DIES TESTIFYING IN "UNWRITTEN LAW" CASE

Dallas, Tex., Sept. 3.—Mrs. John Reinhardt lies dead today, a victim of heart failure produced by mental strain and fear while testifying yesterday at Beaumont near here to save her husband who had invoked the "unwritten law" as his defense for killing Edward Cantrell.

The woman was undergoing a severe cross examination at the hands of the prosecuting attorney and suddenly collapsed on the stand. Thinking she had merely fainted, she was removed to another room and the trial was proceeding when the announcement came that she was dead.

Reinhardt killed Cantrell at Saratoga, Texas, on Aug. 24th. Mrs. Reinhardt had complained that the man abused her frequently. She had warned him that he must desist, but he paid no attention and she finally told her husband. Mr. and Mrs. Reinhardt were together at Saratoga on the day of the killing and Cantrell, believing the woman alone approached her. She called to her husband nearby and the shooting resulted.

MAKE COMBINATION BETTING ODDS

San Francisco, Sept. 3.—Combination orders have been posted here on the three big prize fights of next week by Tom Corbett as follows: Nelson, Attell, Ketchel—3 to 1. Nelson, Moran, Ketchel—5 1/2 to 1. Nelson, Attell, Papke—3 1/2 to 1. Nelson, Moran, Papke—5 1/2 to 1. Gans, Attell, Ketchel—5 1/2 to 1. Gans, Moran, Ketchel—8 to 1. Gans, Attell, Papke—5 1/2 to 1. Gans, Moran, Papke—8 to 1.

A peculiar feature of the combinations is that Ketchel must win inside of 12 rounds or any combination ticket bearing his name is declared a loser. The reason of this is that in the straight out betting Ketchel is a 10 to 4 favorite over Papke, and a Ketchel victory seems such a foregone conclusion that Corbett thinks Ketchel for combination purposes should be handicapped in some way.

This in a nut shell means that if Papke stays 12 rounds with Ketchel, Papke will be regarded as a winner in the combination betting.

Beef Trust At War.

Chicago, Sept. 3.—Genuine competition in the beef trade, with resulting benefits to cattle raisers, butchers and consumers, is the sweeping promise of a newly incorporated concern here which has had the nerve to plan an independent stockyard for Chicago right under the nose of the ninety million dollar "Beef Trust" and challenge it to a competitive war in prices. The company is a small one, and officers of the big packing houses say it will not succeed. Its plans, however, call for an expenditure of \$1,500,000 in packing houses and other structures. Twenty acres have been purchased at Thirty-ninth street and Forty-eighth avenue and work is already under way. According to H. W. Rockwell, one of the incorporators, active competition will begin October 1. Many new advantages to stockmen are announced. Charges for feeding stock in the yards will be reduced, and feed may be purchased elsewhere. The company owns its own switch-track. "The concern is the outgrowth of the conditions brought about by the Union Stock Yards company," said Mr. Rockwell. "The cattle raisers, shippers and consumers believe that they have good cause for complaint against the company's methods, and I have no doubt they are right in thinking so. This concern is to be a genuine competitor for trade, and the prices of meat, consequently, will fall materially." The Union Stockyards and Transit company, against which the present attack is directed, is not controlled by the big packers, but by a group of Boston capitalists, who are also directors in a score of railroads, banks and trust companies. The last attempt to establish independent yards was when the big packers decided to move their plants to Tolleston, Indiana. An agreement was then made with the Union Stockyards and Transit company by which the packers were to receive certain benefits in return for remaining at the present yards for a period of 15 years.

There are only three motor boats plying on the Min river, on which the city of Fochow is located, and on which there is great native travel and commerce. There are several steam launches, most of which are owned by foreign firms, which also own the motor boats.

Automobiles are not known in this part of China, simply because there are no streets or roads which they could be used on.
