the man's customers. Donegin came to Springfield in 1845. He was a "nothern nigger" and according to his sons was neved in bondage. One of the charges against him was that he practically recold liberated blacks back into bondage by contracting for their labor. Indictment No. 2 against Donegin was that he murdered a white woman. This is admitted by members of his family.

The investigation of the riots here will be a real investigation. There will be no white washing or shaming. This became known today and fear is widespread among the whites who took part in the mobs. The house of the leaders are being searched by agents of Sheriff Werner in an effort to find relics of the destroyed business places as evidence of participation in the destruction. The sheriff said today that he is seeking the best possible men for grand jury service and will summon only those who will be fearless in their action.

A petition for the special grand jury was presented in court today and upon the ruling of the grand jury no one was admitted to the court room except officers of the court and reporters. The petition stated:

"Whereas, Springfield has suffered from lawlessness, a large number of people have been killed and an immense amount of property damaged, and

"Whereas, the next regular session of the grand jury will be held Oct. 15, the reason for summoning the special grand jury at this time is the great amount of work that has accumulated for such a body."

The court ordered the jurors to be summoned to appear in court tomorrow and the work will be started at once.

The Ringling Brothers circus, which was billed to give a performance here tomorrow, was notified today that the engagement would have to be cancelled. The authorities believed the appearance of the circus would have a bad effect.

At noon today the total number of arrests resulting from the riots was 80. The prisoners include ten saloon keepers charged with violating the order to close their places.

Kate Howard, a woman charged with inciting riot, burglary and larceny, was admitted to bail by the court today against the wishes of the authorities, who think she is dangerous to the public welfare.

Governor Deneen and General Young held a conference today relative to the plans for indicting the rioter- and it is known that both favor the more stringent action.

Following the statement of Mrs. Earl Hallam that she could not identify positively George Richardson as the negro who assaulted her, the belief is growing that he is the wrong man. A number of reliable citizens are said to be ready to establish an alibi for Richardson. The negro and his wife have borne good reputations. If he had not been spirited away, he undoubtedly would have been lynched.

BURNING OIL LOSS IN MILLIONS

Tampico, Mex., Aug. 17.—Despite every effort made to stop it, the miniature volcano of burning oil in the San Gerónimo district continues unchecked, consuming more than 100,000 barrels of oil daily. Workmen today are pumping immense quantities of sand and mud into the crater in an effort to abate the flames. Powerful centrifugal pumps have

been installed and are pouring a stream of earth into the vortex, but the fire burns as fiercely as before. Since the well began burning on July 4, more than 5,000,000 barrels of oil have been destroyed. The oil is valued at \$1 a barrel.

HEIRESS MARRIES JAPANESE

Pittsburg, Aug. 17.—Pittsburg society was surprised today at the announcement that Miss Edna May Poenter, a rich heiress of this city, was married to O. Shigetoshi Majima, a Japanese, at a small village near Toklo last Saturday evening. The announcement of the wedding came in a cablegram to Mrs. J. Falston Livingston of Springdale, an aunt of the bride.

Majima comes from a prominent Japanese family. He was educated in Norte Oame, Ind., and entered the Harvard law school from there three years ago. He moved in the best society of Boston and Cambridge and met Miss Poenter who was attending school in Boston.

The young people became engaged and Majima followed his fiancee to this city accompanied by his uncle, Lieutenant Commander

NEGROES ORDERED FROM TOWN

Memphis, Tenn., Aug. 17.—Serious trouble is expected today at Truman, Polkett county, Arkansas, over the importation of 12 negroes to work in yards of the Springfield Lumber company. Last night the white employes of the company and residents of the town declared they would not permit the blacks to live among them and declared they would be driven from the county. With this purpose in mind, a posse visited the camp where the negroes were stationed, but the latter fled.

Governor Pindall has been asked to send troops to the scene and is in communication with the local authorities today to determine the necessity of such action.

JAP NAVY AND ARMY NECESSARY FOR PEACE

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Tokio, Aug. 17.—That the increasing of the military and naval strength of Japan is indispensable to the maintenance of peace in Asia and on the Pacific ocean is the gist of an interview given out by Prince Ito, resident general of Korea, today.

The prince criticises the recent action of the new Katsura government in deciding to postpone plans for the augmentation of the army and navy until 1911.

"It is necessary for Japan to have a great army and a great navy if peace is to be maintained in Asia and on the Pacific ocean," said Prince Ito.

