.

The report of the license committee recommending the granting of a liquor license to Nusbaum was adopted. The chief of police was instructed to investigate the objectionable pictures displayed in several of the saloons in the city.

J. H. McNary was invited to address the council on the matter of the paving on State street. He said that under the contract with the Warren Construction company the company was entitled to payment for 80 per cent of the completed improvement. This, he said had not been done. This, however, was not the fault of the city, as the funds at present were insufficient to meet the payments. He suggested that the council draw a warrant for the full amount due the company. This, he said, the Warren people could use as collateral at the banks, and it would enable them to proceed

with their work. This scheme has worked successfully both in Portland and Eugene.

The motion by Councilman Stoliz that the balance of \$2037 be transferred from the general improvement fund to the State street improvement fund was carried. He then moved that a warrant for this amount be drawn in favor of the Warren Construction company. The motion was carried. The report of the city engineer showed that the amount due to the construction company up to August 1 was \$23,309.20. A warrant for this amount, less the sum that has already been paid, was ordered drawn.

The application of A. E. Parker for \$5000 of city bonds was referred to the committee on current expenses with power to dispose of any or all of the city bond. It is understood that the Warren Construction company has agreed to take all the bonds recently issued by the city.

On motion of Councilman Millard the city engineer was instructed to establish a grade on D street from Capital to Twenty-second street. The engineer was also instructed to investigate the grade on East State street.

Council Frazier moved that the shade trees on State street, that were an obstruction to the paving on that street be removed. The motion was carried.

On motion of Councilmen Eldridge all employees of the city were granted a 15-day vacation without loss of pay.

Warrants for the salaries of the city officers and for various bills against the city were ordered drawn.

The specifications for the laying of the new railway track on Commercial street were adopted.

A resolution to require the Oregon Electric railway company to bring their track on Broadway flush with the established grade on that street was adopted.

Specifications for the improvement of North Winter street were adopted; also the specifications for a sewer in block 38.

The report of the poundmaster showed 41 arrests, 15 dogs impounded, dog licenses and fees \$144.25, amount collected from billiard tables, \$60.

An ordinance regulating theaters and amusement places was read for the first time. The ordinance provides that these buildings should have an open court leading to the street or alley, which shall be kept unoccupied, that they shall have lights and exit signs displayed at the doors, and various other innovations. The ordinance was passed to its second reading and referred
