An Englishman Who Says We Dress Well.

Ronald P. Gaze, advertising manager of Harrods, Ltd., the London department store, who has been spending some little time in this country studying local trade conditions, when seen in New York recently, had many interesting things to say in regard to the American clothing industry and the great difference existing in the conditions governing the clothing trade in this country and in England.

Mr. Gaze was most enthusiastic in his praise of American clothes and could not say enough in eulogy of our well dressed men. "Why," he said, "I am positively ashamed of my English togs, when I see all you well-dressed New Yorkers."

"You can take it from me," he went on, "that we Englishmen are extremely jealous of your American tailoring, which is now conceded to be the standard of the world. One frequently sees, these days, the sign displayed in the London streets, 'American Tailoring.' Of course, there are special tailors in the fashionable West End who produce garments that are as fine and as beautifully cut as any that are to be found on the earth's surface, but our average 'bespoke' tailoring is not in a class with the work done in America.

"There is an 'entente,' a personal relation, existing between the Englishman and his cutter or fitter that is almost unknown in this country. At Harrods the workmen are right there in the tailoring department, so that when a customer orders a suit of clothes he may see it cut and talk to the cutter while the latter is cutting it. He may point out any little peculiarity in his build or make some particular 'point' the he thinks should be specially noted by the workman.

"The building of clothes to the Englishman is an extremely personal matter and he has this same feeling about all kinds of men's wear. For instance, our furnishings department at Harrods is off by itself in a more or less secluded part of the store, where a man may go and purchase his neckwear, shirts or undersuits undisturbed. In your country nothing is left to the imagination, but the Englishman does not like to be seen buying underwear and such things."—Men's Wear Fashions.

Through a Mountain To School.

Getting to and from school in some parts of this country isn't as easy as it is in a big city. There is one school-teacher in Colorado, who, on stormy days, makes the trip through a mountain, traveling nearly four miles underground before she reaches her school.

The school which this teacher teaches is on top of a mountain near Idaho Springs, Col. Idaho Springs is a bustling place for that part of the world, but around it on all sides are the Rocky mountains and many wild places.

Since the opening of the tunnel the teacher gets into one of the little cars at the foot of the mountain whenever the weather is bad. The ore train takes her into the mountain about three miles. Then she gets out at one of the mines, transfers to a bucket and is hoisted up a shaft 2100 feet.

When she gets out of the shaft she is on top of the mountain, 50 feet from her schoolhouse. It takes her about an hour to make the trip. The school has 14 pupils, and they never know whether their teacher is coming up from the bowels of the earth or over the mountain.—New York Sun.

American Merchant Marine Scuttled. When congress killed the shipping bill two sessions ago there were 15 American steamships in the Pacific trade. When congress killed it again at the last session the number of ships had dropped to eight. Now it is officially announced that on November 1st seven Pacific railroads will go out of the export trade with China, Japan, New Zealand and Australia, and practically out of the import trade. It is said that the American steamers serving the port of San Francisco and Seattle will shortly be sold, and to the Japanese. This will clean us out of the Pacific altogether.

We are going to have an "adequate Navy" in the Pacific, as protection against "the yellow peril" or anything that may arise in that quarter. But we are not going to have a single ship there. The little brown men, none too welcome as immigrants in the port cities, will be omnipresent as sailors. They will do our carrying trade of a quarter of a billion and levy their toll upon it. As between Japan and ourselves "the mastery of the Pacific" has already been decided. We have deserted our merchant marine in that sea, and before congress meets again in December every stick and spar of it will have met its fate.

You may look in vain in the history of free institutions for a precedent of our "policy of scuttle."—New York World.
