### SUDDENLY MARRIES IN ENGLAND

London, England, Sept. 3.—Mrs. Marshall Field Jr., widow of the son of the Chicago merchant king, was married in the registry office here today to Malvina A. Drummond, the second son of the late Edgar A. Drummond. The greatest efforts were made to keep the wedding secret. The two sons of the bride were present at the ceremony. The only other attendants were Craig Wadsworth, one of the secretaries of the American embassy and the duke of Westminster. There were no other witnesses except those required by law. Wadsworth acted as groom's best man.

### WILL NOT WAIT ON HARRIMAN

### TO BUILD LINE TO COOS BAY

Roseburg, Or., Sept. 3.—If Harriman will not agree to take action on the Coos Bay-Drain road at the forthcoming conference between the railroad king and the delegation of Coos Bay citizens at Roseburg, negotiations will be opened with the several capitalists who are anxious to finance an electric line from Roseburg to Coos Bay. The conditions are such that any further development of the Coos Bay country and dependent coast points will be retarded unless a road is assured.

### EXILING OF OFFICER IS AN ISSUE

### STEWART WARNED BY FRIENDS

Willcox, Ariz., Sept. 3.—Discovery of what is believed to be a plan of the war department to shelve the case of William F. Stewart, the Fort Grant exile, until after the presidential election in November resulted today in a large number of warning messages being received here from the officer's friends, who requested that they be forwarded immediately to the desolate army post. Stewart is awaiting orders from the department of Colorado to journey to Fort Huachuca and take the 90-mile riding test. The plan of his enemies is becoming plainer with every move of the war department his friends allege. They declare it is expected, or rather hoped, that Colonel Stewart will fall in the riding test and be graded "physically unfit" when he finishes the ride.

### TO FORCE KAISER IN LINE

### NOT TO RECOGNIZE PRETENDER

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Berlin, Sept. 3.—It is reported here today that England will join with France, and Spain in holding aloof from Mulai Haff, usurping the sultan of Morocco, in direct opposition to the attitude of Germany. The German empire has made itself clearly understood that it considers it necessary for all the nations of Europe to recognize Mulai Haff at once under the provision of the Algeiras act. Whether France, England and Spain act together or separately, it makes but little difference. It is understood that England supports the attitude of France in holding that promises of good behavior should be abstracted from Mulai before he is recognized. If the other powers persist in this attitude, it is likely that Germany will be forced into becoming a party to such a course, provided that the program is so arranged that it will not involve a direct surrender of the kaiser's present position. The situation is recognized to be serious and every effort will be made to have it settled without a breach of relations.

**Chicago Startled.**  
Chicago, Sept. 3.—The announcement of the wedding in London of Mrs. Marshall Field Jr., came as a great surprise today. Her son, Marshall Field III, who now is 15 years old, and Henry, 13, are the heirs to the great Field estate estimated at \$150,000,000. She is the daughter of Henry Huck, the millionaire brewer of this city. Marshall Field Jr. shot and killed himself while cleaning a pistol at his home here three years ago. Immediately after the funeral, his widow went to England with her two sons. She has returned to this city a few times since then.

**Groom an "Upper."**  
Drummond is prominent in the upper circles of society in London and is considered well with several titled families. He has known the bride nine years and was well acquainted with her late husband. After the ceremony the couple left for an automobile honeymoon trip. It is expected that the news of the marriage will be a great disappointment to King Edward who has been trying for two years, it is said, to arrange the marriage of Mrs. Field to Prince Francis Teck, an impecunious relative. The attachment between Mrs. Field and Drummond had been well concealed and was suspected by very few of their friends.

### WILL NOT WED EDNA GOODRICH

Reno, Nev., Sept. 3.—Much mystery is in the air today over the brief announcement made last night by Marry McMillan, the millionaire mining man of Nevada, that his engagement with Edna Goodrich, the actress, is off. McMillan stopped in this city last night and startled his friends with the information that the match over which so much gossip had been excited will not be carried out. He gave no reason for the sudden termination of the engagement. Today he is on his way east, presumably to see Miss Goodrich in connection with the matter.

### Klamath Falls Road Ready by Christmas.

Klamath Falls, Or., Sept. 3.—Klamath Falls will have a railroad within its limits by Christmas. This is the latest schedule announced, and at the rate work is progressing no doubt is felt. The Southern Pacific company has established a camp at Wild Horse butte and work has commenced on the concrete piers for the bridge across the straits. ### MEDICAL BOARD IS CHARGED WITH PARTIALITY

Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 3.—Unless the state board of medical examiners successfully refute the charges of discrimination made by southern California students an investigation will be made by the next session of the state legislature according to a statement made by Walter Parker, "boss" of Los Angeles county. When asked if the charges would be called to the attention of the assembly Parker said: "You may depend on it, that if the allegations pressed against the board from various sources are true, the state legislature will take an active hand in straightening things out. The board of medical examiners deciding the important things they do and arranging for the issuing of certificates to candidates for the medical profession, should be free from any taint of political corruption, of graft, or of favoritism, or of any of the other charges which have been urged."

### Forest Fire Controlled.

### "Allies" to Uphold Taft.

Chicago, Sept. 3.—Chairman Hitchcock of the Republican national committee is planning a grand speaking tour for four presidential aspirants who opposed Taft for the nominations. The great combination will be Fairbanks, Knox, Foraker and La Follette. The Republican leaders believe that this speaking team, representing various interests, will present a strong argument in favor of the ticket by the mere fact that they are all working together, in addition to their individual powers as stump campaigners. Before leaving here for Maine, Hitchcock will complete the arrangements for this big campaign feature and it will mark the launching of the actual campaign contest before the people at large.

### PHILIPPINE SULTAN SENTENCED TO HANG

Manila, Sept. 3.—The Philippine territorial supreme court today decided that the sultan of Dunabarra must hang for his participation in the raid of Parang, on the island of Mindano in January, 1908, in which J. W. McDonald, an American, was killed. In the court's decision the doomed sultan is ordered to pay 1000 pesos to McDonald's heirs, as damages for his death. The district in which the raid occurred was one of the most turbulent with which the United States army had to deal following the war with Spain.

### WEALTHY WOMAN ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

Paris, France, Sept. 3.—The American colony is shocked today by the sensational attempt at suicide by Mrs. Myrin F. Colfelt, wife of T. H. Colfelt, the wealthy New York broker, who shot herself three times shortly after midnight this morning. Mrs. Colfelt is in a precarious condition in a hospital and it is feared she cannot recover. It is reported that she was despondent over marital troubles. The woman was alone in her hotel apartment when she fired the shots. All three entered her body and she was unconscious when attendants reached her.
