### WHITES BUYING IN THE UMATILLA RESERVATION

If the government continues to issue patents to Indian allottees at the rate they have been granted during the past year, the Umatilla reservation will soon pass into white ownership.

Since Major A. E. McFarridge took charge of the affairs on the reservation he has secured over 100 patents for Indian allottees. In most cases the allottees have been mixed bloods, and their allotments have varied in size from 40 to 160 acres.

It will be nine years yet before the Indians are entitled to their patents in the regular course of law. The allotments were made in 1892 and it was specified that patents should not be given the Indians for 25 years.

Many Are Self-Reliant. But by the terms of another law Indians may be given their patents at once provided they are capable of handling their own affairs. The agent is the judge of their powers in that line, and it is for him to say whether or not they shall be given the absolute control of their property.

Before the agent asks the department to give an Indian a patent he must first post a notice of his intention to do so and allow it to stand for a period of thirty days. The notices are posted on the bulletin board of the agency.

Whites Get Land. In the majority of cases Indians who get titles to their land sell their allotments to white men, or else lease the land to them for a long term of years. Many such sales and

### GERMANY'S FLOWER CITY.

Erfurt, a thriving commercial city of Southern Prussia, with more than 100,000 inhabitants, is known throughout Germany as the "flower city." It has a world-wide reputation for flower and farm seeds and plants, the trade in which the consul portrays as follows:

The declared exports of the products to the United States in the last ten years amounted to \$561,741, last year's shipments being worth \$52,588.

The origin of the industry dates from the tenth century, and it was developed by the monks of the Peters Monastery. The growth to the present large proportions is of much more recent date. Since 1880 the business of raising flower and garden seeds and plants in Erfurt has increased rapidly, until a quarter of a century ago. When the land failed to produce good wine grapes the people turned their attention to the seed industry as a means of saving their waning fortunes. In former years the hills about Erfurt and Jena were famous for their vineyards. The wine was sold mostly at Weimar, about halfway of the distance between those two cities, giving this place its original name of "Weinmarkt," which was changed later to Weimar.

About 2000 acres of land in the city and the immediate vicinity are devoted to gardens. This land is owned by the crown, the city and private individuals. It is leased to the various concerns at rentals depending on the location and on the productiveness of the soil. Owing to the rapid growth of the city, which rivals the percentage of a Western "boom" town in the United States, quite an area of the best garden land has been platted into city lots and is fast being covered with the fine villas and houses.

The cultivation of the gilly flower in Erfurt dates from 1810. It first appeared in the window of a citizen, and from this one pot hundreds of thousands of these flowers have been propagated. The estimated annual production is 680,000 plants. To the same extent, or nearly so, is the cultivation of the calceolaria, verbena, petunia, gloxinia, zinnia, pansy, carnation, balsam, phlox, hollyhock, pelargonium, fuchsia, azalia, etc., in almost endless variety. It is estimated that the annual output of flower seeds is not much under 1,000,000 marks (\$238,000.)

Vegetable and farm seeds are cultivated in large quantities and in great variety. Among them are included 101 kinds of peas, 163 of beans (700 bushels shipped this year to Boston to help make up the deficit in its staple food.) 249 va-

rieties of kitchen herbs, 35 kinds of radishes and 30 of other roots, 34 of onions, etc., 55 of grass for fodder, 30 of clover, 320 species of potatoes. There are 1542 varieties of vegetable seed cultivated in Erfurt.

### Chicago Draws Inspiration From Gary.

Gary, the new steel city on Lake Michigan, celebrated the opening of its harbor recently. The first steamer loaded with ore from the mines in the Lake Superior region entered the docks. Thus was given a demonstration of the directness with which the raw material can be secured for the Gary mills to be transformed into finished steel products to be shipped by rail or water to any part of the United States. Nobody doubts that the United States Steel Corporation has shown admirable judgment in building this city to reduce to the lowest figure the cost of the steel which it manufactures.

Gary is only 27 miles southeast of the central business district of Chicago. Though situated in another commonwealth from either an industrial or a financial point of view it is a part of the Chicago metropolitan district. When the desolate sand dunes along the Grand Calumet river blossomed into this vigorous new city another element of greatness was added to the order city, a little farther up the lake on the Illinois shore. This very satisfactory condition of things, however, brings new obligations to Chicago. The Illinois city must be progressive in a large way if it is to grip to itself permanently the mighty young industrial communities which are growing up within its sphere of influence.

For Chicago these marvelous new growths, of which Gary is the most striking example, are at once an inspiration and a warning. As the chief expression of all this intense activity it must live up to its opportunities and responsibilities. Chicago citizens must be progressive along lines which stand for greatness of thought rather than greatness of monetary gain. They must see that they are well governed and that their city grows in grace along with growth of population. It has gone far beyond the point where beauty and comfort profitably could be sacrificed for sordid ends.

Chicago welcomes Gary into the fullness of its coming prosperity. In extending this welcome Chicago realizes that it must look to itself in order that it shall not fall behind in manifestations of civic greatness, which alone render it worthy to be the metropolitan center for so deserving a young city as Gary.—Chicago Daily News.

### Ferns Used to Preserve Food.

Consul-General Richard Guenther of Frankfurt, advises that a newspaper of that German city states that the fern plant, which grows almost everywhere, is an excellent preservative for packing articles of food, fruit, etc. A summary of the article follows:

"People who have lived in England know that the English have used it successfully for many years. Valuable fruit, fresh butter, etc., are no longer seen in the English markets packed in grapevine leaves, but always in fresh fern leaves, which keep the articles excellently. This is done where grapevine leaves are to be had in abundance. Every one posted well in botany knows the high preservative power of fern leaves with reference to vegetable and animal substances.

"On the Isle of Man fresh herrings are packed in ferns and arrive on the market in as fresh a condition as when they were shipped. Potatoes packed in ferns keep many months longer than others packed only in straw. Experiments made in the same cellar showed surprising results in favor of ferns. While the potatoes packed in straw mostly showed signs of rotting in the spring, those in ferns were as fresh as if they had just been dug.

"Fresh meat is also well preserved by fern leaves. It would seem as if the highly preservative qualities of fern leaves are due to their high percentage of salt. No larvae, maggots, etc., approach ferns, as the strong odor keeps them away."

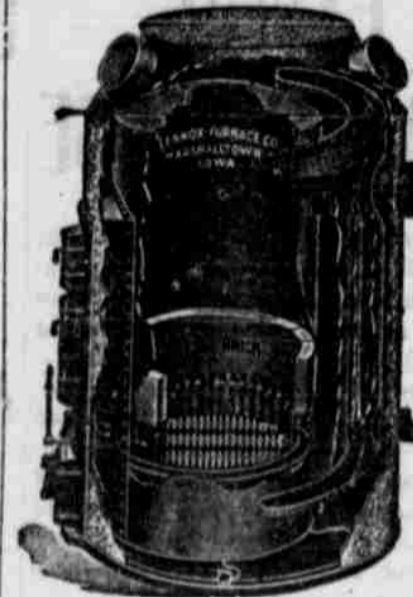
