SHIP BLOWS UP AND TWELVE ARE INJURED

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Amherstburg, Ont., Aug. 19.—Six men were fatally hurt and six seriously injured today when the dredge boat "Destroyer" was blown to atoms by the explosion of a charge of dynamite. The boat, which was owned by the Sullivan Dredging company of Buffalo, was used in blasting operations in the Detroit river.

The injured men were blown high into the air and fell into the river. Boats put out from the shore immediately after the explosion and rescued the men.
Six of them are so badly crushed that it is not thought they can possibly live through the day.
The "Destroyer" was completely wrecked by the explosion. She was blown into bits of splintering wood.

POLITICAL PRISONERS MUST DIE

St. Petersburg, Aug. 19.—Nineteen political prisoners must die for participating in revolutionary movements. Ten of them are peasants. The sentences of death have already been signed.

URNS FROM PREACHER TO DIVORCE LAWYER

Santa Rosa, Cal., Aug. 19.—After having married couples for many years, when he was a clergyman at Sebastopol, Cal., Rev. A. K. Farnsworth has turned divorce lawyer and is now handling the cases of couples who wish to unite the marital knots that he was formerly instrumental in tying.
His first suit was filed in the court

here yesterday. It is a suit of Geo. McDonald, who has been married for over 30 years and is the father of grown children.
Rev. Farnsworth, who can now either marry or unmarry couples, says that the business of helping mis-mated couples to become separated is as sacred as the business of aiding mated couples to join their lives together.

CLASSIFICATION OF PRISONERS PLANNED

Sacramento, Cal., Aug. 19.—Warden Reilly of Folsom penitentiary, is working on a system of classification by which the prisoners detained there will be divided into three groups, composed respectively of first offenders, medium bad characters and incorrigibles. Each class will have separate quarters and will be kept entirely apart.
By this means, Warden Reilly hopes to bring about a greater percentage of reformations, especially among first offenders. These are

frequently contaminated under the present system by contact with the life sentence men and incorrigibles and become confirmed criminals merely through association.
The reforms at Folsom will be made possible by the completion of new buildings now under construction. A new cell house containing accommodations for 500 prisoners is being built. There will be also a new building for the housing of 200 insane prisoners.

DR. WILEY TO FIGHT FOR PURE FOOD LAWS

Washington, Aug. 19.—"I am enlisted for war and do not intend to lay down my arms until victory, full, complete and permanent has been won," was the announcement with which Dr. Harvey W. Wiley took up his work today in the bureau of chemistry after his protracted absence at pure food conferences in the west.

Dr. Wiley, who is chief of the pure food commission, declares that the interests now arrayed against him will soon recognize the worth of his proposed reforms and will frankly confess they were in the wrong. He says the interests that have thus far failed to acknowledge the truth are the dried fruit dealers of California, certain molasses manufacturers of Louisiana, and the wholesale liquor dealers association.

MINISTER BELIEVED TO BE A SUICIDE
