

# SAYS FARMERS ARE FOOLISH TO PLANT WHEAT

## Says Farmers Should Go Into Dairying and Get Rich Quick, If Not Sooner

J. W. Bailey, of Portland, state dairy and food inspector, was in Corvallis a short time Thursday en route from a trip to Eugene and vicinity, where he was boosting for dairy interests.

While talking of conditions generally over the state, Mr. Bailey touched upon Corvallis and vicinity in particular. He said our farmers are gumps for planting wheat—they ought to be raising dairy cattle, fine sheep and hogs. Perhaps we know that here, but when Bailey says it the statement comes with added force. He insists that the greatest dairymen in the United States, who inspected this section a few years ago, declared that no other place on the globe, not even Switzerland, England or Australia, offers such ideal conditions for profitable dairying. Mr. Bailey insists that the farmers should raise clover, alfalfa, kale and oats, feed skim milk to their calves, and make themselves rich by supplying local creameries with milk. He is not an ardent advocate of new condensed milk plants.

The inspector, in touching upon the possibilities of Corvallis and vicinity, was not slow to proclaim that land here would be trebled in value in 20 years; that we would duplicate the record of Tillamook county, where dairying has made the farmers rich; that the side hills toward the northwest would be great apple orchards; and that by rotation of crops the soil of this valley would be restored to its virgin worth. Mr. Bailey urged that the farmers should awake to the possibilities here, should study how to

make the best use of their land and energy, and to quickly cut out the unprofitable for the profitable. He made a statement that there isn't a wheat farm in Benton county that will not support 100 sheep without additional expense, and he cited the fact that good sheep can be sold for from \$4 to \$15 each if they properly marketed.

Mr. Bailey came from Maine, originally, has been in Oregon 40 years or more. He sees that Hood River, unknown ten years ago, is now known throughout the world in such a way that \$2.50 a box is paid for her apples when eastern apples can be bought for 75 cents a barrel. He sees that Portland has grown from a small town to a metropolitan city in recent years and he notes that Jim Hill's railroad, a great packing plant, and cement plant are going to work further west. He sees the growth of the dairy industry in Tillamook and other coast counties, the progress of Eugene, Medford, and Grants Pass, and he knows that this same progress must also come to Benton and Linn. He knows that no finer sheep are grown in the world than grow here, and he sees trainloads of mutton and wool, hogs, butter and fruit going into Portland to be shipped throughout the world. Seeing these things he can not help prophesying and boosting.

Inspector Bailey holds public meetings throughout the state to urge upon farmers certain things found to be for their good. He will probably hold a meeting in Benton before a great while, and when that time comes every farmer and every business man in the county should hear him.

of this city say they, too, will do everything necessary to push the fair along to a magnificent success. ### SALEM HOP GROWERS ADOPT RESOLUTIONS

"Whereas, it is the sense of this meeting, held at Salem, Oregon, Saturday, August 15, 1908, at the city hall, after a full and thorough discussion of the hop growers' condition and a comparison of that industry with others of similar nature, viz., horticulture, fruit canneries, sawmills, and agricultural industries where wages average 75c to \$1.10 per day for women and as low as 50 cents per day for children, and heavy work for men from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per day, and

"Realizing that hop pickers earn from \$2 to \$4 per day, and that more than one-half of the crop has sold at a loss to the grower for the past three years, therefore be it

"Resolved, That the price for picking the crop of 1908 be 80 cents per hundred pounds, and that field laborers be paid \$2 per day.
