### HARRIMAN INVASION IN MEXICO

Mexico City, Aug. 10.—An effort is being made today to confirm a rumor to the effect that E. H. Harriman, the American railroad king, has applied for the transfer of a concession now held by Col. W. C. Greene for the building of the Rio Grande, Sierra Madre & Pacific railroad. It is understood Harriman's application is now before the Mexican government, and that action may be expected at any time.  
 Harriman's supposed purpose in thus invading new Mexican territory is said to be the obtaining of an eastern outlet to the United States by way of El Paso for the Cananea, Yaqui River & Pacific system, which the Harriman interests are building in Western Mexico.  
 The proposed extension will cross the Sierra Madre to Tonichio, Sonora, where it will connect with the Cananea branch of the Cananea River & Pacific system. The estimated cost of construction is \$5,000,000, gold.  
 By this new line Harriman will be a direct competitor with the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient line, now being built across the same stretch of country.

### GOULD AND HARRIMAN

MAY NOT HAVE JOINED  
 Oakland, Cal., Aug. 10.—The announcement today that the agreement between the Southern Pacific and the Western Pacific, as to the use of tracks on First street, had been abandoned by the Western has caused much speculation as to whether Gould intends to really compete with

Harriman in this state, in the face of his recent agreement with the railway king in the East.

The Western Pacific and Harriman lines entered into a bitter controversy when the Gould line first entered Oakland, as to the right of way on the water front. After several suits in the federal court and some gas play by the forces of the two roads on the water front, it was announced that both roads would use the Southern Pacific tracks on First street.

Now comes the Western Pacific and says that it will not live up to the agreement, but will seek another street for its tracks. The agreement with Harriman called for the Western Pacific to give up the rich ferry and freight traffic. Gould decided that he wants a slice of this business, and may be a serious competitor of Harriman for trans-bay freight and passenger traffic.
