He had to disclose his identity to a watchman before he could get into the grounds but he made the round unknown to the rest of the force.

### BIG FOREST FIRES IN CALIFORNIA

(United Press Lensed Wire.)

Santa Cruz, Cal., Aug. 31.—Over a hundred acres of valuable redwood timber land has been burned over already by a forest fire that is raging in Blackburn gluch four miles from the town. Several hundred farmers are fighting to keep it away from their homes, and the flames are now sweeping toward Lavega park, where some of the big redwoods grow.

The fire was started by the burning of a barn on the Trevethan ranch. The flames spread to the trees and dry grass of the forest has been burned over the John Walsh ranch, a part of the Crandall's summer resort, the Morgan ranch and Dr. Holmquest's ranch.

Fighters at the Crandall place saved the buildings and the Holmquest ranch buildings were saved only after a hard fight.

Back firing from Doyle gulch kept the fire out of the canyon which is thickly populated.

It is thought that the fighters will be able to save the Three Tree and Lavega parks.

Ukiah, Cal., Aug. 31.—Fires which started last night are raging today in the mountains west of here and threaten to destroy the fish hatchery of the Northwest Pacific Railroad company, one mile from the city. The fires are as bad as those of three weeks ago, which burned over a territory 20 miles square. The ranges have been so badly burned that the stockmen are confronted by the prospect of a hard winter and the general loss will be heavy.
