Washington, D. C., Aug. 28.—Interest in the coming convention of the Conservation Commission, of which Gifford Pinchot is chairman, and the National Rivers and Harbors congress, which Hon. Joseph E. Ransdell, chairman, is largely attended, is shown by the large number of delegates from throughout the country who are expected to attend the convention next, gives promise of a most largely attended by the conservative men of the nation in the conservation of our

natural resources and in waterway improvements.

Although no special effort has been made to bring together the leading experts and enthusiastic workers for the causes represented, letters received by the president of the Rivers and Harbors congress and the secretary of the Conservation commission show that the week of December 7th in Washington will be crowded with important meetings. The Conservation commission will meet on Tuesday, the 8th, while the National Convention of the Rivers and Harbors congress will be held on the 9th, 10th and 11th of December, at which 5000 delegates are expected.

Among the governors who have already indicated their intention of being present at the Conservation commission meeting, and who will remain over to attend the National Rivers and Harbors congress, are: Hogeit, of Alaska; Frear, of Hawaii; Wilson of Kentucky, Guild of Massachusetts, Warner of Michigan, Johnson of Minnesota, Glenn of North Carolina; Post of Porto Rico, Cummins of Iowa, Brooks of Wyoming, and Sheldon of Nebraska. These state executives have intimated their presence in Washington during the period mentioned, while many others are yet to be heard from.

It is expected that in conjunction with the annual nation conventions of the Rivers and Harbors congress and the National Conservation commission, President Roosevelt will ask the attendance of the governors of all the states into conference largely patterned after the wonderfully successful meeting at the White House last spring, and from which vast benefits have already accrued.

During the next month or six weeks both the president of the Rivers and Harbors congress, Representative Ransdell, and the chairman of the Conservation commission, Chief Forester Pinchot, will be busily engaged in addressing conventions upon the subjects of interior waterways and the conservation of natural resources. Mr. Pinchot, and, in all probability, Mr. Ransdell, will address the National Editorial association to be held in Boston on August 21-27. Mr. Ransdell will speak before the National Irrigation congress to be held at Albuquerque, New Mexico, September 29 to October 3. Vice-President Fairbanks and President Ransdell are scheduled for addresses at the convention of the Upper Mississippi River Improvement association, to be held at Clinton, Iowa, September 22-24. Both Mr. Pinchot and Mr. Ransdell are expected at the farmers' National congress to be held at Madison, Wisconsin, September 24-28. Chairman Pinchot and possibly Representative Ransdell will also

Among the many organizations have held their annual conventions conservation of natural resources, and improvement of the waterways of the United States had earnest solicitation of Manufacturers, which met in New York City in May, the National Education association at Cleveland in June; the Yellow Pine Lumber association at Chicago in July, and the Chautauqua Institution at Jamestown, N. Y., July 26 to August 1, at which meetings committees were appointed and resolutions adopted looking to a comprehensive movement on the part of the general government for the conservation of our natural resources and the improvement of the nation's water highways.

FINE YOUTH DISAPPEAR ON SAN FRANCISCO BAY

San Francisco, Aug. 28.—The parents of five young men and the entire force of the Potrero police station are today searching for the youths who have been out in the bay in a light bark and dressed only in tight, since early yesterday morning. The boys are Asker Fort, Robert Hasset, Frank McGuire, Own Haley and Frank Thompson.

They left the boat house of the South End Rowing club at nine o'clock yesterday morning and have not been seen since. The police launch "Patrol" searched the southern end of the bay with a searchlight last night and is today out looking for the missing oarsmen. It is thought that they were carried by a stiff breeze on to the mud flats at the south of the city and have been unable to get off. It is learned that some of the boys may be in a critical condition as they were all dressed in light costume.

CAPTURE GANG OF PICKPOCKETS

San Francisco, Aug. 28.—Four alleged pickpockets, believed by the police to be members of a gang who have been preying on people coming into this city at the Third Street depot, are being held in jail pending an investigation. The men are Edward Oppenheimer, Harry Emerson, Tony Parmagial and Tony Chertle. The gang has been in the practice of waiting for the overland train every day and boarding the streetcars with the passengers taking advantage of the confusion to pilfer their pockets of valuables. Many complaints have been received by the police of this petty thieving and detectives who were put on the case believe they have the miscreants.

GEORGIA FLOOD IS RECEDING

(United Press Lensed Wire.)
Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 28.—Reports from Augusta today say that the waters are receding and that many of the destitute people are now receiving relief under an organized system. Fifteen are reported to be dead. Most of them are negroes.

The rains have ceased in the upper Savannah valley and at Augusta the river is falling. The prospects are better today than at any time since floods began the first part of the week.

The full number of the dead still is unknown but it is now believed that it probably will not be as great as at first estimated.

The water is still deep in the streets of Augusta and the property loss there cannot fall below a million dollars. Some estimates today place it at two millions.

When the wires are patched and reports begin coming in it is hoped that the general results of the floods will not prove as serious as has been indicated, though there is no hope for the crops in most of the flooded districts.

and everything moveable was lashed tight. According to the story of Engineer Hardy, who with a seaman, was saved, the typhoon came with terrific force and a sea washed over the doomed tramp ship whose engines were forcing it in the teeth of the gale. The sea washed into the fireroom and when the steam dropped the vessel's head payed off and the seas washed over the doomed steamer's side. It sank so quickly that the men below decks were caught on their way up from the engine room and drowned.

Hardy and the seaman were saved by being washed upon a lifeboat which had been overturned in an effort to launch it. The vessel cleared from Karapsu, Aug. 24. Two days later the typhoon broke and the vessel was destroyed.
