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EIGHTEEN KILLED IN BUILDING

KERN IS NOTIFIED OF NOMINATION AMIDST PLAIN CEREMONY

BRYAN'S ADDRESS ON THE TRUSTS IS CENTER OF INTEREST

INDIANA GIVES NATIVE SON A ROUSING DEMONSTRATION

(United Press Lensed Wire.) Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 25.—The state fair grounds here today was the center of interest to the Democrats of the United States, for there were gathered to witness the formal notification of John Worth Kern of his nomination as the vice presidential candidate and hear the address of W. J. Bryan, on "The Trusts." One of the greatest and most important issues of the presidential campaign.

No Display.
There was an absence of pomp about the ceremonies as the result of the special request of Kern, who knows to his friends as a man who dislikes show and display. There was no parade. There was no street demonstration and also, at the request of Kern, the merchants and citizens had refrained from decorating the city in gaudy decorations. In every way the occasion was made as simple as possible.

The leaders gathered at Democratic headquarters and the only feature bordering on the usual methods of celebrating was the trip to the fair grounds in automobiles. In 30 cars, the leaders drove through the streets and were greeted by big cheering crowds all the way.

Cheers for Nominees.
The first auto were Bryan, Kern and Theodore Bell of California, the chairman of the notification committee. This car was wildly cheered and the three occupants were given personal ovations. Bryan and Kern were cheered equally and there were many who recognized Bell and cheered him personally.

In the second car were National Chairman Norman R. Mack, Thomas Taggart, former national chairman, and Thomas H. Marshall, candidate for governor of Indiana.

The crowd had been waiting for the arrival of the cars at the fair grounds and their arrival set off a enthusiasm that had been stored for the occasion.

"Kern, Kern, Hurrah for Johnny Kern," yelled the crowd and the sense of pride in the native son was shown throughout the proceedings. When Bryan appeared on the platform the crowd went wild and cheering to the echo. Thomas Taggart formerly opened the session, asking the crowd to order. Father Mack pronounced the invocation. Chairman Mack then made a brief address and introduced Theodore Bell, who formally notified Kern of his nomination.

The vice presidential candidate at once began his address. After Kern introduced, Thomas H. Marshall was introduced and in a short speech spoke of his high hopes of Democratic success in the state this year. Then Bryan was called upon and, in his usual form, launched into his trusts talk, bringing home every point with dramatic force and lifting the crowd off its feet with his eloquence.

Kern Speaks.
Kern, in accepting the nomination, said a high tribute to Bryan, declaring that he is not under obligations to unlawful combinations of capital that is free to serve the people by carrying out his platform pledges.

He declared that Bryan, while a foe to unlawful monopoly, is a friend to every legitimate enterprise. The unanimous choice of Bryan by the Denver convention, said Kern, was determined by the best interests of the country.

The vice presidential candidate declared that Roosevelt, himself, had been unable to secure tariff revision and relief from duty on legislation to right an admitted wrong.

"During the last session of congress," said Kern, "Speaker Cannon was openly aroused to the remedial measures requested by labor for the alleviation of workingmen from oppression.

He defied the will of three-fourths of the members of the house of representatives, refusing to permit a proposed bill to pass the committee on rules.

"The only relief from this intolerable situation, proposed by the speaker himself, is to remove from his position; in other words to disgrace and destroy one of the highest offices in the government.

"But there is another remedy. Americans and voters! You can regain your right to self-government by asserting your manhood on election day and, with the ballot, rebuke the party that has brought about these conditions."

Kern's speech was received with tremendous enthusiasm. His references to party policies and the prospect of party success were loudly cheered and applauded but the element of the personal reception and personal ovation was a dominant feature in the enthusiasm of the crowd. It was a Kern celebration and the candidate was the hero of the day for the people of his state.

Taft Phonograph Speech.
Hot Springs, Va., Aug. 25.—Judge Taft today delivered a missionary lecture into a phonograph, declaring that it is the duty of American citizens to help convert the heathen. Referring to his trips through the Orient, he said he had been positively convinced that foreign missions do a great amount of good. He said:

"The spirit of Christianity is pure democracy. It is the equality of man before God and the equality of man before the law, which is, as I understand it, the most Godlike manifestation man is able to make"

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FRITZI SCHEFF AGAIN MARRIED

Paul Smiths, N. Y., Aug. 25.—Theatrical people here are much interested today in the announcement that Fritzi Scheff is to be married again, this time to a novelist, John Fox, Jr., who has won fame by his stories of mountain life in the south. It is understood that the approaching marriage will not interfere with Fritzi Scheff's stage career. She is under contract to a New York manager and will finish out her term which is several years.

