EXPLAINS TAX LAW

In reply to a letter from Sheriff Stevens of Multnomah county Attorney General Crawford has rendered a decision in regard to the collection of delinquent taxes, which affects the whole state as well as Multnomah county.

The decision is in regard to the 1907 law which differs from the previous law in the manner of the collection of delinquent taxes. Under the present law when taxes have been delinquent for six months a certificate of delinquency is made out against the property on which the tax is owed.

Labor Day Proclamation.

Governor Chamberlain has issued the following proclamation:

Whereas, the legislature of this state has set apart and appointed the first Monday in September of each year as Labor Day and declared the same to be a public holiday.

Now, therefore, I, Geo. E. Chamberlain, as governor of the state of Oregon, by virtue of the power and authority in me vested, do hereby proclaim Monday, September 7th, 1908, as Labor Day and recommend its fitting observance by all citizens everywhere.

WEATHER IN OREGON—REPORT OF OFFICIAL BUREAU

General Summary.

The mean temperature was about six degrees below normal in the interior districts west of the Cascade Mountains and about ten degrees below normal in the eastern counties.

Coast District.

Newport, Lincoln county, Jno. E. Matthews.—The weather during the past week was fair and warm, with some rain.

Fairview, Coos county, Wm. Bettys.—The fore part of the week was clear, except fog in the mornings. The latter days were cloudy, with southwest winds. Rain fell on Thursday and Friday.

Port Orford, Curry county, E. W. Jensen.—The fore part of the week was clear; the latter part was generally cloudy, with some rain.

Willamette Valley.

Portland, Multnomah county, local office, weather bureau.—The week was cool throughout, averaging 6 degrees below normal daily.

Salem, Marion county, M. P. Baldwin.—The week was cloudy, with light rain during the latter part.

Albany, Linn county, F. M. French.—The first half of the week was ideal weather, with seasonable temperature. The last half was cool, with occasional showers.

Corvallis, Benton county, E. P. Irwin.—The early part of the week was clear and pleasant. During the remaining days the temperature was below normal, and there were local showers.

Columbia River Valley.

Cascade Locks, Hood River county, Val. W. Tomkins.—The week was cool and cloudy. Light rains fell on the 24th and 25th.

Hood River, Hood River county, H. L. Hasbrouck.—During the fore part of the week warm days and cool nights prevailed. Rain fell on the 25th, clearing the sky of smoke and extinguishing all forest fires in this locality.

The Dalles, Wasco county, S. L. Brooks.—The week was much cooler with the temperature below normal. Clear skies prevailed during the fore part of the week.

Wasco, Sherman county, J. R. Howell.—Low temperature prevailed all the week, with cloudy weather and showers during the latter part.

Mikkalo, Gilliam county, J. T. Chandler.—Cool weather prevailed throughout the week. Light rains occurred on the 21st and 27th.

Condon, Gilliam county, S. C. Dodson.—The week was very cool. Light frosts occurred Tuesday and Wednesday nights. Very light showers fell Thursday and Friday.

Hermiston, Umatilla county, C. W. Kellogg.—Unseasonable cool weather prevailed this week. The latter half was cloudy, with traces of rain on the 24th and 25th.

Pendleton, Umatilla county, H. F. Johnson.—Cool, threatening weather prevailed, with but little rain. Fresh northwest winds blew quite steadily.

Southern Oregon.

Drain, Douglas County, Ira Wimberly.—The first half of the week was partly cloudy; the later half was mostly cloudy, with light showers.

Plateau District.

Yonah, Klamath county, Jacob Ruock.—The week was characterized by cool nights and pleasant days with cool winds in the afternoon.

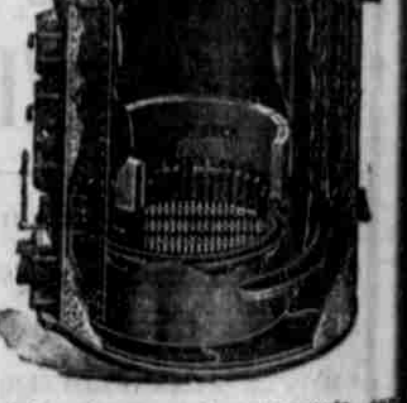
