

PIONEER THOMAS B. WAITE IS DEAD

The funeral of the late Thomas Baker Waite, one of the oldest and best known residents of this city, who died at his home at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon, was held from the residence at 458 Mill street at 11 o'clock yesterday. The funeral sermon was preached by Rev. J. R. Comer, and the services were under the auspices of Pacific Lodge No. 50, A. F. & A. M. The burial took place at Lena cemetery in Polk county.

Thomas Baker Waite was born in Boston, Mass., on July 27, 1843. He came west in 1853, and married in Salem. He leaves three children, Mrs. James Putnam, Mrs. Henry Schumaker and Mr. Ennis Waite, all of whom reside in this city. Mr. Waite owned one of the first hardware stores in Salem, and for many years was engaged in that business. The cause of the pioneer's death was heart trouble, and the end came after an illness of several months.

TANGLE OVER EASTERN OREGON LAND GRANTS

(La Grande Observer.)
Among the things that are worrying the weary members of the line-up at the land office, anxiously waiting for September 15, when their long visit will come to an end, is the question of squatter rights. Since the section of land on which these scores of so intend to file, was thrown open to settlement and ordered open for entry on the 15th inst., many squatters have bestirred themselves into Wallowa county, log cabins are fairly springing up on all desirable locations. The question arises, "Will such squatters have preference rights over the members of the line here in La Grande?" The general opinion is that they have not, and that the line here in La Grande will be given the preference in view of the fact that these men will be the first to make entry. Of course, the bona fide squatter who has lived on his claim in the section at stake, will be given his 90 days' filing preference right, but there is some question that this will hold true on squatters who have settled since the proclamation was issued, throwing this section open to settlement.

A great majority of the men in the line have avoided bona fide squatters and it is not thought there will be any conflicts in that way, as they were shrewd enough to keep off squatted land. But since they have been over the land and have come here to form the filing line, many cabins have sprung up in the heart of the woods and, of course, will conflict with the claims to be made here.

But they are hopeful that the government officials will rule that the new squatters are mere transgressors. They claim that no other version can consistently be placed on their acts. They have gone in there since the proclamation was issued, apparently, and can, therefore, not have any legitimate rights over others. If they have, the whole matter can be sifted down to a question of partiality. The term is unknown to the government, hence the conclusion that the squatter who went on the land since the date of opening for settlement will be displaced by the men who have adopted the channels of procedure prescribed by the department of the interior.