John Fox Jr., is a Kentuckian by birth. "Hell-for-Sartin" and "A Cumberland Vendetta" are two of his best Kentucky works.

ANTI-JAP SENTIMENT IN SYDNEY

FOLLOWS VISIT OF BIG FLEET

(United Press Lensed Wire.) Sydney, N. S. W., Aug. 25.—(By H. Lee Clotworthy, Staff Correspondent of the United Press with Atlantic Fleet.)—Anti-Japanese feeling is sweeping over all Australia as the result of the visit of the American fleet and in all quarters the cry is resounding that the white must dominate the Pacific. The feeling grows stronger every day until it has become a potent, ever-present influence.

Only the remarkable tact of Kinsuro Uyeno, the Japanese consul general at Sydney, today prevented an extremely embarrassing situation at a reception to the officers of the fleet given by the Brazilian embassy. The diplomatic representative of Nippon disregarded all the veiled and open threats against his country and his people, which he could not wall to recognize.

Uyeno spoke in highest terms of praise of the American fleet. He paid a high compliment to Australia for the royal welcome extended to the ships and men and said:

"While it will be impossible for Japan to outdo Australia in the cordiality and heartiness of its reception to the American fleet, Japan at least will try to equal Australia.

"Japan's friendship for America is traditional and I know of nothing that will ever prevent the continuance and the strengthening of the bonds between the two nations."

It had been feared that Uyeno would make some reference to the prevailing sentiment and that his speech might open a breach that would be hard to heal.

The Japanese consul, however, was perfectly calm and fully equal to the situation. His speech was well received and had a good effect.

The enthusiasm throughout the city continues and the reception is being enjoyed by the men of the fleet. Entertainments of various kinds still attract the sailors and the officers are constantly the guests at dinners, banquets and receptions.

WOMAN HAD NARROWLY ESCAPED "HEAD-HUNTERS"

Berkeley, Cal., Aug. 25.—Living for eight days in the midst of a fierce tribe of head hunters in the island of Formosa, with no protection other than a slender garrison of Japanese soldiers, is the experience recounted by Mrs. Julian Arnold here today, upon her return from the Orient where she has been engaged in missionary work. Mrs. Arnold is a graduate of the University of California and the wife of the American consul at Formosa.

In connection with her missionary work Mrs. Arnold penetrated the interior of the island to a region where no white woman had ever been. She was met by a band of savage tribesmen who refused to be convinced of her peaceful mission and surrounded her. The giant chief of the warriors, his belt decorated with a dozen scalps of white men, advanced toward her, threatening to take her life, but Mrs. Arnold's coolness saved her.

WAYMIRE CASE IS AFFIRMED

TRIED TO DEFAME MAYOR LANE

In the opinion by Chief Justice Bean today the case of the state v. Belle Waymire and E. E. Radding was affirmed. The defendants in this case were charged with conspiracy to defame the character of Mayor Harry Lane, the details of which are familiar to most readers of the public press. Under this decision the Waymire woman will now be compelled to serve four months in the Multnomah county jail and Radding six months.

Also the case of the state v. Ju Nun was affirmed, which is also an important criminal case from Multnomah county. Nun killed another Chinese in a street fight with guns on the streets of Portland and was found guilty and sentenced to 15 years and fined \$5000.

In the case of George Scott v. Eva Ford, Commissioner King holds that the circuit court has no power to set aside a verdict and order a new trial on its own motion. The case was appealed from a judgment of Judge J. W. Hamilton in Lane county.

Sues for Accounting.

James E. Rutherford of this city has brought suit against his uncle and trustee, W. A. Rutherford, to require him to give an account of the money received while acting in the capacity of trustee.

The complaint alleges that W. A. Rutherford has retained money exceeding the \$10,000 belonging to him, by virtue of a trusteeship vested in him by T. W. Rutherford, deceased, father of the plaintiff. The trusteeship was to be held until young Rutherford, who is now 22 years old, was 35 years of age, at which time the son was to receive all of the property. The estate which James E. Rutherford is to inherit is worth about \$50,000. McNary & McNary are the attorneys for the plaintiff.

GREEK MINISTER LOOKS INTO ROWS

(United Press Lensed Wire.) San Francisco, Aug. 25.—It became known today that Minister L. A. Coro-Milas from Greece to the United States has been in this city for five days having come out from Washington to investigate international rows that have disrupted the Greek colony here for years.

