

RAILROAD COMMISSION REPORTS ON COLLISION


The Railroad Commission has filed its report in the matter of the collision between an engine of the Southern Pacific company and a street car of the Portland Rallway, Light & Power company at the intersection of Fourth and Sherman streets in Portland on July 25. In this collision the motorman and the

street car overturned. The commission finds that the engine was being operated with cauhave been averted had the motorman not tried to pass in front of the engine. The commission also condemns the steam railroad on one of the principal business streets in Portland as a continuous menace.
