HARRIMAN SAYS TAFT OR BRYAN

ELECTION MAKES NO DIFFERENCE

Ogden, Utah, Aug. 6.—The coming presidential election is of no great importance. It makes no difference whether Bryan or Taft is elected," said Edward H. Harriman, who is on his way today from this city to his camp in Oregon. "The Republican politics are the same as those of the Democrats. We will plant soil and harvest the crop, and prosperity will be the same under either administration. The natural resources of the country are too great to permit an election to affect the general conditions." Harriman said the country needs a censorship of newspaper articles on corporations. "All newspapers are unfair to the money interests," said the railroad king. He said that any talk of his forming a combination with Gould was foolish. Harriman looks ill and worried. He realizes his condition, and said that he has worked hard and deserves a rest, which he intends to take. In concluding the interview Harriman said: "This country is approaching a normal condition, but the railroads are making no improvements."

POLICEMAN ACCUSED BY GIRL

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 6.—As she was being rushed to the hospital early today, after taking a deadly dose of strychnine poison, with suicidal intent, pretty Claire Prage, a maid employed at a fashionable apartment house, told a pitiful story of having been betrayed by Policeman M. E. Dowell, and as a result the police commissioners are today making an investigation into Dowell's actions. The girl declared that the officer entered her room at the apartment house and insulted her. She said he had threatened to reveal information to her employers concerning her past life, and that she was helpless in his power. After telling her story the girl lost consciousness, and now lies on a cot at the hospital, unable to add further details to her story. Policeman Dowell declares that he was sent by a superior officer to investigate the girl, and that he entered her room to put her under arrest. When she learned of his purpose, he says, she seized the poison and took it before he could prevent her.

EXPOSES ARMY OF ROUMANIA

Vienna, Aug. 6.—Military circles are startled today by the results of an investigation following a report from Major Sturdza, the premier's son, charging shocking immorality, drunkenness, reckless extravagance and gambling among the officers of the Rousmanian army, and utter inefficiency throughout the rank and file. When the young major made these astounding declarations some time ago, the ministry immediately ordered a general inspection, and the findings of the commission delegated to investigate amply bear out the charges. Discipline in the army appears to be entirely lacking. There are practically no regular drills, and the accounts of the commissariat reveal extensive frauds. The officers in command having filled their pockets with public funds. As a consequence of his remarkable disclosure Major Sturdza has been called upon by a score of army officers to fight duels. He has vanquished several of his antagonists.

to help build this road, 'Will the smelter go in?' If we are sure of that—and we ought to have some pretty good assurance—we can help. As it is, the road ends nowhere. All the money spent is thrown away. We want to be sure we throw away no more of the county's money on such things. I am satisfied if those mines are worked great returns will come out of them and if the smelter goes the taxpayers would be satisfied to uphold us in almost any extent that we helped bring that about. It has been hinted to me that that is all a stock-jobbing operation to sell the mines. I do not take any stock in that. At the same time let us be careful, and the smelter people and the mine-owners should get together and show this court that they are acting in good faith and have actually entered into a contract to erect a smelter in the Gold Creek district. After the encouragement we have received today I would not be afraid to act. But I speak only for myself." County Commissioner Beckwith: "The county judge has expressed my sentiments exactly. It is a business matter with us, and we are not acting for ourselves but for all the taxpayers. Personally, like the judge, I would be glad to help the enterprise, but we must have assurances and some guaranty that the smelter is going in." In conclusion County Judge Bushey suggested that the smelter people and the mine owners make a showing to the legal adviser of the county court, the district attorney, as to their contract, and let it be brought before them as a matter of record.

The wagon road must be completed, the power plant installed, and then the smelter would be built at once. President Hansen Talks. It cost three or four times the cost of a drill or dynamo or sawmill to pull it in over the trail. We have done 1100 feet of tunnel work, have put in an electric drill, and can do no more.
