WALK-OUT OF HOP PICKERS THREATENED

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Utah, Cal., Sept. 4.—A general strike of hop pickers now threatens to complete the series of ill-fortunes that have beset the hop growers of the Ukiah valley this season. Today six ringleaders who tried to incite the pickers to a general walkout are under arrest and unless the situation changes within the next 24 hours it is likely that more arrests will be made and the entire force of workers will leave the fields.

Three hundred pickers employed by Horst Brothers, have already refused to work unless they are paid a dollar per hundred pounds, which means an increase of 20 cents over the present scale.

The pickers are in an ugly mood and are presenting their claims for increased wages with a defiance that has caused the local authorities to prepare for an outbreak. Damage to property is feared. The crop is only one-third harvested and in case a strike is declared, will be almost a total loss. Many growers are already harvesting under a great loss this season, on account of the low price hops are bringing in the market. They have also suffered from a scarcity of labor and for this season are at the mercy of the pickers.

Largest California Kiln Burns.

Hopland, Cal., Sept. 4.—The hop drying kiln of the American hop and barley company here today is a total loss as the result of a fire discovered in the furnace room late yesterday. The damage has not yet been ascertained, but is known to be extensive as this firm has the largest plant in the state. The fire is thought to have started from a defective flue, although it is not considered improbable that the dissatisfied hop pickers who are on strike for higher wages, may have responsibility.

CHILD IS KIDNAPED IN BROAD DAYLIGHT

 Chicago, Sept. 4.—Golden Anderson, the 3-year-old son of William Anderson, assistant auditor of the Illinois Steel company, was kidnaped today while playing in front of his home in this city, and it is supposed will be held for ransom.

Several women of the neighborhood saw a strange man drive up in a light wagon. He stopped, alighted and without attracting particular attention approached the little boy.

Suddenly the man seized the boy and holding him under his arm, sprang into the wagon and drove rapidly away. The case is mysterious as Anderson is well-to-do but not wealthy.

There is no doubt, according to the witnesses, that the man had particular designs on the Anderson child and did not kidnap him at random. A general alarm has been sent out through police channels and private detective agencies have been employed in the case.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC TO SPEND FIFTY MILLIONS ON ROAD

(United Press Leased Wire.)
 New York, Sept. 4.—Wall street is interested today in an authentic report that the Southern Pacific railroad will expend \$50,000,000 in completing 2000 miles of projected lines. The money is to be raised before 1910. Financiers declare the road will have no difficulty in raising the required sum.

Also, according to the well-informed, it is ridiculous to suppose that \$75,000,000 of Southern Pacific 7 per cent preferred stock not outstanding will be redeemed by any bond issue. Unless all plans go astray this stock will be converted into Southern Pacific common, thereby relieving the income of Southern Pacific of some \$5,200,000 of preferred dividends, which to all practical purposes are a fixed charge.

This would clear the decks for arranging the financial program of Southern Pacific of which the times are ripe, should be inaugurated early next year. Barring accidents, this financing in all probability will call for the authorization of \$100,000,000 of bonds convertible into Southern Pacific common at whatever price conditions may warrant. This would amply finance all the requirements of the company for several years, and bring to completion its program of physical expansion.

ORCHARD IS NO LONGER A "TRUSTY"

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Boise Ida., Sept. 4.—Members of the Idaho state prison board, angry because Warden Whitney had seen fit to make a "trusty" out of Harry Orchard, have given strict orders to that official to treat the slayer of former Governor Steunenberg the same as other prisoners serving a life term.

Complaint was made to the board that as soon as Orchard's death sentence was commuted to life imprisonment the warden took him under his charge as a "trusty," and that the prisoner was not compelled to wear either the regular prison garb or a number.

FRENCH FIND ISLANDS RICH IN PHOSPHATES

 San Francisco, Sept. 4.—Two commissioners of the French government, Albert Bonnel de Meziere and John Stephens, are in this city today on their return from the exploration of an island in the Piemotu group near Tahiti, which is said to

be normously rich in phosphates, rivaling the deposits owned by the British on Christmas island. The two men will go to Paris and return immediately with sufficient capital to begin the work of developing the deposits for the French market.
