

OF GREATER HARM THAN SUPPOSED

(Pendleton Tribune.)
The rain which visited Umatilla county yesterday, while not excessive in amount, was sufficient to stop work in the harvest fields until tomorrow shall again appear, but will do no damage at all unless it continues for several days, which is likely.

A Tribune representative yesterday George Ferringer, one of the best and most successful wheat growers in Umatilla county, said the wheat is fully three-fourths through that in another week it will be practically finished. With the exception of one farm near Helix Mr. Ferringer has completed his three-year crop, all told, 1300 acres. Last year he had 3000 acres wheat.

Mr. Ferringer says his yield this year is a little above 30 bushels to the acre, as against 40 last year. He thinks that, considering the two seasons, last year being exceptional, being the best yield he has ever seen in Umatilla or any other county. His opinion is that smut cut a larger figure in diminishing the yield than any other agency, and he confesses that the cause of smut is still a mystery. As a result of the application of a preparation of vitriol will prevent it, but not always, this year's experience being a point. That vitriol is effective there can be no doubt. Mr. Ferringer gave an instance in evidence. He said:

which a head of smut here and there amounts to in the aggregate on an acre of wheat.
"No, I am not sure what causes it. I sometimes think it is the atmosphere instead of the seed or the ground—especially so this year. I have noticed thousands of heads with one side blasted with smut, while the opposite side would be well filled with plump wheat, seeming to indicate that it was caused by the wind or a certain state of the atmosphere affecting the side of the head exposed to it. The blasted sides of these heads were always toward the same point of the compass, thus seeming to prove that it was the effect of the atmosphere. But I don't know. There are a lot of theories, but if there had been no smut this year our yields would not have been much below the average year, dry even though it was."
"But when you get a better wheat country than Umatilla county, you will travel a long way—and I wouldn't know which way to start."

MANUAL TRAINING IN BAKER CITY SCHOOLS
(La Grande Observer.)

The Baker City public schools have grasped the importance of manual training in connection with the regular school curriculum. The directors have seen where the best education is that received by training the mind and hand simultaneously. In speaking of the highly commendable step taken by that city, the Baker Herald says:

"The first city in Oregon outside of Portland, to install a manual training department in the public schools, is Baker City. The board of education of this city has contracted with Prof. J. N. McNeal of Menominee, Wis., to take up the manual training department in the Baker schools and his arrival is now daily expected.
"Benefits to be derived from the additions to institutions of learning here cannot be estimated, so great are they. It has been Superintendent Churchill's one wish for some time to add manual training to the course, and he is pleased to be able to put his ideas in force along this line this year.
"The old gymnasium will be used for the training department and will be equipped with electric power, circular saws, planers and also all sorts of wood-working tools. Besides this, it will be possible for mechanical drawings to be taught students who have an ambition to enter the mechanical world."

A Short-Lived Fad.

The high-wheeled bicycle flourished about 20 years ago. Its career was brief; because it was a more or less perilous means of transportation, and it never attained the popularity of its successor of the two low wheels. The latter, as everyone over ten years of age remembers, met with amazing approval. Bicycle riding became more than a fad, more than a popular amusement; it was a craze. Everybody rode—grandmothers, children not long from the cradle, ministers, society women, business men of age and dignity. They not only rode short distances for simple exercise and pleasure and at reasonable hours; they took "century runs," and only stopped when exhausted. At almost any hour of the 24 bicycles could be seen on any paved street in nearly any town of the country by the dozen; at certain hours by the hundreds. On country roads they were almost equally numerous. So enthusiastic were the riders that it seemed the popularity never would wane, yet it did. In spite of its convenience, in spite of the pleasurable motion and accompanying sensation of freedom for which no later vehicle offers a substitute, in spite of the assertions of its owners that they never, no never, could or would give up the bicycle, it went out of fashion, the craze came to an end. Suddenly almost without warning, its devotees gave it up—women, business and professional men, all who were using it as a means of recreation chiefly. Many wheels are in use of course, but mainly by messenger boys and others who use it as a business necessity. Only occasionally is a rider found who is looking for pleasure only, and a woman on a bicycle is so rare in most cities as to cause people to look after her with curiosity.—Indianapolis Star.
