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CANDIDATE KERN.

The nomination by the Democrats at Denver of John Worth Kern for the vice presidency is simply additional proof that the American people will not consider that office in the light of its real importance.

A point of vantage—and every such point assuredly they need—was placed within the grasp of the Democrats, when the Republicans at Chicago, with indefensible scant consideration of their duty to the party and the nation, tossed the second place as a sop to the reactionaries and consented to the placing of an unworthy candidate on the ticket with Taft.

With Bryan's nomination assured, it would seem that all sane Democrats should have seen the value of the opportunity presented by the Republican blunder. There was the chance to shine by contrast with Sherman. An A B C understanding of common-sense politics would have caused all the party leaders to concentrate their efforts upon the selection for the vice presidency of a Democrat of national standing and high repute.

It is idle talk to say that Gray and Johnson would not accept the place. Neither could have resisted the call of the whole party had it been properly presented. Aside from those men, however, how effective would have been the contract with Sherman of a Culberson or a Dalaiei, a Folk or a Douglass, a Chamberlain or a Howell. Even the gigantic Ollie James, of Kentucky, would have been a picturesque and appealing personality and a candidate who has

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had at least a few fleeting glimpses of national affairs during his service in congress.

Grant was right, however. His words are as true now as when he spoke them: "You can always trust the Democratic party to make a fool of itself."

The chance to take a position of great political advantage was tossed away. The obvious strategy of the hour was disregarded. The opportunity was there for an act of breadth and wisdom which would have impressed the country. But there was also an opening for a petty play for the electoral vote of a single state. The result was the nomination of Mr. Kern.

In consequence, some 80,000,000 of Americans, who have not been blessed with residence anywhere between South Bend and Evansville, are asking in various degrees of wonderment, that range from polite indifference to profanity: "Who is Kern?"

After diligent investigation we learn that Mr. Kern is a product of Kokomo.

Mr. Kern's achievements in statesmanship consist of a seat in the Indiana legislature and two defeats for governor of his state. In Kokomo he has the reputation of being a great campaigner. The first time he ran for governor he was beaten by 25,000. The second time he was beaten by 84,000.

He is a Democrat of unquestionable regularity. He was an ardent supporter of Cleveland and the gold standard. The moment Bryan was nominated in 1896 he became an equally fervent advocate of the 16-to-1 theory.

He is a total abstainer from drink and a bitter opponent of every proposal for local option or any legislative restriction of the saloon.

His personal habits are above reproach. Yet he is the devoted friend of Tom Taggart and the lawyer who protects the interests of that eminent Indiana statesman when there is danger of interference with the faro and roulette industries of the Democratic national chairman's French Lick properties.

There is no doubt about Mr. Kern's "regularity"; no doubt that he will be backed by the Indiana machine; no doubt that Tom Taggart's handy man will help Bryan in that one state more than would a Democrat known outside of Hoosterdom, whose acceptance would have carried the message that Bryan had grown and developed so that the nation need no longer dread his success.

The selection of Kern does not mitigate the Sherman blunder. It simply equalizes the errors. It offers the alternative of a subversive machine man who has had some experience of national affairs or one who has not even the merit of that knowledge.

To the extra-Indiana portion of

America the nomination is of importance only in so far as it tends to emphasize the truth that the sole question before the country is the comparative extent of trust in one of two men—Taft or Bryan.

FUNDS FROM NATIONAL FORESTS.

Announcement has just been made of the amounts which each state containing national forests will receive under the new law giving 25 per cent of the gross receipts from forests to these states. The total amount to go to the states, from the receipts of the fiscal year which ended June 30, is \$447,063.75.

The amounts to go to each state or territory are: Alaska, \$2,684.78; Arizona, \$42,610.44; Arkansas, \$312.68; California, \$52,427.78; Colorado, \$50,955.67; Idaho, \$56,307.84; Kansas, \$643.55; Montana, \$75,807.41; Nebraska, \$2,249.77; Nevada, \$4,577.95; New Mexico, \$25,464.12; Oklahoma, \$554.48; Oregon, \$22,313.52; South Dakota, \$8,456.60; Utah, \$32,151.02 (including Uinta Indian refund of \$5,348.07); Washington, \$18,032.79, and Wyoming, \$41,402.38.

The law requires that this money be expended upon public roads and schools by the counties which contain national forest land. In this way the counties are compensated for the reduction of taxable area brought about by the existence of the forests.

Before this year the states have received 10 per cent of the gross receipts, but congress voted last winter to increase the amount to 25 per cent.

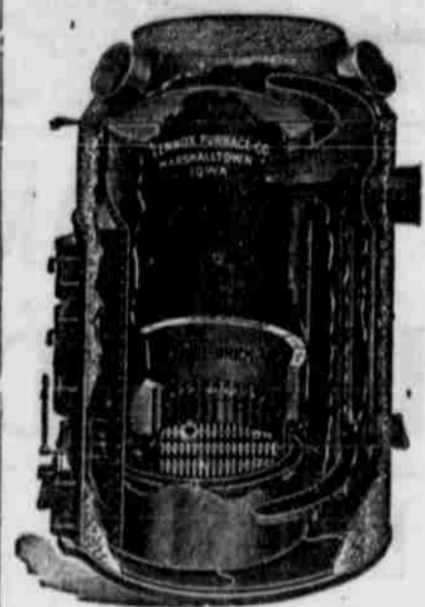
