Upon the petition of the residents of school district No. 107, the district boundary board yesterday added 30 sections of timberland to the district. District 107 is in the eastern part of Marion county on the north fork of Silver creek.

The addition will enable the residents of the district, which heretofore was a very small one, to levy taxes and erect a suitable school building to take the place of the inadequate one now in use.

The new county bridge across Butte creek near Martin is almost completed. The piers are of concrete, and support a 100-foot span.

When completed the structure will be one of the finest in the county.
