## HAVE CLEW TO TRAIN WRECKERS

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Maadville, Pa., Sept. 14.—Erie railroad detectives said today that they had a clew which they expected to lead to the arrest of the man responsible for the wreck of the Chicago-New York express yesterday at Geneva, in which 24 persons were injured.

The train was moving at the rate of 60 miles an hour when it crashed into an open switch. The switch standard was badly smashed, but the officials believe there is evidence that the lamps had been turned in such a way as to deceive the engineer, and they are convinced that the wreck was the work of some one who has a grievance against the company. The passengers who were injured are all reported to be doing well, and no deaths are expected. The entire train left the track.

Another View.  
The Lake Shore railroad officials gave out a statement today in which they say that the wreck at Chester last night was caused by smoke sweeping over the country from the forest fires in Wisconsin, making the darkness so impenetrable that the signal light was obscured.

## MERGER ROADS TO BUILD TO 'FRISCO

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Sacramento, Cal., Sept. 14.—The announcement today that the Northern Electric railway, which controls the electric lines in the Sacramento valley, and the California Traction Company, which controls interurban lines near Stockton, are to be merged, and together build a line to San Francisco, has created considerable interest in financial circles here.  
The California Traction Company already has a line from Stockton to Lodi, and the plan includes the extension of this line to Sacramento. The directors of the two roads refuse to discuss the proposition, further than to admit that a merger is planned. They will not say at what point the proposed new line will enter the San Francisco Bay region.

## LAW IS CRUEL

SAY MORMONS  
Boston, Mass., Sept. 14.—The Mormon wives, who have been here fighting for the admission of Mormon immigrants from Europe, today returned home, the immigrants having been deported. The Mormon officials say they will call the attention of the President to the decision of the immigration officials, and have the matter of "admitted immigrants" threshed out.  
One of the immigrants sent back admitted her belief in polygamy. The

others were bitter, declaring that the laws of the U. S. were cruel and unjust. The immigration bureau held that the immigrants had been assisted in reaching this country by the steamship and railroad companies, which, they claim, are working in conjunction with the Mormons to bring Mormon converts to this country.

## DENIES HE MISTREATED GIRL

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Elmhurst, Cal., Sept. 14.—Constable Robert Gupitil, who was tied to a telegraph post and whipped publicly Sunday night, for his alleged treatment of Lena Campbell, a 14-year-old girl, and promised an infuriated mob of citizens that he would leave town today, changed his mind and announced that he would stay here to prove his innocence of the charge placed against him.  
Gupitil insists that he and Lena were merely reading a book when they were traced, and he was arrested by James Fisher, a deputy constable. He declares that the stories told about him by the people of the town are untrue.

## RUN OVER BY RAILROAD TRAIN

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Reno, Nev., Sept. 14.—Charles Belshaw, aged 25, who recently came here from San Francisco, lies dying in the county hospital today, with both legs severed, having been run over by a train.  
Belshaw arrived here from San Francisco Friday afternoon, and a few hours after he got here he met with the accident that may result in his death.

## Fight in New York

Sartoga, N. Y., Sept. 14.—With the candidacy of Governor Hughes opposed by a strong contingent, headed by a number of party leaders in the state, the Republican state convention opened here today, with the prospect of a free-for-all political battle, with Ellhu Root, secretary of state, acting as temporary chairman, and being mentioned prominently as a possible nominee for governor.

## DIED

KURTZ.—At the family home, three miles north of Salem, at 6 o'clock this morning, the infant child of Mr. and Mrs. Clinton Kurtz.  
The funeral was held at 4 o'clock this afternoon, and the burial took place in Odd Fellows' cemetery.

## STATE NEWS

The meeting of Governor Chamberlain and Governor Mead, of Washington and representatives of the fish and law departments of both states at Portland yesterday was devoid of results as to a settlement as the course to be followed in Oregon exercising jurisdiction on the Washington side of the Columbia. The Washington officials will begin suit in the federal courts to prevent Oregon from enforcing the recent fish laws on the north side of the river.

Jack Angus, formerly of Marshfield, is reported missing in Alaska.  
Thomas Edison, the noted inventor, at Portland yesterday, stated that the world was on the verge of making great discoveries in the occult realm.

Albany has opened a free public library and reading room.  
A good roads convention was held at Toledo, and a "better highways" development league was organized.

The Wheeler county grand jury has spread fear among the cattle rustlers by returning several indictments.

A big pavilion and other improvements are being put up in Medford for the holding of the First Southern Oregon fair, October 1 to 4.

A new faculty has been engaged for the Albany College of Music.  
The Eugene public schools open September 21.

The Marshfield city council has adopted a new charter and will submit it to a vote of the people on September 19.

The Lane County Veterans' Association will meet in Eugene September 23, 24 and 25.

A sawmill of the Astoria Lumber Company, valued at \$25,000, was burned last night.

Enterprise and all the Wallowa country is happy, the new railroad now bringing people direct from Portland in 24 hours. A grand celebration is to be had next Sunday to commemorate the occasion.

The Josephine county fruit inspector has ordered all infected trees razed.

The Marshfield chamber of commerce will continue, despite the expiration of the original contributing contracts; volunteer subscriptions are rapidly coming in.

The First Trust and Savings Bank at Marshfield has erected a handsome two-story and basement concrete building for their own use.

A single tree near Albany yielded \$25 in nuts.  
A grand holiday is being planned by Marshfield to celebrate the arrival of the government dredge, about September 20.

The First National Bank of Lebanon is erecting a concrete building two stories high.  
A new hotel containing 40 rooms, has been built and opened at Oregon City.

## NEWS FROM HERE, THERE AND EVERYWHERE

A Chicago captain of police, with two under officers, the city electrical inspector and the head of the Commonwealth Electric Company were attacked by a bear while walking through the woods near Waupaca, Wis., after their auto had broken down, and were getting the worst of the encounter when the police captain found an ax and ended the battle.

The Catholic parade in London yesterday, fortunately, came off without incident, other than cheering and hoots from the bystanders.

Sherwood Mazoe, well-known right fielder for the Chicago baseball team, jumped from a third-story window last night while asleep and dreaming that he was about to catch a fly, and a crowd of thousands were yelling "catch it, you lobster."

The American automobile, in the 24-hour race at Brighton Beach, beat all competitors and lowered all records, covering 1107 miles.

The American Federation of Labor has issued a denial that they are telling their members how to vote, but merely explaining to them the way labor's demand is met by the two parties.

Harry Thaw has been removed from his luxurious apartments in the Duchess prison to the hospital ward of the Westchester county jail.

Dave Newton, a negro suspected of the murder of a white man, was taken from the Brookshire, Texas, jail last night and lynched.
