Begin Sidetrack—The construction of the sidetrack on High street between the Oregon Electric depot and Ferry street was begun yesterday.

Sends Self to Asylum—A peculiar incident is attached to the commitment of James Caruthers to the asylum Saturday. Caruthers went to the asylum and applied personally for admission, on the ground that he was insane. He was referred to Judge Bushey by the authorities, with the recommendation that he be committed.

Partition Suit—J. H. Howell and F. F. Howell have filed a suit in the circuit court against Amy M. Howell, et al., for the partition of a piece of property belonging jointly to the plaintiffs and defendants in the case.

Team Runs Away—While passing the sash and door factory of A. M. Hansen yesterday, a Spaulding Lumber Company's team became frightened and started on a wild run up Mill street. The driver was thrown out and quite badly bruised. The team collided with a fence a few blocks up the street, where they were caught.

Another Version—There have been several accounts printed of the accident that occurred out east of the penitentiary, but it seems none of them were exactly

right. Mrs. C. J. Ramsden, who was hurt, says she waved to the auto, but it kept coming right on until close in front of her horse. The animal jumped sideways into the ditch, and threw her out. She has been laid up for a week from her injuries, which were quite severe, and she is positive the machine never stopped until she struck the ground. Mrs. Ramsden says she can verify this by eye witnesses, like Governor Chamberlain and Mr. Bellamy, a neighbor, who came along.

F. A. TURNER IS APPOINTED REPORTER
Frank A. Turner, a well-known attorney, of this city, and a candidate for representative last June, was today appointed to succeed Judge R. G. Morrow. Judge Morrow has been elected judge of the circuit court in Multnomah county, and was compelled to resign because of his new duties as judge.

Morrow has been reporter for 16 years, and has issued more volumes of the Oregon reports during his incumbency than all of his eight predecessors combined, having issued 27, to 22 issued by the others.

Supreme Court.
Motion for rehearing in the case of Francis I. McKenna vs. the City of Portland was overruled by the supreme court today. The decision finally makes valid the \$5,000,000 bond issue for municipal improvements voted by the people of Portland a year ago last June.

T. J. Luper was denied a rehearing on the charge of perjury on the grounds that the defendant had been pardoned while the motion was pending.

Conviction of Joe Young attempted murder of Kaeser Van Dram, in Portland some time ago, was affirmed. Young is serving a six-year term in the penitentiary at present. Van Dram afterward committed suicide.
