THOUSANDS DIED IN ORIENT STORM

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Portland, Or., Sept. 14.—The Ger-
man steamer Numantia, Captain Feld
man, which has just arrived from the
Orient, was in the typhoon that
wiped out thousands of lives and de-
stroyed an immense amount of prop-
erty in Hong Kong, Canton, and the
adjoining districts. The officers of
the steamer say they passed a night
the never will forget. It was the
severest storm recorded in the Orient
for 50 years.
How many people lost their lives
will never be known, no effort be-
ing made to ascertain such details in
China, the officers say, and estimates
vary from 10,000 to 50,000, some
newspapers in the Orient asserting
that all of 50,000 lives were sacri-
ficed during the two hours the storm
raged in its fury.

ANTI-DUBOIS FACTION SCORES VICTORY

Boise, Idaho, Sept. 14.—The
anti-Dubois faction of the Democrat-
ic party of Idaho scored a distinct
victory today, when the supreme
court of the state by a unanimous de-
cision overruled the demurrer of the
Dubois attorneys, meaning that the
court will take under consideration
all the facts and decide the case on
its merits.
The fight is to determine which
one of the two tickets recently ad-
opted by the factions is entitled to the
party's name. The court submitted
a list of 16 questions upon which it
wants proofs. They question the
manner in which delegates to the
state convention were chosen and the
proceedings of the two conventions
at Wallace. Attorneys for the an-
ti-Dubois faction declare the decision
means success for them.

TAFT SAYS BRYAN HAD BETTER MAKE PLAIN HIS OWN STAND

Cincinnati, O., Sept. 14.—William
Howard Taft this afternoon gave out
a statement, replying to the interview
made public by Bryan, at Baltimore
today, saying:
"In my notification speech and my
other speeches since, I have attempt-
ed to make clear my position on all
issues of the campaign.
"If Mr. Bryan is unable to under-
stand them I cannot make them
clearer.
"I stand on my record in office, as
I have said. Mr. Bryan should de-
voted a little time to his own record,
from which he seems to be struggling
to separate himself with the ardo-
riness acquired in previous years, and
is hunting for an issue upon which
he can be elected President.
"The readiness with which Mr.
Bryan, in his previous campaign,

passed from one paramount issue to
another, show that the consideration
which he affected his selection of any
issue has been its plausibility in at-
tracting votes.
"He presents the remarkable spec-
tacle of one who is seeking the presi-
dency 12 years without access; with-
out official responsibility; without
the opportunity to test the various
propositions, which he has advanced
as reforms, yet of having events dem-
onstrate what a colossal failure
would have been made in each in-
stance, had he been permitted to carry
his proposals into the policies of the
country."
Taft said that Bryan has not yet
declared whether he is now in favor
of the free coinage of silver. The
Philippines," said Taft, "prefer a Re-
publican victory to Bryan's promises.

"Bryan now favors a more rigid
regulation of the railroads," said
the Republican candidate, "whereas,
in 1896, he expressed the opinion
that railroads could not be regulated
by law.
"We have heard nothing from him
on the subject of government owner-
ship," said Taft. "Bryan professes
to have been father of and now the
heir to the Roosevelt policies, yet
in no campaign he led did he make
them the paramount issue. Instead,
in the Parker campaign, he charged
Roosevelt with militarism, and with
being completely subservient to the
influence of corporations."
Taft pointed to Bryan as being one
of the chief supporters of the Gor-
man-Wilson bill, making labor help-
less for four years.
He declared that Bryan, after this,

