WHERE THE SPEED RECORDS ARE MADE

at Horses to Contest for Big Purse at Oregon's State Fair.

A grandstand seating about 6000 spectators, with room for 20,000 more along the home stretch; new boxes and officials' stands reconstructed with the special object of giving the best possible view of the races, modern announcing machines to keep the spectators informed as to the time and positions of the horses, and a track that is known to be lightning fast, will give Oregon's state fair the best equipment for the harness races afforded by any track in the west.

The races this year will be the best ever seen on the coast. Two purses of \$5000 each, and six purses of \$1000 each, the largest stakes ever offered in the west; will bring together the best blood in America. The track record of 2:06 1/2, which is a very fast mark, will undoubtedly be broken, and there are horsemen who predict that the time may be as low as 2:03 before the week's racing comes to an end.

in front of the grand stand, but the spectators along the sidelines will be afforded an excellent view of the horses, as the fences have all been cut down to a height of 3 feet 6 inches. The entire fence on the inside has been newly built. A double fence has been put on the inside to keep the crowd back off the rail.

The judges' stand has been lowered on a level with the grandstand, and the timers' stand has been cut off. The wire has been moved 60 feet north. Electrical connection will be made between the judges' stand and the bandstand. The grandstand will be enclosed with a wire fence, and electric turnstiles installed. The stands and betting and saloon fixtures in the interior have been torn out, as neither betting nor liquor selling will be tolerated this year.

Another improvement is the installation of automatic announcing machines. They will flash the time of heat instantly, as well as the positions of the horses as they flash. These machines are worked with a keyboard. Numerous other improvements will be made, which it would be impossible to mention in a single article.

Some photographers flatter their subjects, some do them scant justice, while others are atrocious caricatures. Gazing on the picture of Bishop Edwin H. Hughes as reproduced in several of our public prints, one who had never met the original felt constrained to inquire what there could possibly have been in the low-browed, big-eared, unprepossessing individual therein presented to commend him to the special consideration of the late General Conference when hunting for episcopal timber. It was hard to rid oneself of the impression that a mistake had been made and that California was getting a sort of "fag-end" in the person of its new resident bishop. But it took less than ten minutes of looking at and listening to this same Bishop Hughes, out of the picture and in propria persona, the other day, to utterly dissipate all such impressions. The face, like that of

Lincoln, irradiated by the inner glow of earnestness and geniality and humor, became notably attractive, and a half hour's address simply captured the entire crowd. He walked right into our affections in less than a day, and already his place in the hearts of the California preachers is secure. An hour or two spent with him in committee work a little later on, gave a good impression of his keenness of insight into situations that have to be considered and soundness of judgment as to the solution of difficulties. Congratulations to the conferences in the north that are to enjoy his presidency this year! The writer almost envies his brethren the privileges they are soon to have in the ministrations and fellowship of the general bishop. "Send him back to us in good order" as soon as you can.

CATCH PICKPOCKET QUEEN AFTER AN EXCITING CHASE

Reno, Nev., Aug. 26.—Irene Hawley, alias Irene Duff, known throughout the United States as "Queen of the Pickpockets" is in jail today at Sparks, after an exciting escape from officers yesterday.
The woman cleverly robbed a Sparks bartender of \$90 and fled to Reno where she was followed and arrested by Constable Malay of Sparks. On a streetcar bound for the latter place, Malay missed a diamond pin and his wallet. He stopped the car and ordered a search, but while the hunt was in progress his prisoner slipped out of the car

and jumped into an automobile standing near and started at breakneck speed for Sparks.
Hearing of the runaway prisoner Deputy Sheriff Maxwell of Sparks started toward Reno in an automobile to intercept her. When she sighted the approaching officer, the woman jumped from the speeding machine into a pond and secreted herself. The deputy kept on after the chauffeur.
Later the fugitive was found at a road house and arrested. While at the police station undergoing search she slipped a diamond ring from the finger of an officer, but dropped it on the floor by accident

JAPANESE MAY POSTPONE EXPOSITION
(United Press Leased Wire.)
Tokio, Aug. 26.—The unpopularity of President Kaneko, of the Tokio exposition, has caused difficulties which may result in the postponement of the great exposition, which now is set for 1912.
The people are clamoring against the methods of Kaneko in spending great sums of government money and the reports of the postponement have been so frequent that today the minister of agriculture and commerce found it necessary to issue a formal denial. He said that the exposition would be held at the time set, but even this assurance is not sufficient to quiet the reports.
