Criticism of Socialists.
All Socialists are optimists. They are utterly believe that if mankind as it exists today were to be put into possession of some absolutely perfect political and economic system, mankind would be capable of operating that system as it was intended to be operated; would be equal to the task of preserving it and handing it on to the next generation intact. Sometimes it is a theory of ownership which is advocated; sometimes a theory of taxation; sometimes a theory of government; but there is always present in the Socialists, of whatever sort the belief, that if God permitted man to grasp a perfect system man is large enough and wise enough to benefit by it to the elimination of human misery; to preserve it in its perfection unperverted and uncorrupted. This belief does them credit in a way. But it is scarcely creditable not to share it. It is better to face the fact that just government and human happiness are not so much matters of governmental mechanism, of system God-given or man-evolved, as they are of the spirit and intelligence brought to the operation of any system whatsoever. There are the most generous possibilities at the disposal of an absolute despot; there are the most malign possibilities in the freest democracy. Laws and forms are never fundamental causes; they are more or less imperfect expressions.

A perfect system will be possible of perfect operation only at that future period of human develop-

ment when no system at all is any longer a necessity. The only perfect democracy possible is one of which each member is an aristocrat.—Home Magazine.

The Bamboo for Criminals.
Out in Shanghai the authorities have tried to control certain desperate Chinese criminals by punishing them humanely, and have found that it won't do, that it is impossible to keep the offenders in subjection without inflicting corporal punishment with the bamboo. This is told in a report made to the municipal council by Colonel C. D. Bruce, the captain-superintendent of the watch.

The council has indorsed his view and a lot of Shanghai people are very much wrought up about it, saying that it is a blot on Shanghai's fair scutcheon, this admission that the resources of civilization have been exhausted in the treatment of wronged natives.

Recently there have been a number of cases of acid throwing in the streets. They were not followed by attempted robbery or other crime, but appeared to be, as Colonel Bruce reported, "either isolated instances of willful hooliganism or mere practice in the art of acid throwing."

"The watch committee," Colonel Bruce says, "is aware that I have more than once referred to the difficulty, if not the impossibility, of keeping the criminal classes here in subjection without the infliction of corporal punishment.

"To show that my argument has reason, it is only necessary to remind the watch committee that the Chinese authorities whose jurisdiction surrounds the settlement make daily use of the bamboo, and this, although these same authorities have forbidden its use by the magistrate at the mixed court.

"The watch committee will perhaps recall a case during the last few days in which two harmless coolies were chastened with 1000 blows apiece, for nothing more than obeying the orders given them by their foreign superiors.

"It is a mere waste of words to dwell upon the inconsistency which inflicts immediately outside settlement limits such a cruel sentence upon two harmless coolies, while declining to allow the mixed court magistrate inside the settlement to sentence two worthless ruffians, who live by crime, to the punishment of a hundred blows.

"The only means of preventing the inception of crimes like acid throwing, is in my opinion, corporal punishment; the cangue freely used is the next best punishment, though far behind."

The cangue is a big wooden collar, sometimes set in a cumbersome frame on wheels, which the prisoner has to tote around while other persons, if they choose to do so, pelt him with anything they have handy; in other words, the cangue is a sort of portable stocks, and the prospect of the revival of its use is very distressing to many good Englishmen there.—New York Sun.
