

BREWERS OBJECT TO THEIR MONEY GOING TO Y.M.C.A.

San Francisco, Aug. 15.—The Young Men's Christian Association of this city and the Brewers' Protective Association have locked horns over the recent proposal to give to the former organization a surplus of \$4728 left from the fleet reception fund. The war is at its crucial point today, and action of the fleet reception committee is expected to bring the matter to a settlement.

When it was discovered, after the departure of the Atlantic fleet, that several thousand dollars were left in the treasury of the entertainment fund, it was suggested by Chairman Frank J. Symms, of the committee,

that the amount be given to the Y. M. C. A. for the naval club house established by that organization.

Immediately upon the publication of this plan the brewers became interested. The association contributed largely to the reception fund, and they did not propose to have any part of their money used for the advancement of a society that is considered antagonistic to their interests. They sent an urgent message to Symms, asking the return of the association's pro rata of the surplus money. This matter Symms now has under advisement, and his decision is awaited with great interest.

BIG EXPENDITURE ON JAP ARMY AND NAVY POSTPONED

Tokio, Japan, Aug. 15.—As the result of a secret conference between the new cabinet, the premier and ministers of war and navy, it was announced today that it has been decided to postpone the expenditure of \$50,000,000 on the army and navy from next year until 1911. This move is in line with the economical policy of the new cabinet.

The determination to expend \$50,000,000 in the development of the army and navy was reached immediately after the war with Russia, and the plans contemplated beginning the first of next year.

Industrial conditions in Japan do not warrant the expenditure of such a sum at the present time, and it is understood that the new cabinet plans to effect all retrenchment possible, without standing in the way of the nation's advancement.

The new order will mean the delay of many plans which already have been practically completed for the construction of new warships, and the improvement of naval bases. It also checks the extensive plans practically under way for increasing the efficiency as well as the size and strength of the army.

ROBBERS HOLD-UP TRAINMEN AND RUN OFF WITH ENGINE

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 15.—Armed citizens, led by deputy sheriffs, are covering much ground today in their search for the bold robbers who held up a train crew of a Northern Pacific passenger train nine miles from Spokane late last night, and ran the engine and mail car to Yardley, in the outskirts of Trent.

The desperadoes, after holding the crew up at the points of revolvers, uncoupled the engine and mail car from the coaches and ran it at a rapid rate down the track, leaving the bewildered fireman and engineer, conductor and passengers behind. A few minutes after the alarm was given officers found the engine and mail car at Yardley. It has not been learned here whether the robbers secured any booty.

PAWNED \$2500 JEWELS FOR PALTRY \$800

New York, Aug. 15.—The police are trying today to discover the identity of a young Brazilian, who, it was learned today, pawned the cross, chain and ring of an archbishop for \$800 two years ago. The jewelry, which is worth \$2500, is believed to be the property of the archbishop of Buenos Ayres. The jewelry was discovered in the show case of a pawn shop at Thirty-fifth and Sixth avenue. It reposes in a pigskin box, marked with the letter "B" in gold.

HEIRESS OPPOSES RELATIVE

Pittsburg, Aug. 15.—Declaring that she does not believe Moses Phillips guilty of swindling her brother-in-law, Miss Frederica Bosch, the heiress, of New York and Chicago, is expected to leave here today for New York to defend Phillips for his alleged fraudulent action in a gambling game.

It is charged that Phillips swindled Melville Moxley, the young woman's relative, out of \$6000, while the two were engaged in a poker game. The intimation was made that Miss Bosch had supplied Moxley the money, and that it was Phillips's design to defraud her through her brother-in-law.

Miss Bosch, however, has steadfastly refused to believe in the accusations made against Phillips, with whom she is acquainted, and whose integrity, she declares, is unimpeachable. She denies that any transaction such as is declared in the charge against him ever occurred. The heiress will visit him in New York in an effort to adjust the matter.

HANGS BY TOES FOR TWO HOURS

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 15.—Phillip Mosser, Jr., is recovering today from the effects of hanging by his toes for more than two hours. The boy and his brother were working in their gymnasium yesterday, when the latter was called into the house. He left Phillip hanging by his toes from a trapeze. When he returned two hours later he found his brother in exactly the same position, but refused to answer his call. Investigation showed that Phillip's toe had become entangled in the rope of the trapeze, and he had been forced to hang downward until he lost consciousness.

TRIED TO SELL MORTGAGED PROPERTY

After a trip extending over nearly a week, Sheriff Minto returned from Coos county this morning with Chris Grohs, who is charged with larceny by bailie, and who left St. Paul, in this county, on June 8. Since his disappearance from that town the authorities have been on the lookout

for him, but no information as to his whereabouts was received until a few days ago. Minto found the man at North Bend, and at once took him into custody.

The specific charge against Grohs is selling mortgaged property. He has been engaged in the saloon business here and in St. Paul for the past several years. He will be arraigned before Justice Webster some time this afternoon, when his bond will be fixed. In the meantime he is being kept in the county jail.

CHINESE DEMOCRATIC CLUB CAUSE OF MUCH TROUBLE

Los Angeles, Aug. 15.—Anthony Schwamm, chairman of the Democratic central committee, is sorry today that he is the father of the only Chinese political club in America. Schwamm's political offspring has plunged him into a sea of trouble.

Ever since the stories of the Chinese Bryan and Kern club were published in the newspapers throughout the United States, "Tony" has been besieged with letter asking for information regarding the organization. The government has assigned Fred K. Jones, representing the department of commerce, to collect all data relating to the club. The Democratic national leaders are interested and Republican papers have seized the opportunity to print lengthy editorials denouncing the Democratic Asiatic alliance.