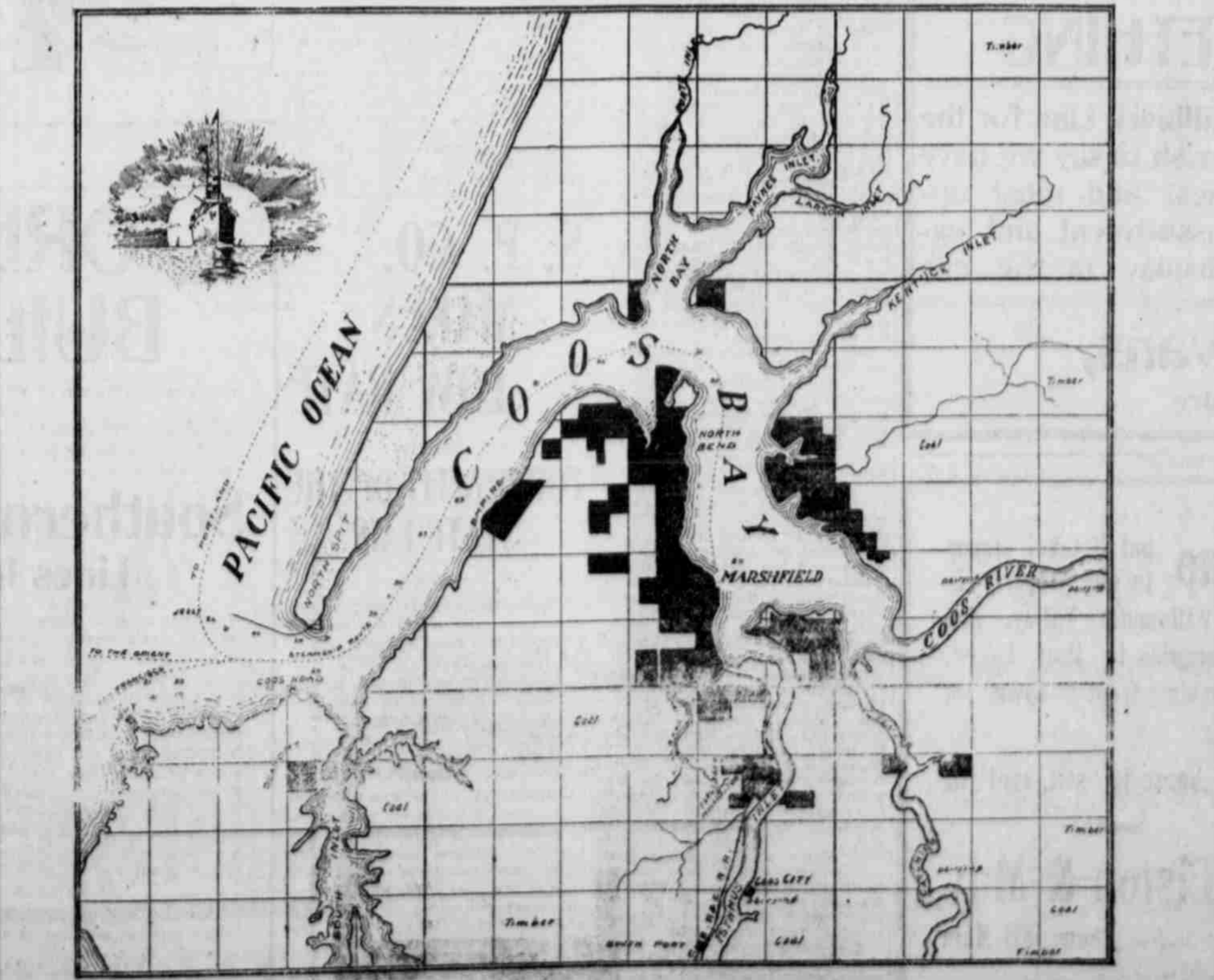
proposed the remedy of issuing 50-
cent dollars.
In closing Judge Taft said:
"And it will be fortunate, indeed,
if the danger of four years of depres-
sion, which would follow in case of
Bryan's election, may be averted,
and, if by Republican success in No-
vember and subsequent prosperity
and by clinching the Roosevelt pol-
icies, he may again show to be a
prophet without honor."
