

PINCHOT WINS OUT

AND ISSUES BULLETINS

Washington, Aug. 18.—The forest service comes back strong against its critics in the house and senate in a press bulletin just issued—and one that is backed up by an opinion of the attorney general, by the way.

At the last session of congress the lawmakers threatened to cut down the appropriations for the service because of the so-called "press agency" which Chief Forester Pinchot had been conducting in connection with the forest work. It was freely charged that the service maintained a corps of expert writers, former newspaper men, and editors, who wrote nice little puffs, advance notices, etc., telling what a great organization the forest service was, what a great man Gifford Pinchot was, and what rascals those men were who opposed the forest policy.

To prevent this, the lawmakers inserted a "joker" in the appropriation bill, apparently shutting out the "agency" completely. But the foresters were resourceful. They turned to Attorney General Bonaparte, and now flourish in the faces of carping critics his official opinion that the news bureau—(they call it the Bureau of Information down at the service)—is perfectly legitimate, and right. Congress thought it had stopped all the "press bulletin service" of that branch, but with the attorney general's opinion, the forest service is going right on, issuing a bulletin nearly every day with all sorts of information, from how to cut down a tree to how much alcohol may be extracted from a pine wood chair.

Washington correspondents are real grateful for all the "stuff" that comes in forest service envelopes. If the matter is not available, the back side of the paper on which it is mimeographed makes good "copy" paper.

Congress is likely to become reconciled to the publicity work of the forest service. Every branch of the government has some sort of a press agency for dissemination of information—the only trouble is that the forest service has gone a step further and organized to agency so well that it is now in the highest form of efficiency, so far as distribution of news is concerned.

BRIEF BUT OF GREAT WEIGHT TO U. S.

Washington, Aug. 18.—"Teheran, De Billier" was the text of a cablegram received at the state department a few days ago. It did not look very intelligible or important upon its face but it conveyed to the wise men of the department that Frederic Ogden De Billier, the new secretary of the American legation at the capital of Persia, had arrived safely at his distant post.

Interesting as this might have been to De Billier's personal friends in the District of Columbia from whence he was appointed after competitive examination, it was much more so to the officials of the department. It was the first message that had been received from any of our representatives in the disturbed empire of Persia for at least ten days. The last dispatch that had come through was from Consul Wm. F. Doty, at Tabriz, containing the single word "anarchy." From that time there had been silence, except

for the press messages reporting severe fighting in various parts of the country between the troops of the Shah and the revolutionists.

De Billier's message therefore was welcomed for other reasons than merely the information it conveyed of his safe arrival. It meant two other important things. First, that telegraphic communication was open between the Persian capital of Teheran and Washington, and second, that because of that fact, this government might rest assured that everything was well with the American diplomatic and consular representatives in the disturbed district, because nothing had occurred of sufficient importance to warrant the use of the cables. It thus allayed whatever apprehension there might have been.

In this connection one of the older attaches of the department recalled another cablegram, equally unimportant upon its face, but whose real import was so great as to prevent the partition of an empire and to set in motion the troops of six great powers, the expenses of that movement, taken eight years ago, being still in course of liquidation.

It was during the Boxer outbreak in China in 1900. The rebels were in control of Peking. The foreign diplomats resident there, including the American minister, Conger, were besieged within their legation grounds. Von Kotteler, the German, had been assassinated while riding in the streets. And then for weeks and weeks, not a word came out from the small band of diplomats.

There were plenty of stories about the excesses of the Boxers at Peking and the neighborhood, of their assaults upon the legation buildings, and more than once detailed descriptions of the massacre of every foreigner in the place. One especially horrible story, which shocked the whole civilized world, told with great particularity of how Minister Conger had been boiled alive in oil and how the ladies in the legation compound had been brutally outraged and put to death. On the other hand an occasional message would come in a roundabout way to the effect that the diplomats were still alive but were under siege and were in constant danger of being overwhelmed.

In this state of uncertainty the civilized world was waiting, when Hay, then secretary of state, with Root, then war secretary, concocted a scheme which was carried out with the assistance of Wu, then, as now, the Chinese minister in Washington. They wrote a telegram addressed to Conger. It has been described by those who did not appreciate its real intent as utterly senseless. And so it was, for the Chinese government would not undertake to deliver any message which even remotely referred to the existing troubles, and it had to be colorless to the point of being inane. But it was sent. It was delivered, and in the course of two or three days it was answered. That proved to the world that its diplomatic representatives, imprisoned in Peking, were still alive, though in great danger. Believing that they had been killed, Germany and others had wanted to wait until they could gather a great punitive army of 60,000 men to whip the Boxer rebels and to force reparation from the Chinese government. That army would have taken months to prepare. But just as soon as communication had been established and it was known that the besieged diplomats were alive, the whole civilized world demanded that immediate steps be taken for their rescue. The result was the formation of the joint expeditionary force in which besides the United States, Germany, Great Britain, Japan, Italy and France participated. This consisted of only 17,000 men composed of troops that could be the most quickly gathered for the duty. Their march is history and so is the fact that they had been five days later in arriving at Peking they would have found nothing to save and only the mutilated bodies of their compatriots to bury. But historians have overlooked the important part that was played in this drama by the unimportant telegram which, establishing the fact that there was somebody to be saved, set in motion the army of rescuers.
