## "TEMPTED BUT NOT FALLEN;" WHIPPED MINISTER'S DEFENSE

Hurlock, Md., Aug. 10.—The Rev. Stephen D. Shipman, pastor of the Washington M. E. church, who was beaten almost into insensibility by Thomas Carew, when attacked in a room with Mrs. Carew, announced today that he will make his defense on the ground: "That the woman tempted me, but I am innocent."

After the beating Shipman, fearing Carew would return and kill him, spent the night in a corn field. The minister says he will sue for damages, and will tell the following story on the witness stand:

"I went to the home with Nathan Todd, Mrs. Carew's father, about 8 o'clock in the evening. Upon retiring I was given the room usually occupied by Carew. After I had fallen asleep I was aroused by a hand upon my face. I was astounded to find Mrs. Carew sitting upon the bedside. I protested against her presence, and insisted that she leave at once, but she replied:

"Oh, won't you love me; won't you pray for me?"

"I insisted that she must go quickly, and avoid a scene. She arose

**KILLS WIFE WITH BLOW OF SPADE**

San Francisco, Aug. 10.—With her skull crushed by a heavy spade, the wife of Peter Panassou, a dairyman, was found unconscious today at her home on the San Bruno road, south of this city, early today, and died four hours later. Her husband is under arrest, suspected of having murdered her in a quarrel. When taken into custody by the police he admitted he had a dispute with his wife, but declared he was not aware she was dead.

Three children of the couple told a policeman their father was frequently in the habit of beating their mother and them, also. When their parents engaged in a quarrel here late last night the three children ran from the house. They stayed away several hours, secreted in a field near the ranch house.

When they timidly crept back at dawn they found the unconscious form of their mother stretched upon the floor of the kitchen. Her body was lying in a pool of blood, and a gaping hole in her head showed that she had been the victim of violence. A heavy spade spattered with blood lay beside her.

The father was not to be found about the ranch. As the horses and milk wagon were gone it was presumed he had started upon his delivery route. The police later found him in the city delivering milk to his customers, and placed him under arrest.

After the children gave the alarm Mrs. Panassou was rushed to a hospital, but died soon after arriving there. Her skull was found to be badly shattered.

Detectives have subjected the husband to a severe "sweating," but he steadfastly denied that he struck his wife with the spade, and asserted that he knows nothing of how she was killed.

## SHIP'S TIMELY RESCUE SAVES MANY LIVES

London, Aug. 10.—The timely arrival of the British steamer Imogen saved from death many passengers on board the Dutch ship Amstelland, which caught fire off the coast of South Africa on August 6, according to a message received by Lloyd's agency today. A number were drowned, but exact details are not given.

The passengers of the Amstelland were in a wild panic, and many more undoubtedly would have jumped overboard and drowned if the Imogen had not appeared just in time.

Life boats were lowered from the Imogen, and most of the passengers from the Amstelland were taken aboard the Britisher, while the fire fighting apparatus was transferred to the endangered ship, and assistance given in fighting the flames.

The fire was extinguished without serious damage to the Amstelland, and, after the excitement passed, the passengers were returned to the Dutch ship, which was able to proceed on its voyage. The main danger was in the panic, and it is believed if none of the passengers had jumped there would have been no casualties.

**Brown Returns**

A. L. Brown returned yesterday from the California line, where he went to meet Supreme Chief Ranger J. J. O'Grady, of the Foresters of America. Mr. Brown accompanied the dignitary as far north as Salem. Mr. O'Grady went to Portland, and this afternoon returned to the capitol, where inspected several of the state buildings. He will leave for Portland on the Oregon Electric this evening.

**Boiler Explosion.**

York, Pa., Aug. 10.—An explosion in the boiler room of the York rolling mills here this afternoon killed six and injured 25 employes, completely demolishing the large milling plant. The bodies of the dead have been recovered, and the injured are now under medical attention at various hospitals in this city.
