Two of these switches have already been installed, and everything is expected to be ready for a regular freight business by the first of next month.

GATHERED DATA FOR FINANCIAL MEASURE

(United Press Leased Wire.) London, Aug. 20.—The Aldrich-Vreeland financial commission composed of United States senators and representatives, announced today that they had obtained sufficient data regarding monetary systems of foreign countries and would return to America without investigating in other cities. It was the plan of the commission to tour all the capitals of Europe and make the exhaustive investigations. After their stay of several weeks in London they find they have collected enough data to meet all their requirements and that further investigation would entail useless expense. It was said that nothing will be announced regarding the results of the investigation until a report is made to congress.

LILLIAN RUSSELL MAY MARRY PRINCE

New York, Aug. 20.—Lillian Russell has found a prince. The news leaked out today when the American actress appeared with a string of the most gorgeous pearls seen on Broadway for some time.

Lillian admits it. She says that she met a Greek prince in Paris and that he gave her the pearls and asked her to marry him. As the prince is understood to have plenty of money, the marriage is not an impossibility.

ROOSEVELT WILL SAIL MARCH 7

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Aug. 20.—It is reported here today that President Roosevelt has engaged passage on the liner Celtic which will sail March 7, 1909, for Europe. If this report is true he will remain in the country less than three days after his successor is inaugurated, and will lose no time in starting for the hunting trip in Africa that he has planned.

FAIRLEY TO BE MADE A CARDINAL

(United Press Leased Wire.) Rome, Aug. 20.—It was learned from a high ecclesiastical source that the pope today determined to appoint Archbishop Farley of New York to a cardinalate late in October. This statement is borne out by the persistent rumor that his holiness has reached a final decision after much hesitation.

The changed attitude of the pope, who yesterday postponed the matter indefinitely is not explained, but it is supposed that upon reconsideration he recognized the justice of the claims of the American branch of the church.

RACE TRACK TURNED INTO RESIDENCE DISTRICT

New York, Aug. 20.—The Brighton Beach Racing association's track and grounds are today in the hands of a land developing company and within a week will be in course of subdivision into building lots.

Who are the purchasers of the famous old sporting park cannot be learned, but it is regarded as beyond doubt that control of the property has passed from the hands of the Engeman estate.

For over a week rumors have been to the effect that the last horse race on the track has been run and that negotiations for its sale to a building syndicate were under way, but these were denied with much emphasis by officers of the association.

Coney Island business men who are in close touch with the situation, however, assert positively today that the land is now in the hands of a realty concern.

TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND TO FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS

Berlin, Aug. 20.—The Koch tuberculosis fund is now complete, the kaiser having donated the \$24,000 which was lacking to make it reach the \$100,000 mark. Andrew Carnegie stipulated that this amount should be raised before he would contribute a sum equal to it.

ALL QUIET AT SPRINGFIELD, ILLINOIS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Springfield, Ill., Aug. 20.—Abe Raymer, the Russian Jew, who is alleged to have been one of the leaders in the bloodiest work of the race rioters here, is said to have confessed to practically every charge against him except murder. He has weakened perceptibly. The town is orderly and the grand jury is the whole center of interest.

Eight hundred soldiers were on duty at noon today, all the other having departed. The soldiers remaining comprise the Seventh regiment and a few cavalrymen. It is probable that they will remain on duty indefinitely or at least until the grand jury has completed its work.

DUKE WILL MARRY DESPITE THE CZAR

(United Press Leased Wire.) St. Petersburg, Aug. 20.—Banished by the czar for insisting on marrying Mlle. Sirichinska, the prettiest actress at the St. Petersburg imperial theater, the Grand Duke Vladimir's son, Andreas, is on his way to Irkutsk today breathing defiance against his imperial cousin, Nicholas, and threatening to wed the lady of his heart as soon as his term of exile is past.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY FEARS DARRIN INSANITY PLEA

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Aug. 20.—District Attorney Darrin is evidently uneasy over the announcement that insanity will be the defense of Captain Peter C. Hains and T. Jenkins Hains for the murder of William E. Annis, as his office is not supplied with the funds necessary for the employment of costly alienists required in such trials.

"I have no money for insanity experts," said Darrin today. "But one thing is certain, the trial of Hains brothers will not be a repetition of Thaw case."

"I don't think a Brooklyn jury will stand for a brainstrom defense and the case is so plain against these two men, who committed a cold blooded and cowardly murder that there will be no necessity for a large drawn out trial or the expenditure of large sums of money."

The Hains brothers were solemn and uncommunicative today after the coroner's inquest last night when they were held without bail and the crowd cheered the verdict.

The Potency of an Ideal

"In the new and intense self-consciousness of women, and of the men dominated by the modern feminism, one of the oldest and most important facts of life is in danger of being obscured. The woman of our day, with only half a century of education, has succeeded in stepping into a new place upon the human stage. She is so new in this place that every eye is turned upon her in the endeavor to analyze and place her in the general scheme of things. But if she is to be placed apart from the higher idealism, she will have lost something for which all her treasure-trove of liberty and education will be but small compensation. With all the calumny and scorn that men have heaped upon woman, they have yet kept her an ideal. They have treated her much as the Italian fisherman does the image of his patron saint; he smacks it when in a temper, but worships it and looks up to it as something better than himself all the while. Now, an ideal even when treated pretty roughly, is a potent thing. It assimilates the holder of it to itself, as the green leaf turns a chameleon to its own tint, and all that we do and are, of the best, results from our contact

with, our value of, that immediate Jewel of our souls. It is said that the capacity for growth and development in a race may always be measured accurately by the race's attitude toward its women. If its ideal of woman is low and gross its general progress is also low and gross. And this is equally true of the individual. No one ever knew a really admirable man who thought badly of women and the nature of a woman is expected who thinks meanly of her sex. The terrible welter of European savagery in the Middle Ages got its greatest impetus forward through the development of the dreams of chivalry. And if the women were at all as the poets and painters and story-tellers thought them, one doesn't wonder. They were the dearest creatures."—Beth Bisland in North American Review.
