**Real Estate Transactions—**  
J. R. Shepard, real estate man and horticulturist of this city, who recently dissolved partnership with J. F. Holder, will remove his headquarters to Portland in the near future and deal in North Bank realty. Friends of Mr. Shepard in this vicin-

ity will regret deeply the loss of one who has been so prominent a booster for Salem and vicinity. Mr. Shepard was one of the prime movers in the recent Cherry Fair enterprise and won more individual prizes than any one exhibitor.

**Funeral of Pioneer—**  
The funeral of Henry Allen, a well-known pioneer of Marion county, who died Friday afternoon, was held at his home in Silverton at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, Rev. F. Bandy of the First Unitarian church of Salem officiating. Mr. Allen was one of the best known and respected pioneers of this section, having lived continuously in this county since 1832. He was born in Tennessee, June 6, 1823. He crossed the plains to Oregon in 1843 and for a time engaged in mining. He was married February 14, 1852, to Miss Francis E. Rockwood of Pike county, Illinois, and in the same year came to Oregon and settled in Silverton. Mr. Allen leaves his widow, Mrs.

Francis E. Allen, and three sons and two daughters; Timothy D. Allen of Silverton, R. D. Allen, Salem; Harvey L. Allen, Missoula, Montana; Mrs. Mascher and Della Allen of Silverton.

**Making Cheese—**

Manager Page, of the General Electric, was present, and made an extended statement of the situation, and it was deemed best to make a further showing of the people to be served out that way, and a census will be taken. The local committee made reports and showed progress.

Otto Hussaby and Chris Johnson, the two Swedes who were arrested Thursday, charged with pilfering a house on the corner of Perry and Front streets, were discharged Saturday afternoon, because the owner of the property refused to prosecute them.
