MOUNTAIN RESORTS BECOME POPULAR

(Pendleton Tribune.)

It is noticeable that the present summer has seen a greater "hegira" to the mountains and different resorts from Pendleton than has ever before been known. This is not that the heat has been greater, but because of the growing custom and additional facilities for reaching them—also, to the added comforts and accommodations afforded above former conditions.

The improvements in conveniences at Wenaha Springs have in one season made it a well-known summer resort and it will hereafter be patronized from all over the northwest. The Lehman and Hiway Springs have also been crowded, while the mountains for a distance

of 50 miles along their summit and well into the foothills on either side are filled with people on their vacations.

In fact, as an enthusiastic Pendletonian said yesterday, "the mountains are lousy with campers."

The time is not far distant when eastern Oregon people will not only not go to the seacoast for recreation, preferring the mountains, which are always pleasanter, but thousands from western Oregon will seek the higher, dryer and more pleasant atmosphere of the mountains of the interior.

The completion of the Wallowa branch of the O. R. & N. in October will place within easy reach of people all over this coast the famous Wallowa lake, which, with the single exception of Crater lake, in Klamath county, is the finest summer resort in Oregon. This lake is a mile wide, four miles long and several hundred feet deep, clear water fresh from the melting snows of the Eagle creek mountains, and with its surrounding hills and timbered peaks, many of them with snow-crowns the year around, presents a picture which even Nature seldom surpasses.

It is at an elevation of 4500 feet and with all its picturesqueness and ease of accession after the completion of rail connections will prove one of the most popular mountain resorts, on a large scale, on the northwest coast.

The town of Joseph is but a mile away, the terminus of the new road, while it is but six miles to Enterprise, the county seat of Wallowa county. The ride from Elgin down the Grand Ronde river to its confluence with the Wallowa, and up the latter, describing two sides of an acute triangle, will afford one of the most romantic railroad rides known in the west. When completed the time from La Grande should not be more than four hours to Joseph, and the traveler from Portland can leave there at 8 o'clock in the evening and arrive at the lake the next day at noon.

For comfort, pleasure, a profitable and helpful change, beautiful and inspiring scenery, a "getaway" from the customs and environments of the city not to be found at the beaches, pure water and good fishing, the inland mountain resorts are bound to attract the crowds in the future—only waiting for the development of a transportation system, already un-
