SMITH CORRECTS POISON MEAT STORY

An article which appeared in a morning paper, setting forth C. Smith's miraculous escape from death after eating a beefsteak from Portland meat which was found to contain ptomaine poison, is slightly corrected. The publication of the story which was at once visited and he was told differed materially from the one printed yesterday. Dr. Smith denied that he ate the meat eaten by his son, and that it was stored in his refrigerator. He said that he had nothing about it.

More than a month ago Dr. Smith ate a beefsteak in a local restaurant. He ate a small portion of it and gave the rest to his dog. The article in the morning paper said the meat was cold storage from Portland. Inquiries developed the fact that there is no cold storage meat sold in Salem, and only one shop sells Portland meat at all. Further information gathered to the effect that Dr. Smith ate the beefsteak at the local restaurant in question buying its meat from a shop dealing exclusively in local meat and whatever killed the doctor's son was a cold storage product, and it came from Portland. The story by the inquirer has raised a storm of protest from the doctor, the restaurant, and the butcher dealing in Portland, and in their interest the meat taker pleasure in correcting the impression the story has made.

GETS PART OF FAIR MILLIONS

(United Press Lensed Wire.)
New York, Aug. 29.—Frag Peterson Smith, the so-called "lost heir" to the estate of Charles L. Fair of San Francisco, and a brother of Mrs. Fair, who with her husband was killed in an automobile accident in France, has won his contest for a portion of the estate, according to the best information obtainable here today. Smith was fighting to recover one-seventh of the eight million dollar estate from Mrs. William Vanderbilt and Mrs. Helen Oelrichs, in whose hands it had been left. Speeding today to Newark, N. J., where Smith has been forcing his claims, his "lost" daughter, Miss Lillian Smith, is on her way to receive her portion of the money her father has secured. She has been employed as kitchen girl in a boarding house in Sheridan, Iowa, for some time. Now she will get \$61,000. Smith brought suit for recovery of the money last spring, and has sped over America and Europe in the securing of evidence to support his claims.

Electricity on the Farm.
Washington, Aug. 29.—From Germany comes a prophetic vision of the future of the farm, with electricity to lighten the work of the farmer.

Consul Thompson transmits to the Department of Commerce and Labor an address delivered by Herr von Podbelski, former German minister of agriculture, in which the latter predicts the early utilization of the motor on the farm.

Podbelski thinks that power plants in the smaller cities, which generally remain more or less idle until current is required for lighting at night, would earn greater dividends by distributing their power to farmers, for their use during the day. Some of the appliances upon which the electric motor could be used are the chaff cutter, the corn cleaner and the brush mill. Still further utilization is possible in pulling the plow, running the reapers and threshing grain.

Because the wages of the day laborer are constantly increasing, Podbelski says that the initial cost to the farmer in machinery would be more than repaid in the cheapness of the work done, and the faithfulness of a mechanical helper that doesn't eat meals nor loaf while the current is on. Some small German cities having power plants for lighting are considering the extension of their service to farming communities nearby in line with the suggestion.

EXPLODES "ALASKA" WHEAT BOOM

Washington, Aug. 29.—Someone has been trying to "string" the farmer of the country. According to experts of the Department of Agriculture, the exploitation of the so-called "Alaska" wheat, which is said to be about four times the size of ordinary American wheat in head, and to yield "under ordinary soil conditions" 200 bushels to the acre, is almost as rank a fake as the "Cardiff Giant."

For the past few months articles glowingly descriptive of the alleged newly discovered grain, and predicting a consequent revolution in the wheat industry of the nation, have been widely published in magazines and newspapers.

Dr. Galloway, chief of the Bureau of Plant Industry, thus explodes the pretensions of the "Alaska" wheat boomers:

"This variety of wheat has been known for many years, both in this country and Europe. It has been tried at several state experiment stations in the western part of the United States during the past 15 years, but nowhere have the yields been high enough to merit attention. It has been grown to a very limited extent on certain heavy, undrained soils in France for many years. In such locations it is said to yield rather better than ordinary wheat, but as it is one of the poorest wheats known for making flour, it is never grown where the ordinary varieties of the grain will thrive."

UNITED STATES A GOOD MANAGER

Washington, Aug. 24.—Uncle Sam has done a pretty good job in managing the fiscal affairs of the Dominican republic, according to the official reports of Major Frank McIntyre, assistant chief of the Bureau of Insular Affairs, who recently returned from a tour of inspection of the customs receivership in that country.

"The relation between the receivership and the officers of the Dominican government," he says "was found to be cordial, and all seemed to be co-operating for the success of the arrangement. The system of accountability is excellent, and the reports of the officers were in such shape that, without the least difficulty, every transaction under the present convention, and the former so-called 'modus vivendi,' could be scrutinized without delay."

The general receiver, W. E. Polliam, has 24 American employees attached to the receivership service, including the officers of the four revenue cutters, those who have charge of the guard on the frontiers between Santo Domingo and Hayti, and the traveling inspectors.
