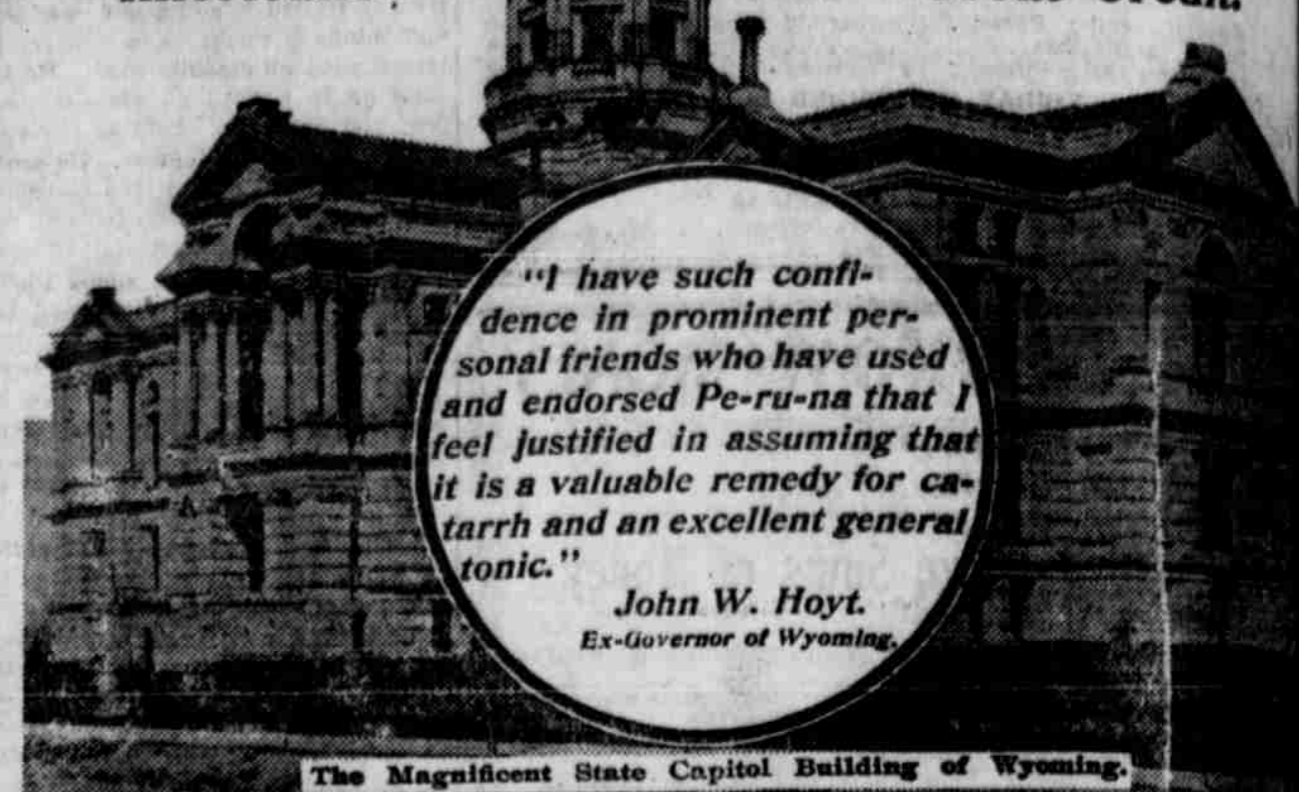

TRACK SLOW RAGES GOOD

The second day's racing at the Lone Oak course at the State Fair grounds proved as interesting, if not more so, than those of the first day's events notwithstanding the conditions of the track which was far from being fast, due to Monday night's rainfall and the cool weather which prevailed during the afternoon. The crowd was much larger than that of Monday, it being about 4000 in number. 2:20 Pace. The 2:20 pace which was the first event of the day, purse of \$800, was won by Salano Boy, another of the Chaburn horse. Salano Boy won the stake in three straight heats but was compelled to carry her speed nearly up to the top notch to do so. The first heat Salano Boy got a small lead at the first quarter with Ken West close to her heels, and Alt, Bushnell King, Nellie Bishop, and Della Mont two lengths behind fighting for third place but these were soon left a good distance behind with the exception of Alt, during the last half, Salano Boy, and Oregon Male and Donax were hopelessly distanced. Salano Boy passed the goal a length to the good, and Alt, Ken West and Bushnell King played for second place at the stretch in good manner, Ken West getting second, Alt third and Bushnell King fourth place. The time made in this heat was 2:09 1/4. The second heat Salano Boy again got the better of the getaway and passed the wire a length ahead. Ken West stuck to the leader for the first half with all kinds of speed but broke in the last half, falling to fourth place, with Alt and Lou Miller fighting for second place, but as soon as the speedy stallion got his feet again he pulled steadily to the third place holding it under the wire. Alt getting second and Lou Miller fourth place. The third and last heat was led by Salano Boy under the goal with Ken West second and Alt, who lost her second place by breaking at the last quarter, third; time, 2:11 1/4. 2:16 Trot. The 2:16 trot of a purse of \$1000

was won by Emily W., of the Frank Ward stables. The first heat was started with Emily W. and Della Derby fighting for first place in the first quarter, Emily W. getting the place with Della Derby, Alandra, Easter Bella and Irene bunched a half length behind. At the last quarter a pretty race was put up by Della Derby and Alandra for second place, Della Derby winning out, and Alandra second with Easter Bella fourth, the heat being made in 2:14 1/4. The second heat was also led by Emily W. but she was forced to her best by Day Break, who had ran somewhat slow in the first heat, and Della Derby. These two horses ran almost neck and neck from the last of the last half until under the wire, Day Break pulling the second place out by a head. Emily W. only left the two followers behind at the close a half length. The time made in this heat was 2:12 1/4. The third and last heat was won by Emily W. by a head. Easter Bella passed Emily at the last half post and held the first position to the last quarter but the winner of the two former heats managed to push her nose under the wire to win the third heat and race. Easter Bella, Day Break and Della Derby were close behind Emily W. all passing under the wire in a bunch. The time 2:13 1/4. Emily W. got first money, Della Derby second money, Day Break third money and Easter Bella fourth money. 2-Year-Old Record Broken. The two-year-old pace event with a stake of \$4000 showed some of the fastest young racing colts ever stepping around the Lone Oak track. Bonnie Antrim, the property of W. T. McBride, won this stake in the two straight heats out of three. The first heat Sadie T., obtained the lead with King Seal second, Bonnie Antrim third and Rosa R. fourth. Bonnie Antrim began crawling to the front after the first quarter and never left off until her little nose passed under the wire a winner of the heat by a length although she was pushed to her limit by King Seal who also got a place in front of the lead horse, Sadie T., the time in the heat being 2:25 flat. The second and last heat was won by Bonnie Antrim easily. She got the lead and kept it clear around winning by two lengths with King Seal second, Sadie T. third and Rosa R.

fourth. Bonnie Antrim made a new state record in this race by going the mile in 2:23 1/4. The running race of one-half mile, selling \$100, was won by Combury Galves second and Crigh third. Time 48 1/4. Nellie, a young horse belonging to a local man by the name of Glover, went an exhibition mile against her own time of 2:30 and beat with a time of 2:16 flat.
