SALEM ASSUMES A BOHEMIAN AIR

With the increased prosperity of Salem come increased and better amusements. As the town gets bigger, so must the entertainments get better. It has been noticed for some time that Salem has been approaching a much more Bohemian air.

Comparatively a few months ago, a five-cent show was put into the town; not boldly and with lavish expenditure, but with the cautious feeling of one who is in doubt. It was found to go very well, and the better and better as people began to learn of the new amusement. Then, as the town has been growing and people heard of it, so with the five-cent theater, it was heard on the outside that Salem possessed a large, though asleep, Bohemian spirit. A second show-house of the kind followed and seven months later a third. Then the cat was out of the bag; Salem was a gala evening town and a fourth nickelodion was opened.

The fifth five-cent electric theater has been opened and by some who have been into investigate, is said to be the best of all. This one, however, is not owned by outsiders, but by long-residents of the Cherry City and its name is "The Midway," and its owners are Connelman J. F. Goode, Miss Lou Goode and Mrs. Carrie Knowland.

Mr. Goode, while many were trying to get a line on the lease of the premises on the west side of Commercial street near State, despite his years, quietly stole a march on other theater-site seekers, and seized the plum.

In addition to the show being as finely decorated as any in town with every convenience for the patrons, the Goodes have secured the services of an expert moving-picture operator, Frank Splitstone, who as Mutt's right hand man made the Vandette, from the beginning, a popular playhouse. The Midway has assured us that Mr. Splitstone will be given the same free hand with which to make the "Midway" head the list of nickelodions.

PACIFIC GERMAN METHODIST CONFERENCE

The Pacific German conference of the Methodist Episcopal church opened in this city yesterday, and was attended by German ministers from all parts of the coast. The formal opening of the conference was preceded by a service Wednesday evening at the German M. E. church, the sermon from Isaiah, being delivered by Rev. George Hartung.

The conference was opened yesterday at 9 o'clock a. m. by Rev. F. H. Luecke of the Spokane district by song and prayer, after which Bishop Hughes addressed the meeting. Then followed a business meeting.

CONDITIONS AT Y. OF O. IMPROVED

Eugene, Or., Aug. 29.—The work of the University of Oregon during the coming year will be the strongest in the history of the institution, due to the fact that the working tools of the university, books, apparatus, etc., have been much bettered during the summer. The library has been greatly strengthened by the addition of \$10,000 worth of new books and much new apparatus has been ordered for all departments. The biological laboratory has been almost completely remodeled and many improvements have been made in the physics laboratory. Many of the buildings have been renovated and the new library building which was wholly without lights, and but scantily furnished last year, is being completely equipped with electric lights and new furniture. Hereafter the general reading rooms and the stack rooms will be kept open until 9 o'clock in the evening.

A number of new instructors have been added, notably a professor of geology, a chair that has been vacant since the death of Dr. Condon, a professor of political science, and assistant professor of psychology, an assistant professor of education, a new head librarian and a number of instructors in departments that have been badly crowded.

Work on a new recitation building to relieve the over-crowded condition of the other buildings is being pushed, and it is hoped to have it ready for use soon after the opening of the session. The girls' dormitory has been completed and furnished. A number of new student club houses have been erected during the summer. The work of improving the campus is being pushed as rapidly as possible.

The number of students will probably be from a third to a half greater than last year. Applications for admission are coming to the registrar rapidly, and the number on file is much larger than usual at this time. The freshman class will number between 200 and 250 students. The fall session begins Tuesday, September 22.
