## POPE WOULD RETURN TO PRIVATE LIFE

Rome, Sept. 3.—Expressing great fears that he has not much longer to live and that the burdens of the church are becoming too much for him to bear, Pope Pius X today, in an interview with Bishop Burke of Albany, N. Y., declared that he is filled with an unconquerable desire to return to private life in his old home at Venice, where he may spend his declining years in quiet rest.

No adequate intimation of the mental suffering his holiness has been undergoing had been suspected until his almost painful statement today to the American prelate became known. Bishop Burke is said to have stated to those close to the pope that his condition is more serious than is generally suspected, and that there is danger that the aged head of the church may succumb.

The confinement and the constant recurrence of grave matters of state that he has been engaged in for the past two years have been very trying to him and he feels no longer capable of facing them. Great alarm is felt at the vatican.

This morning he led four victims of his deadly arrow into the county clerk's office, and a casual glance at the marriage license books showed that the job the love God had just finished was not at all of the ordinary kind. All of the parties concerned have already been married one or more times, and for one of them this is the fourth matrimonial adventure.

The most married man is James O. Phelps, aged 64, who is to wed Nellie Clide a charming widow of 39. The next official item in the book gives widower William Lutz, a young man of 38, permission to marry widow Perlina Herman who has seen just 50 summers. This all goes to show that Cupid is no discriminator or respecter of persons, and that age or experience in the matrimonial line is no safeguard.

## MOTHER REGAINS DAUGHTER

(United Press Lensed Wire) Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 2.—In a chase lasting three years and covering all the principal cities of the Pacific coast, Mrs. A. R. Gress has possession of her daughter, whose life has been a continual series of kidnappings. Gress found her child at the home of G. E. Ware in this city and mother and daughter, and a state line on their way east.

After having been kidnapped times during the war for possession which has been waged for two years, little Mary fell into the hands of her father last time at Pasadena three months ago. Gress admits that he kidnapped the child from his wife at that time. He says he has spent \$30,000 in endeavors to retain possession of his daughter and is greatly chagrined being outwitted.

His story is that Mrs. Gress parted the girl when she was weeks old. They lived then in Kane, Wn., to which city they went after leaving San Diego. He had made \$30,000 in the estate business. He took the girl to Santa Barbara, where he started shoe business, but Mrs. Gress followed him there and brought for possession of the girl. He says, that the suit was against him, Gress kidnapped the girl.

He took the girl to Salt Lake, Francisco, Portland, Seattle, other places, finally going to Phoenix, Ariz.

## LITTLE HOPE FOR VICTIM OF SHOOTING

(United Press Lensed Wire) Atlantic City, N. J., Sept. 2.—reported today that the condition of Charles B. Roberts, the Baltimore merchant who was shot by a known assassin on the board here over a week ago, is such that there is now less hope for his recovery than at any time since the shooting occurred.

Rumors that the injured man made an ante-mortem statement have been made today, but the verification. It is said Roberts told detectives of a private agency the full story of the shooting which took place while he was riding in a wheel chair in company with Mrs. W. S. G. Williams, the man who fired the fatal shot is under surveillance that leads to arrest.