The statesman declared that he considered the reforming of Korea his sacred mission on earth and warned the people against criticism of Japan's methods abroad. These criticisms are superficial he said.

are slipping out of town in much the same fashion as the negroes who are convinced they can never live here.

The soldiers are in complete control of the city and no disorder was reported this morning, except in outlying districts, and this was not of importance.

Special Grand Jury.

Acting under the direction of Governor Deneen, Judge James A. Creighton of the circuit court today ordered a special grand jury to convene tomorrow and take up at once the case of George Richardson, the negro charged with assault upon Mrs. Earl Hallam. It was the Hallam case that started the rioting and the grand jury will begin with it. As soon as the Richardson case is disposed of an investigation to determine who the leaders of the mob were will be started.

Governor Deneen has ordered that the strictest investigation be made and that the grand jury proceed with the precision and swiftness of a military court. He is determined that those who are responsible shall be brought to justice.

Now that the law has regained the upper hand and the fear of the courts has spread through the ranks of the rioters, it is doubtful if any further trouble will result unless through some sudden outbreak.

Demonstration Feared.

Special precaution will be taken today at the funeral of John Colwell, the coal miner who died of bullet wounds received during the rioting. It is believed that the 8000 miners in this district will attend the funeral and a demonstration is feared. The funeral of Frank Delmore, another miner, who died of injuries yesterday, also probably will be the occasion of a gathering of the miners.

Probably one of the first cases to be taken up by the grand jury will be that of Abraham Raymen, a Russian Jew, who has confessed that he was a member of the mob that cut the throat of William Donigan, an aged negro, and bound him to a telegraph pole. He also took part in the lynching of Burton Saturday morning.

The negroes are still making their way out of the city and it is believed that within a week the exodus will have depopulated the negro quarter of the city. The majority of the negroes seem to have accepted the decree that they cannot live here. The racial hatred has become so intense that it probably will not be safe for a black man to appear unprotected in this city for months to come.

Was Lincoln's Bootmaker.

Springfield, Ill., Aug. 17.—It was learned today that William Donegin, the aged negro lynched by a mob Saturday night, was bootmaker for Abraham Lincoln before the great emancipator left here for Washington to strike the shackles from the ankles of the black race. General John M. Palmer, nominee of the gold standard wing of the Democratic party for the presidency in 1896, was another of the aged negroes of

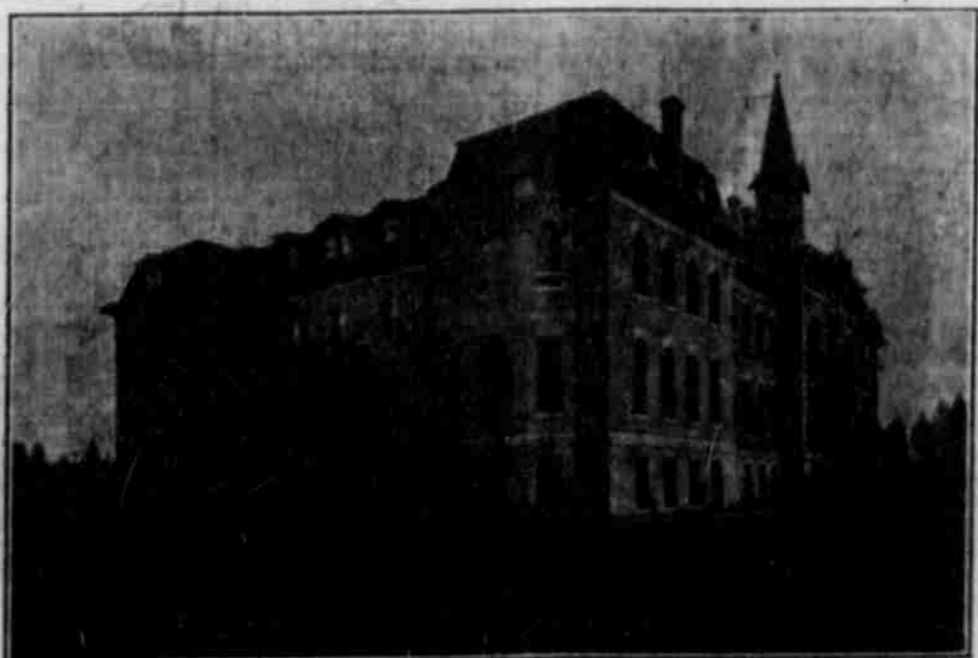
