## COSTLY BLAZE AT ALBANY

Albany, Or., Aug. 24.—Fire early yesterday morning destroyed four frame buildings in the center of Albany's business district, causing a loss of \$16,150, with \$8850 insurance. Brick walls on each side of the burned area prevented a spread of the flames. The following are the principal losers:

Branch store of Eilers' Piano House of Portland, loss placed at \$600; insurance \$500.  
Arcade barber shop, Bruce & Boston, proprietors; loss \$1200; insurance \$600. The buildings containing the piano house and barber shop were both owned by Mrs. S. Bremer, whose loss is \$1200; insurance \$900.

Office of Linn Benton Real Estate company; portion of office furniture burned; loss \$200; no insurance.  
Building owned by Dr. Stark; loss \$100, fully covered by insurance.  
Butter's Cash Store used a room in the rear of this building as a warehouse, and lost \$200, with no insurance.

Gun and bicycle store of A. Schmidt; loss on stock and tools in shop \$3500; insurance \$500. Building owned by Frank G. Will; loss \$100; fully insured.

In addition to the buildings burned, losses were suffered as follows: Odd Fellows' Temple, loss \$200, fully covered; drug store of Burkhardt & Lee, in Odd Fellows' building, damage by water \$250, fully insured; brick building owned by W. C. Tweedale, damaged \$100, covered by insurance; plateglass windows broken in postoffice and two store windows First street from fire, loss \$100, fully insured.

## HARRIMAN GETS BUSY IN OREGON

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Portland, Or., Aug. 20.—Two million dollars will be spent by the Harriman interests in building new line into central Oregon. If the project just announced by Harriman is carried to completion. The new road will be about 130 miles long. Additional track will be added during the following years.

Work of construction on the new line will be commenced about December 1, it is said. Before dirt will fly, existing surveys must be gone over, verified and brought up to date. If the Deschutes route is followed by the new line, an entirely new survey must be run for a considerable distance, for the Harriman engineers have only mapped out the route for a track about half way up the Deschutes canyon as yet.

### NURSE IS ADOPTED BY MILLIONAIRE

Chicago, Aug. 24.—Friends of Alice W. Page, a Chicago girl, were surprised to learn today that she had been adopted as a daughter by John H. Converse of Philadelphia, banker and financial manager of the Baldwin Locomotive Works.

The young lady, who is 28 years old, nursed Converse's wife for two years before her death and Mrs. Converse made a dying request that her husband would adopt the girl. Miss Page, whose name is now Alice W. Converse, is now in Europe traveling with her foster-sister, Mary Converse, who has been her chum for years.

Miss Page will become joint heir to an estate valued at \$10,000,000.

### WOMAN OPENS ROULETTE GAME IN RENO

Reno, Nev., Aug. 24.—Church women are today trying to prevail upon the authorities to prevent Nan Rooney, a San Francisco woman, late of Goldfield, from conducting a roulette bank that she has opened in this city.

The sheriff refused to act saying that a woman has as much right to conduct a gambling game as a man has, and the religious women threaten to take their fight to the state legislature.

Nan opened her bank here Saturday night and after two hours play won \$10,000 from Jack Flynn, a mine manager. Miss Rooney was conducting a game in Goldfield when Elinor Glynn visited that camp and has received several letters from the author of "Three Weeks."

### CAUGHT ON TREESTLE IS KILLED BY TRAIN

San Jose, Cal., Aug. 24.—Little Herbert Hoerler, a 5-year-old son of Frank Hoerler, a prominent fruit man of Union district, lies dead today, the victim of a train accident yesterday. The lad and two brothers were picnicking with their mother and father near Los Gatos and were amusing themselves on a railroad trestle when a train came suddenly around a curve. The two older boys jumped from the track, but Herbert, frightened motionless by the rapidly approaching train, stood rooted to the middle of the trestle.

The engine struck him with terrific force, hurling his body into the gulch, where it fell mangled and lifeless beside his brother who had jumped from the bridge.

### Famous California.

Monterey, Cal., Aug. 24.—Jules Simoneau, patriot and beloved friend of Robert Louis Stevenson, and one of the interesting figures of California's pioneer history, is dead today at his picturesque home in this city.

The end came late yesterday after a long illness.

An admirable friendship sprang up between him and the great English novelist in 1879, when Simoneau came to California.

Since the author's death Simoneau Bohemian restaurant has been the mecca of Stevensonian admirers. In the volume of travels in California Stevenson mentions the old man with great affection.

Simoneau was born in Nantes, France, 89 years ago. He was an invalid from childhood and in 1850 he left his birthplace in search of health. He finally landed in Monterey after a trip around the Horn. One daughter and four grandchildren survive him.

### ROYCROFT PHILOSOPHY.

The less you require looking after, the more able you are to stand alone and complete your tasks, the greater your reward. ### VARIETY FARMING GOOD PAYING

(Oregon City Courier.)

Much has been said as regards various ways of farm management in the west, in Oregon, and also in Clackamas county; too much can hardly be said. These facts were recently brought to our attention very forcibly in an interview with Mr. L. M. Haworth, proprietor of the Springdale Poultry Farm located about a mile and a half east of Clackamas station in this county.

Eight years ago Mr. Haworth came to this state from Illinois, being forced to seek a better climate on account of his health. He left a large farm and a beautiful home, which he does not seem to regret, since he has gained more than all this by getting back to his normal condition of health since he came out here.

His parents were pioneers of Vermillion county, Illinois and have made their home there for many years. In a talk concerning his poultry farm Mr. Haworth gave us the following figures for 1907, which business was obtained from 172 hens, that produced eggs to the value of \$440; value of hens and chickens disposed of, \$80; value of additional stock, \$26, making a total for the year of \$546, from which he deducted the total cash expenses of keeping the fowls, which included the feeds, grits, etc., \$130, which leaves a net income from 172 hens of \$416. His laying stock was made up for Leghorn, Brown and Buff, using the Buff Orpington for setting. In connection with the poultry business on this 18-acre farm he has raised potatoes on a small scale, from which he has realized in the neighborhood of \$300, or a grand total of approximately \$700; the work being all done by himself and his 16-year-old son, which included the care of four cows. He is confident that with the proper care and attention and with increased stock, the 18 acres could be made to net him over \$1800 a year. Mr. Haworth is a practical farmer and is enthusiastic over the chicken ranch and has made his small farm of 18 acres pay him well with little labor, as one can see from the above statements, showing that considerable more might be done with appropriate labor and facilities.

## FORTY ARE DROWNED IN WRECK

Bergen, Norway, Aug. 24.—Passengers who escaped from the Norwegian steamer *Folgen Fonden*, which sank three minutes after striking near Skoneviks, today describe the terrific panic following the collision of the boat with the rocks and declare that they think more than 40 perished. The first report was that not more than that number had gone down with the ship.

Fifteen bodies have been recovered and a search for the remainder is being made today. The steamer carried 70 passengers, all of whom were natives. Those who were rescued say that many of those aboard lost control of themselves and leaped overboard before life-boats were lowered. Boats from shore reached the scene too late to be of any assistance.
