AIRSHIP BEGINS

ON LONG FLIGHT

Berlin, Aug. 4.—Count Zeppelin, in his monster dirigible balloon, was sighted over Strassburg today, five hours after he left Lake Constance, in an attempt to remain in the air 24 hours.

The mammoth ship made a perfect ascent, sweeping gracefully into the air, under perfect control. The count waved to the crowd below as he steered the balloon into its course northward. It was his intention to follow the Chaffhausen-Baale course along the Rhine. The test of flying 24 hours is being made under the requirements of the government, which may buy the balloon. Imperial ministers and military experts were present to see the ascent.

Zeppelin intimated that he will start on a time endurance test as soon as he completes the 24-hour voyage, if it is successful.

Refused Commission—The railroad commission has received a letter from A. F. Wilson, of Imbler, Oregon, stating that he has been overcharged to the amount of \$72 on a shipment of potatoes, by the O. R. & N. company. The potatoes were shipped from Imbler to Butler, Missouri, and the contract rate was 40 cents per cwt. When the bill was presented, however, the rate charged was 80 cents. The company admits the overcharge, but claims that an error was made when the contract was quoted. Wilson insists that 40 cents is the correct rate.