Coro-Milas is registered at the St. Francis hotel and has one of the best suites of rooms in the house. He has been in consultation with bands of his countrymen for several days, but today absolutely refused to discuss his mission to this city. The Greek minister was sent here by his government to inquire into charges that have been made that recent consuls to this city have been engaged in Greek labor traffic.

RESCUERS AT WORK IN DEBRIS

REMOVING DEAD AND INJURED

(United Press Lensed Wire.) Boston, Mass., Aug. 25.—Eighteen men are reported killed and a number hurt in the collapse of a building today. Ten dead and seven injured already have been recovered. The dead were crushed until they were unrecognizable. Thirty men were working in the building and rescuing parties are desperately at work searching the ruins. None of the dead have been identified.

The building was a structure that was being re-constructed, all but the front wall having been destroyed by the great Chelsea fire. It is supposed that the disaster was the result of an effort to use the old foundations which had been more seriously damaged than the builders thought.

When the walls collapsed the 35 men employed within had no chance to escape and all of them were caught in the debris, though some were not badly hurt. Twelve are believed to have received injuries that will not prove serious.

Ambulances were called from the Marine and Naval hospitals and moving vans which were in the neighborhood were also employed in removing the dead and injured. The police reserves were called out and surrounded the scene, holding back a tremendous crowd that gathered immediately. Hundreds of citizens, however, were allowed to pass the lines and join in the rescue work. Great difficulty was experienced in lifting the debris and in several cases, men who were pinned down begged to be killed, fearing fire would break out and they would be burned alive.

The building was owned by Maurice Gordon and was on Chelsea Square, in Chelsea, a Boston suburb. It is believed that the list of dead will reach the first estimate of 18 if it is not exceeded.

ARMOR BELT LOWER ON WARSHIPS

(United Press Lensed Wire.) Washington, Aug. 25.—It is announced here today that the summer conference of naval officials at the naval war college at Newport, which has been discussing the plans for the new warships for the past six months, has decided to lower the armor belt on the battleships to be constructed after the Florida and the Utah have been finished.

The decision to lower the armor belt was made because of the advance toward perfecting torpedoes. The naval authorities decided that greater protection below the waterline is needed. Five-inch rather than six-inch guns have been decided on as better for the secondary batteries. Military masts will be abandoned and the new battleships will be provided with one and possibly two steel fire control towers 90 feet high.

HOLLAND WILL AID REBELS

OVERTHROW REIGN OF CASTRO

(United Press Lensed Wire.) Washington, Aug. 25.—Having been assured by the United States that it will not interfere, Venezuelan revolutionary leaders are today laying plans for the overthrow of President Castro by a war which will begin as soon as the South American rainy season ends. Holland has promised naval aid, soldiers will be recruited in Colombo and finances are already being arranged in New York.

It is learned upon unquestionable authority that the assurance of the United States government has been given the revolutionists that there will be no interference. Castro will be compelled to shift for himself and military experts here declare that his overthrow is certain to result.

RACING MEN MIX AT FAIR GROUNDS

A fight which caused considerable disturbance, and which came near ending in the arrest of the combatants, was pulled off before a large crowd of race-horse fans at the state fair grounds yesterday afternoon.

The cause of the trouble was the failure of a scheduled race to take place on account of the wet condition of the track. Several racing enthusiasts from Stayton came down to see the race and to bet their money on their favorite. When the time came, Sam Lindsey, one of the trainers at the track, refused to race his horse because the speedway was too heavy, whereupon one of the Stayton betters by the name of Bailey hurled some rather torrid epithets at the trainer, and the result of it all was that the disputants mixed.

For 15 minutes they scratched, bit and pounded each other. It was no boxing contest. The two men clinched and fell, and then proceeded to roll each other all over the training quarters. The faces of both the men were cut and bruised, and were completely covered with blood and dirt.

Finally the scrap was stopped, and soon afterwards Chairman F. A. Welch, of the state fair board, appeared on the scene and threatened to drive the whole mob from the grounds. Sheriff Minto was telephoned to, and as soon as possible he arrived at the track with Deputy William Esch. Bailey, however, had by this time made good his escape, and as Lindsey looked as though he had sufficient punishment already, the matter was allowed to drop, with the understanding that a similar exhibition should not occur again.

Hains Not Insane.

New York, Aug. 25.—Sheriff Harvey of Queen county today declared that Captain Peter C. Hains slayer of William E. Annis, is not insane and that stories of his alleged ravings have been given out by his friends for effect to support the insanity defense placed for the trial. The Hains lawyers are preparing their defense along the lines of insanity and the agents of the district attorney are proceeding with their preparation for an attempt to break down such a defense.
