LUMBER MILL IS BOUGHT BY EUGENITES

Purchasing the Corvallis Lumber mill a few weeks ago from Allen & Buoy, the Sunset Lumber Company, of Eugene, yesterday sold the mill, the purchasers being Dr. T. W. Harris and H. C. Mahon, of Eugene, and Glenn Bassett, superintendent of the Booth-Kelly mill at Springfield. Mr. Mahon is president of the Sunset company. The Sunset people acquired the Corvallis property at what was considered a low figure, and it is said sold for a splendid profit. The figures are not given out for publication. E. O. Samuels, superintendent of the Sunset company's mill and one

of the principal stockholders, is now in Corvallis attending to the work of getting the mill in shape to operate to its full capacity. It has been operating on a small scale for a week or more. Mr. Samuels will remain in Corvallis for a month in charge of the property, until the new owners are prepared to take full charge. The new owners intend to soon increase the capacity of the mill from 30,000 feet of lumber per day to 50,000 feet. Mr. Mahon who owns a third interest in the plant, will still retain his interest in the Sunset company's mill, although the two will have no connection with each other so far as ownership is concerned. Mr. Bas-

sett is one of the best sawmill men on the coast. He will be manager of the new company.
NEW HATCHERY ON COQUILLE.

H. C. McAllister, who recently succeeded Mr. Van Dusen as the master fish warden of the state of Oregon, is on Coos Bay getting in touch with local conditions. He came up yesterday from the Coquille and announces that he has decided to replace the temporary hatchery on the Coquille with a permanent hatchery, making it one of the best in this section.

The decision of Mr. McAllister to make the improvement on the Coquille will be gratifying to fishermen in this section as it will mean the providing of more young game fish for the streams in this section. With the ever increasing number of fishermen in this section, the streams are getting pretty well depleted. The Coos river hatchery, it is said, has furnished many young fish for the Coquille.

Visits Coos Hatchery.
Mr. McAllister visited the Coos River Hatchery and is pleased with the work that Superintendent Frank Smith is accomplishing there. The damage which the Coos river hatchery sustained in floods during the past year is being repaired and everything points to another successful season at the hatchery.

Mr. McAllister also visited with Deputy Game Warden Cal Wright and is pleased with the manner in which Mr. Wright is enforcing the law. Mr. McAllister aside from his official position is an enthusiastic sportsman and keenly resents the actions of would-be sportsman in violating the laws and regulations made for the benefit of all.

Mr. McAllister is on a general tour of the state to familiarize himself with conditions. He had not been on Coos Bay for four or five years and was greatly surprised with developments here since his last visit. The manner in which is taking hold of his new duties is gratifying to all who are interested in it either from a mercenary or a sportsman's standpoint.

PENDLETON WHEAT

SELLS AT 75c.

Wheat is now 75 cents in the local market, and there were many sales yesterday. It was the liveliest day with the wheat buyers since Saturday. This was probably due to the jump of two cents which occurred in the quotations, the price up to yesterday having been 73 cents.

It is estimated that at least 100,000 bushels of wheat were sold yesterday. It was all in comparatively small lots and was from all sections of the country. Furthermore, nearly all of the local buyers shared in the buying.

At present there seems a tendency to sell at the high prices being offered. Though some growers say they will hold for an advance, the most of them seem to be willing to let go at 75 cents rather than risk a decline. Accordingly to the buyers the most of those who refuse to sell their wheat now do so because they are not yet far enough along with threshing.

ANOTHER RAILWAY FOR NORTHWEST

(Cleveland Plaindealer.)
The announcement was made yesterday by B. F. Horner, general passenger agent. The growing industrial importance of the northwest, he explained, calls for aggressiveness. Considering that railroads have abandoned many foreign agencies lately and have been slow to branch out in any direction, this move is viewed as a good sign of the times.

The promotion of Bonn gives the proposed invasion more significance. He is one of the best known passenger men in the country. He has been chief clerk here over six years but prior to this service was twice the head of passenger departments. For two years he was general passenger agent of the Jacksonville & St. Louis.

In 1902, when the Burlington absorbed the Jacksonville line, Bonn was offered a place as district passenger agent. He preferred, however, to chance his future as right-hand man under Horner. Prior to his connection with the Jacksonville & St. Louis, he was general passenger agent of the Goodrich steamboat lines at Chicago.

Bonn began at the bottom round as a clerk in the general offices of the Burlington road. He was later made chief clerk of F. C. Donald, when the latter was general passenger agent of the Chicago & Atlantic, now the Erie. His next position was special agent of the passenger department of the Santa Fe and chief clerk of that passenger department. This work took Bonn all about the country.

When Donald became commissioner of the Central Passenger association he picked Bonn as his chief clerk. In that capacity he had charge of all joint tariffs and thus learned well the rate end of the passenger game. This and other technical experience has served Bonn and the Nickel Plate well, especially under requirements of the Interstate commerce commission.

"I regard him as capable of filling my position or any other of the kind," said Horner yesterday referring to Bonn.

Bonn has many friends in this city. He has been active in behalf of the Cleveland passenger committee, of which he was chairman and secretary in 1905, and helped organize the Transportation club.

O. F. Thompson, chief rate clerk in the Nickel Plate passenger department, will succeed Bonn as the chief clerk.
