## WRECK MYSTERY IS CLEARED

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
San Pedro, Cal., Sept. 5.—Mystery surrounding the wreck off Point Arena was cleared today when the steamer Shna Yak arrived in port and Captain Hutton reported that his vessel grounded on the rocks there last Wednesday and was only saved from destruction when the deck load of lumber had been jettisoned. Five men fell into the sea and First Mate Gustafson was seriously injured.

The men who went overboard were saved after C. Jordan, a wrench driver, proved himself a hero by casting himself into the ocean and going to the aid of one of the sailors who could not swim.

Captain Hutton said he ran into a dense fog Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock and commenced to take soundings which showed 68 fathoms of water. At 4:35 the water suddenly shallowed and the lead showed but 45 fathoms. Five minutes later the Shna Yak hit the rocks off Point Arena.

## ADMITS ATTEMPT TO BRIBE RUEF JUROR

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
San Francisco, Sept. 5.—E. A. S. Blake, the contractor, who was indicted yesterday by the grand jury on a charge of attempting to bribe John M. Kelly, a prospective juror in the Ruef bribery trial, to vote for the acquittal of the defendant, was brought before Police Judge Cabanis today for arraignment. As the indictment had superseded the police warrant for his arrest, the prisoner was turned over to Sheriff Dolan and taken before Presiding Superior Judge Sturtevant.  
Blake made formal application for reduction of his \$1000 bail, but the court refused to grant his request and he was confined in the county jail.

In a statement today the indicted man declared he was not trying to lead Kelly into a trap when he offered him money to vote for Ruef's acquittal as had been stated by Attorney Frank J. Murphy of Ruef's counsel before the grand jury yesterday afternoon. He said he was acting confidentially in the matter and did not expect Murphy to put such an interpretation on the matter in court.  
Blake related that he called upon Kelly, after having talked over the question of Ruef jurors with Attorney

ney Newburgh. He intimated to Kelly that there would be money if Kelly would promise to vote against the conviction of Ruef. He states he did it as a friend of Newburgh's and has no interest in Ruef.

## ARREST NEGRO IN ROBERTS SHOOTING

Atlantic City, N. J., Sept. 5.—Sensational developments are expected to follow closely the arrest today of Jesse Jackson, the negro, who was pushing the chair in which Charles G. Roberts and Mrs. W. G. S. Williams were riding last week, when Roberts was mysteriously shot. The police refused to say whether the negro was accused of being an accomplice of the would-be assassin or whether he is simply held as a witness.

It is understood that sleuths still are tracing the movements of W. G. S. Williams, husband of Roberts' companion.  
The mystery in the case still remains uncleared.
